Two important cities fell into the hands of the rebels yesterday. They are Chang Shay and Nan Chang. Chang Shay is the capital of the province ot Hunan, Nan Chang the capi tal of Kiangsi
Chang Shay has a population of 300,000 and is the principal commercial station on the rail road between Hangkow and Canton. Nan Chang is a city of 100,000 .
Four Chinese provinces are now under rebel sway. They are Sezchuen, Huheh, Hunan and Kiangsi. No uprising has been reported at Nanking which is only 200 miles from of the Yang Tse valley, but of the Yang Yse valions there are bordering on a panic.

Mr. Cobb referred to the ong time that New Mexico had to await the chance for tatehood because of the caave to the democratic party the principal credit for finally securing this much coveted boon, as it remained for a dem ocratic lower house of congress to senate and president
right so long denied.

Mr. Cobb was especially caustic and pointed in his references to Mr. Bursum the republican nominee for governor. Mr. Cobb's references to the long-established practice of the republican managers ceunting sheep when they ran short of yoters, brought forth hearty
applause. He said, however that even with that kind of
padding of the republican vote Bull Andrews could win only by a scant 300 majority as dele gate to congress. And that now, when the sheep votes would be curtailed' the democrats had an excellent chance crats had an excellent chance to win, and especially so, when

cent element of the republican party.

TURBULENT MEXICO
Madero is Facing a Serious Situation and Revolutionists are Gaining

Mexico City, Mex. Oct., 23.To avoid the appearance of connection with any revolu tionary movement against the new government in Mexico, general Bernardo Reyes leaves San Antonio, Texas, and establish his temporary home in New York, according to private advices received to Partisans of Madere Partisans of Madero bere ar ot altogether plensed with his cabinet. They have sent a formal protest to him agains the retention of Ernesto Ma dero, minister of finance; Ra fael Herpandez, minister of fomento, and Manuel Calero, now minister of justice. The only objection offered is that these men were too closely identified with the old regime. Two bridges blown out on he Inter-Oceanic railroad, one station burned and two small battles with federal troops form Sunday's record of the Zapata campaign.
The apparent inability of the overnment to capture Zapata r to put down his insurrection leads to the belief that the pacification of the south will remain for Madero when he assumes the presidency, next month. In addition to the $\mathrm{Za}^{-}$ pata problem, the new executive must also deal with five uprisings.

Mexican Troops Are Wiped Out. Mexico City, Oct. 25.-According to the best informa tion obtainable, the 18th bat talion of Federals, numbering 200 men, was wiped out by the Zeapatistas in yesterday's fighting. The Department of War and the Interior decline to make public the facts.
