Soldiers and Mexicans Fight.
E1 Paso, Texas, March 4--A lash between Mexican rebels and United States soldiers occurred tonight near the center by the railroads, and much resentment on the part of Sal azar's officers was aroused thereby.
Six Mexicans armed with ifles came toward the center of the bridge just before midnight for the purpose, they af terwards said, of investigating the action of a man who was on the bridge. Two United States soldiers saw the squad of rebels coming from the other side of the river and met them half
way. One soldier siezed the foremost Mexican's gun and disarmed him.
The other soldier seized another rebel's rifle, and there was a struggle between them for the possession of the wepon. The soldier drew his revolver nd struck his adversary a stunman then surrendered. The other four rebels fled, carrying their arms with them, but the two captured were brought to this side of the river. The encounter was quickly eported to Salazar and he sent a delegation to this side of the United to investigate. The charge told the visitors they would have to see Col. Steever it they had a complaint to make.
Salazar's men took the names of the soldiers on guard at the bridge and reported to their quarters. Following the incident much resentment was displayed by the rebels.
All passengers coming from Mexico on the late cars tonight were searched by the rebels before leaving Juarez, for what purpose was not made clear.

fact of the shooting soon spread over the town, where the deceased was well known, n particulars as to the cause nor
the detail, which lead up to the shooting could be learned.
At the time this article written no one from Loving has been in the city and ail attempts to get any specific information over the telephone from that place have been $f u$ tile, as all citizens of Loving who were interviewed in the matter are very reticent. Brie ports of the affair are about as follows, which were gathered For some time past there has been a bitter feeling existing between the deceased and his assailant over alleged family matters; for some unknown reason it reached a climax las met a hundred yards south the store owned by R. E. Tucker. Woods, who was armed
with a shot gun, emptied a charge of shot into the breast of his adversary directly over the stomach killing him instantly The unfortunate victim was
cared for by friends and Woods went immediately to the home of Deputy Sheriff T. J. Fletcher and gave himself up.
