Some fears are being felt by the democrats that an effort is on foot by the republicans to tamper with the election returns as it is impossible to get definite information. On account of this suspicion several democrats have gone to Albuquerque and Santa Fe from Pecos Valley and other portions of the state to see what the trouble is and be there ready to meet any such action if it is made.

Sheriff Cicero Stewart and Dr. Cowan, of Carlsbad, have gone, and several joined them at Roswell.

News comes from Quanah, Texas, that the Quanah, Acme & Pacific president and secretary are in New York with the seal of the company, for the supposed purpose of signing up papers for a loan of threequarters of a million dollars to extend the road west into New Mexico and on to El Paso.

It is also stated that the Frisco will soon begin to run from the north its trains to the Quanah depot, thereby making a direct connection of the two roads.

Of course, this extension of the Quanah, Acme & Pacific is for the purpose of meeting and connecting with the San Diego El Paso & St. Louis, which is building from Artesia to El Paso. It is what has been expected all the time, but is being commenced some sooner than we thought it would be.

Let the good work go merrily on. It will make Artesia a division point; the shops will be located here, because it is the only place near, where suitable water can be had for the employes and in abundance for all shop purposes.

Almost complete returns on the vote for governor in Tuesday's election show a majority of 3,297 for William C. Mc-Donald, the democratic candi-The returns on the redate. maining offices on the state and county tickets are coming in slowly and it is now considered likely that the first authentic information as to the majorities of the various candidates will come from the office of Secretary Jaffa at Santa Fe, Nov. 27th.

In many of the counties the race was an exceedingly close one. In Guadalupe the democatic candidate for governor received a majority of 14 votes in the entire county.

In Don Ana county Herbert B. Holt, the republican candidate for state senator, received a majority of 1, over James H. Pexton, his democratic opponent. The republican candidates for the legislature in Dona Ana were elected by majorities of less than twenty-five.

In McKinley county, the republican legislative candidates claim their election by majorities of less than 50 and it is not unlikely that the first state legislature will be called upon to tion by a large majority, has settle a number of contests between the rival candidates.
