

WINNER McDONALD IS

Visits Artesia and is Given Grand Ovation by an Enthusiastic Gathering of People.

Mr. W. C. McDonald made a brief visit to Artesia Monday evening, and on account of the muddy roads was delayed an hour or so. However, when he arrived he was met by a



large concourse of citizens and with music by the greeted Adams' band. Preparations were at once made for his speech, and he entertained the audience for about an hour.

Mr. McDonald is heavier than his picture we print indicates. He is also larger in every way than he has been reputed to be. He has a good honest face and is a preposessing man, while his head as well as talk shows that he is also brainy.

Mr. McDonald discussed in a general way the issues of the campaign, making some telling points against the opposition and bringing out with forceful effect the record of the gang that has ruled New Mexico, and that hopes to continue to do so. He was especially complimentary to the patriotic progressive republicans who had aligned themselves with the democracry to wrest from the bosses the death-grip they have on this fair land.

Also he spoke most earnestly and flattering of the aid being given by the native element, as well as in behalf of the most estimable men on the democratic ticket representing that people.

Toward the east from the Pecos broad rolling prairies merge into the plains of West Texas. The size of Eddy county is 5,500 square miles but only a small portion of this area is adjacent to the river and therefore capable of being irrigated.

Every crop that has been tried upon irrigated land in Eddy county has proven successful and the variety of money producers are so many that the farmer may choose what suits his tastes; this a mark-NEW MEXICO ed advantage over places where a mishap to the staple crop forces the land to lie idle until next season.
