Insurrection Mexican Soldiers at Juarez

## AIM TO OVERTHROW MADERO

The Mexican government re ieved from duty 100 soldiers at Juarez across the line from El Paso, and 200 other soldiers stationed there joined them in an insurrection. The commander and chief of police were ar rested and locked up but later released.
The rebellious soldiers broke into stores and saloons taking what they wanted. Most of hem became drunk, and then 'shot up" the town, killing a umber of people.
Railroad bridges were detroyed so as to delay govern ment troops going there to restore order. There were 600 soldiers ordered from Mexico City to Juarez, and an equal number from Chihuahua.
E1 Paso, troops are on duty at El Paso. All Americans were ger train stopped and passen it sent to E1 Paso.
The insurrectionists claim The insurrectionists claim that there will be outbreaks at ther places among the soldier or the purpose of overthrowing President Madero.

He was found unc onight in his room at a hotel He was hurried to a hospital where physicians applied drasic remedies, but failed to revive him. At midnight it was reported he probably would not ive until morning.
What Throckmorton is expected to tell on the witness stand is known only to the state's attorneys.
