Did last weekend feel like mid-May to you? Were you out enjoying outdoor sports?

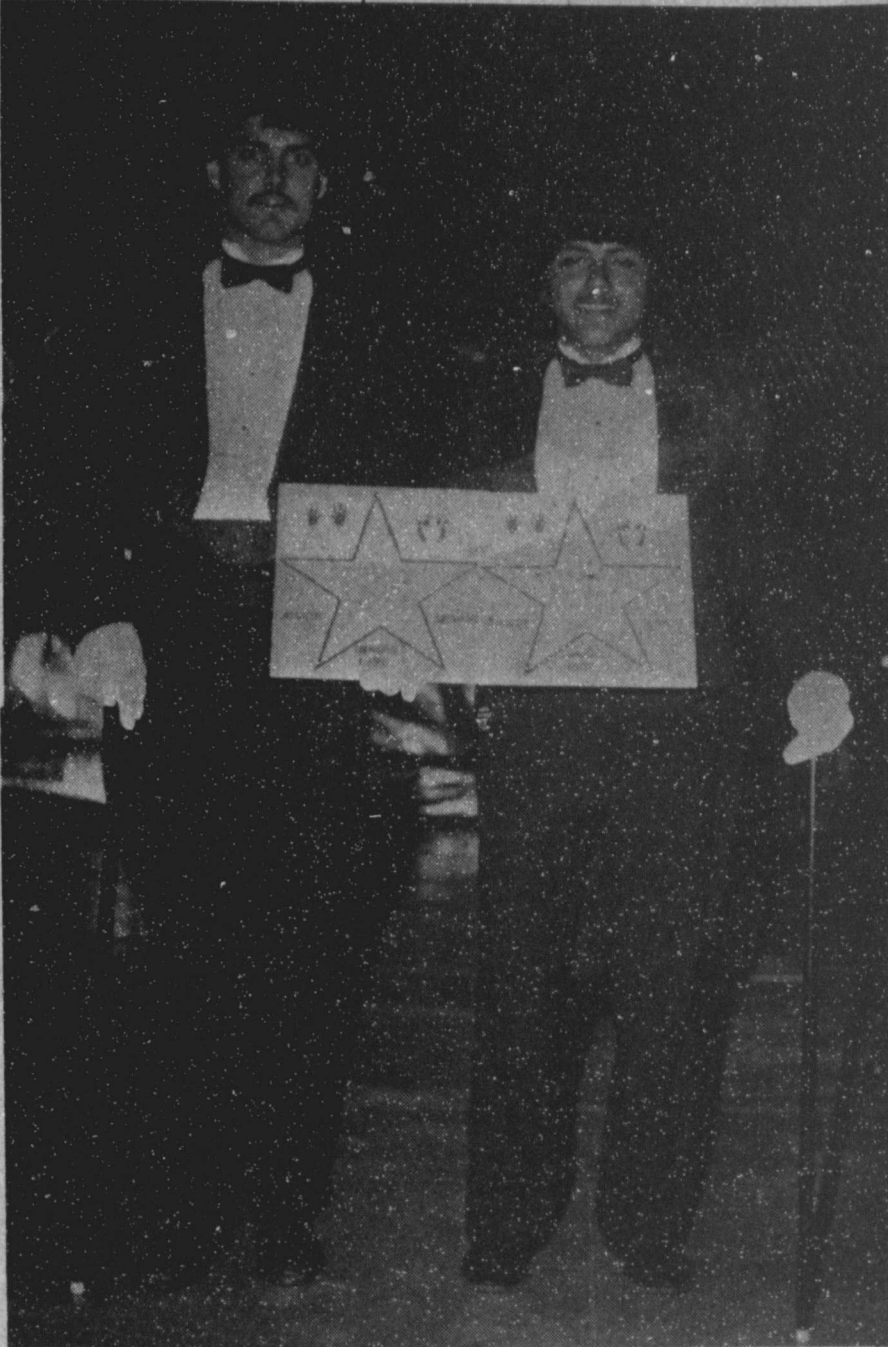
If you weren't, you were not alone. Most people watched in dismay as the temperature dipped into the mid-30's and sleet peppered down heavily during the morning hours.

Although snow did not fall in Muleshoe, the ground was covered with snow around Clovis and east toward the state line.

Officially, .40 in moisture fell in Muleshoe, and the cold wind during the morning, accompanying the lower temperatures, rain and sleet, left a wind chill factor of 17 degrees around 7 a.m.

However, the rain and sleet gave way to sunny skies by Sunday, and at mid-week, the temperature was back into the more expected 80's.

More rain is desperately needed by farmers, many of whom are dry planting their crops at this time, hoping for enough moisture to germinate their seeds.

## City Checking Into Emergency System

Frank Goodman and O.D. Hearn from General Telephone Exchange were visitors at the Tuesday morning meeting of the Muleshoe City Council. They discussed a community alert system, after inquiries had been

made earlier by Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr.

Acting a speaker, Hearn discussed the advantages and disadvantages of various alert systems.

He said one system, which particularly interested city officials is being tested at this time, and is not really recommended by GTE. Hearn said the system, which allows a large number of telephones to be dialed with one call to give emergency information causes an office 'lock-up' of the system and puts the system out of service.

Most systems are not equipped to handle a massive 'dialing of telephones,' he explained.

It could be handled by making a selection of phones to be dialed such as all peace officers and firemen who need immediate communications.

**Selecting Beef For Microwave Cookery**

Many people don't use their microwave ovens to cook beef because they think it will be tough or overcooked.

According to Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt, one key to tender microwaved beef is to select the right cut to cook.

She suggests the following guidelines for buying the meat:

\*Choose beef with even marbling or fat cover for more even cooking.

\*Choose roasts that are even in shape and thickness.

\*Avoid cuts with bone on just one side of the meat.

\*Buy lean ground beef rather than regular ground beef. Lean ground chuck will shrink less and accumulate less fat on the surface than regular ground beef.

\*For stews, buy a boneless chuck roast and cut it into one-inch cubes for more even cooking and more tender pieces of meat. Most "stew meat" is more lean than chuck and will tend to be tough.

In addition, Hunt recommends following the oven manufacturer's suggestions for cooking

various cuts or shapes of meat. For example, it may be necessary to rotate meatballs during cooking, or to rearrange the pieces for more even cooking.

A ring shape for meatloaves and other meat mixtures will also cook more quickly and evenly than loaves, says the nutritionist.

**Lack Of Communication About Money Causes Family Problems**

One of the major causes of family problems is failure to communicate about family finances.

"Couples who didn't bother to discuss family finances when times were good find themselves at odds when the situation changes," says family economics expert Nancy Granovsky.

For example, a person may tolerate a free-spending spouse until one of them becomes unemployed. Then it's easy to blame the spouse for spending instead of saving and emotions can build until the problem affects their basic relationship, explains the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist.

Granovsky says another type of problem occurs when one spouse--usually the husband--assumes all the financial responsibility in an effort to protect the other. This may work fine until something happens, such as the death of the husband or a major change in their financial situation.

In a financial crisis, the wife usually knows something is wrong because she sees overdue notices in the mail or is asked to sign legal documents. Yet, her husband may still refuse to discuss the situation so she won't have to worry.

"Unfortunately, not knowing can be more worrisome than the facts," notes Granovsky. "How a family handles its finances on a daily basis may be a private matter for one of the partners, but in a community property state like Texas, half of the assets acquired during marriage belong to each spouse."

The specialist advises couples to at least discuss their basic finances so that both spouses have a good idea of their current situation. Both partners should be capable of performing most any financial function necessary to survive if the other partner dies.

How people react to a financial emergency can also add to family problems, says Granovsky.

Some people react as though they are completely destitute even though they may have unemployment benefits or savings to tide them over, she maintains. Others may actually spend money on things for

"show" so that no one really knows how difficult their financial situation may be. Either reaction can add strains to a marriage.

"Unemployment and other financial problems are tough for any couple," Granovsky remarks, "but developing good communication habits before

problems arise can help ease the strain when circumstances change."

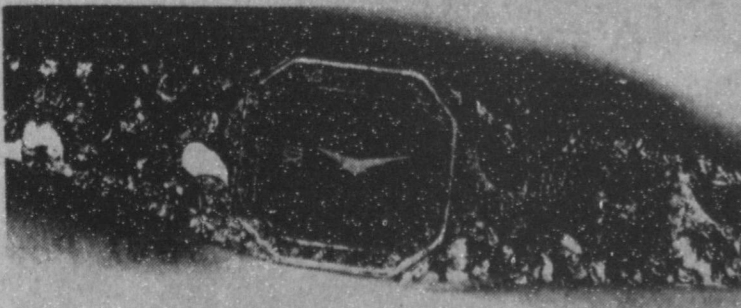

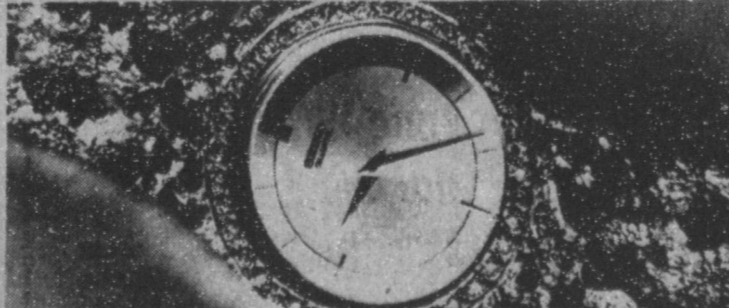

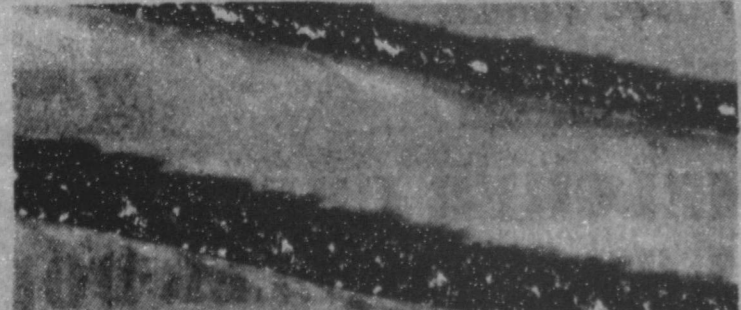

**If You Can't  
Drink Milk**

If you have trouble digesting milk, try to drink a smaller amount at one time, eat yogurt or cheese, or drink milk with lactase, advises a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

Lactase is an enzyme that breaks down milk sugar, says Dr. Dymple Cooksey. You may find milk already containing lactase in the grocery store, or you can buy lactase in a drug store and add it to your milk.

If you don't drink milk because you simply don't like it, the nutritionist suggests eating more of other foods that provide calcium.

High calcium foods include those made with milk or cheese and tofu, a soybean product that is often made with calcium sulfate. A half cup of tofu made with calcium sulfate has about the same amount of calcium, protein and fat as a cup of whole milk.

Dark green leafy vegetables and tortillas made with cornmeal also provide some calcium. Canned or dried fish with edible bones, such as salmon, will also contribute calcium to the diet, she notes.

"Getting enough calcium is especially important for children, teenagers, pregnant and nursing women and people at risk for osteoporosis," says Cooksey. "So if you don't drink milk or eat milk products, check with a dietitian, nutritionist or physician to help you plan ways to get this important mineral."

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Try to manage your credit to avoid debt problems. But, if your family is facing a financial crisis due to unemployment, too much debt or some other reason, don't make the mistake of ignoring bills. When you stop paying bills you run the risk of losing what you already have.

Instead, talk with your creditors. Promptly make an appointment with the finance company, bank, credit union, or department store loan office or credit manager to explain the problem.

Your creditors may agree to one of several alternatives. For example, they may allow you to make reduced payments for a short period of time. Refinancing or consolidating a loan is another possibility.

It's especially important to work out a way to handle monthly mortgage payments. If you can't meet the payments go to the lender and explain. Ask the lender to work with you to develop an alternative payment acceptable to both the lender and yourself.

Most of us are embarrassed if we can't pay what we owe and don't like to talk about our debts. But there is nothing to be lost and much to be gained

**Emergency System**

He suggested that city officials consider the '911' emergency system which is being installed in a number of cities, both large and small. It features abbreviated dialing and all calls go into one of the emergency agencies that is open and staffed 24-hours-daily, and seven days a week.

The division manager for GTE also inquired of the city council about the current service as provided by GTE and asked about any known problems with the service.

Following a discussion, two resolutions were approved by the council members. Both resolutions concerned Muleshoe's participation in the 1986 Texas Community Development Program.

According to one resolution, approval was given authorizing the City of Muleshoe to submit an application to the Texas Department of Community Affairs for the Community Project Fund; and authorizing the City

Manager to act as the city's executive officer; while the other resolution authorized the city to commit \$75,000 toward the proposed \$385,000 paving project in two areas of Muleshoe.

In other action, the council transferred \$293.09 to bad debts and approved a new seal coating program using a three percent solution of ground up tires in asphalt. City Manager Dave Marr said the ground up rubber in the asphalt provides more elasticity and holds rocks better than the former system used.

The city manager said the acquisition of water rights is going well and the proposed closing is June 16. He also said budget meetings for the upcoming year get underway late in June.

**Plainview Insect Workshop Slated**

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Bailey County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Tuesday, June 3, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview. Spencer Tanksley, county Extension agent said.

The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

Tanksley also said the second workshop is scheduled for July 8 in Plainview and will cover mid- to late season crop pests.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management program conducted by Extension, part of the Texas A&M University System.

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others as well as producers, who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs, pointed out Tanksley.

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, outlining the scope of the training, and explaining general concepts

of pest management, and sampling. Leser will open the cotton pest section with information on thrips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent-Entomology headquartered at Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests. Aspects of pesticide safety will be presented by Mark Brown, Extension Agent-Entomology from Crosbyton.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on

corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-Entomology based in Dimmitt. He will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.

The daylong workshop will conclude with a hands on session in which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect specimens. Handouts will be available, concluded Spencer Tanksley.
