the Memory. When the washing and ironing of
silk is so easily done there is prob-
ably nothing so practical and useful as ably nothing so practical and useful as
the silk waists. When preparing to wash silk waists separate them into
colors, putting the white ones alone. colors, putting the white ones alone.
Soap jelly is easily prepared, and is a valuable help. It should not be kept
for longer than a week, as it soon loses its strength.
Have ready three bowls of luke-
warm water, and into two of them place some of the soap jelly, In the
frst bath plunge flirt bath plunge the waist, having the
sight aide uppermost. Squeeze the right side uppermost. Squeeze the
soapy water gently through the fabric, keeping it well under the water, and paying speclal attention to the neck,
wristbands and armholes. When the Wristbands and armholes. When the
waist is well washeu in the first water squeeze the water out of it. Never
wring the garment. Turn it on the wrong side and repeat the process of washing in the second, bath of soapy
water. Squeeze when well washed.
