

### FAITHFUL WORK.

The expression, "Faithful work is always of the same size," appeared in a recently published article. It opens a world of thought to those who pause long enough to consider such matters, besides offering a generous share of comfort and encouragement to those who sometimes grow disheartened at the apparent result of their efforts. At least that is the impression which many persons form who see the effects of large efforts, whether they be along constructive, or charitable or educational lines. In a way these effects are spectacular; indeed there is a large proportion of mankind who require brilliant effects to make them - display interest in passing events. The quiet, unobtrusive worker intent upon results he accomplishes more than upon the impression he creates in overlooked many times, and after a while the want of attention given him and the lack of encouragement offered him find expression in his attitude of growing discontent towards life.

A New York butcher has been sent to jail for a particularly mean method of cheating. It was his practice when selling poultry to weigh it with a lead sinker concealed inside, the sinker being provided with a string by which he pulled it out before handing over the bird to the customer But a sharp customer seized his bird before the butcher tood it from the scale to wrap It up, and, seeing the string, pulled it out and found the sinker and "had the law" of the butcher On investigation other similarly loaded poultry was found in the shop.

At a meeting lately of a fire-protection association it was stated that fire in the United States cost \$500 a minute. Also, that the annual life loss was 1,500 people, and that 5,000 are annually injured. This showing is a disgrace to civilization. The vast majority both of life and property loss is preventable, and the big mistake of the age is in treating such loss under the head of accidents.

Thrice condemned is the old structure, with memories woven around it that link the present New York, with its rustle and bustle, its subway and cloud touching structures of stone and steel, to the days of Peter Stuyvesant. For it was that stubborn old Dutchman, who, Sept. 12, 1656, as governor of New Amsterdam, decreed that "Saturday shall be the market day, and the market shall be held at the strand, at or around the house of Hans Kierstede, where, after him, every one shall be permitted to enter that has anything to buy or sell."

In 1675 the market moved to the Custom House Bridge Market house. farther up the East river and near to Maiden Lane. It became generally known as the Fly market, from the Dutch "V'Lie," for valley, which name stuck to Fulton market long after its

Perhaps the housewife of today with a turn for economics would like to know what the quaint Dutch vrous paid for their household supplies in those early times, when bears roamed over Manhattan island not far north of the present city hall, and lambs bleated in the meadows around Wall street. Well, pork was 3 pence a pound; beef, 2 pence; butter, 6 pence; beer, 2 pence a mug. Lodging was 2 pence a night, meals 6 pence and board by the week 5 shillings. But then it must be remembered that labor brought only 2 shillings 6 pence a

For over a century the market remained, cleaned out occasionally by vagrants designated by the courts for the purpose. But the agitation that brought about the abandonment and razing of the old Fly market began in the early part of the last century, much after the fashion of the agitation that started against its successor, Fulton market.

The department of health condemned it as insanitary. Finally, on Jan. 22, 1821, the market was torn down.

The merchants scattered to other parts of the city, some going to Spring Street market and others to Center Street market and a part of them to Old Slip market, until the new market was built at the foot of Fulton street. This was finished toward the end of the year and the aldermen compris- ers said to a representative of this miles an hour.

Noted New York Structure to Be ing the market committee recommended that the stands in the new market, which were to be occupied almost exclusively by butchers, be auctioned off at a minimum rental of \$100 a year. Close to Dunmow is a notorious marriageless district, and in spite of a number of would-be village benedicts. The couples either wait indefinitely till a cottage is available or migrate to the towns or emigrate. ## PORTS OF ARGENTINA

Southern Republic Adds to Harbor Facilities.

Plan Docks for New Dreadnoughts-Extension of Railway Lines to All Parts of the Country Being Rapidly Pushed.

Buenos Aires, Argentine Republic .-In 1911 the Argentine government devoted much attention to the opening of new ports on the rivers and on the coast of the Atlantic or to amplifying those at present in existence in order to provide for the increased maritime trade with neighboring and foreign countries. Among these may be mentioned the work of enlarging the port of Mar del Plata, known as, "The Brighton of Argentina," which is now being carried out, while the Port Argentine Great Central Railways company has obtained a concession from the government to construct and work an Atlantic port in the bay of Samborombon, about 100 miles from the city of Buenos Aires, and a system of railways, comprising about 640 miles of lines, connecting the port with the principal railways of the republic.

The arst section of the harbor works, now in course of construction under the direction of Engineer Jean Sillard, is to be completed in eight years and will have a capacity sufficient to accommodate sea going vessels to an aggregate of not less than 60,000 tons. The harbor concession is granted for ninety-nine years from April 2, 1910, and all lands for a distance of nine miles of foreshore on the bay reclaimed from the sea below the highest water mark have been granted in perpetuity subject to a small strip which reverts to the government after ninety-nine years.

The lines of this company, from the port of Somborombon, will connect with those of the Great Southern railway, the Western railway and the Pacific. The Northeastern Railway company has been authorized to construct and exploit for the term of thirty years the mole at the port of Goya. The government has also recently approved the project for the amplification, dredging, etc., of the port of Gualeguaychu.



### LEGHORNS ARE BEST LAYERS

None Other Found So Strong and Hardy and Consequently Easy for Poultrymen to Raise.

Leghorns live and are profitable longer than other breeds. Large hens put on fat after the first year and do not lay so well afterward. Leghorns lay well until four or five years old and a Leghorn on free range will never get fat enough to hinder her laying.

Like all other fowls they are at their best during the first and second years of their lives, but as long as a Leghorn hen looks bright and thrifty she will lay profitably, says a writer in an exchange. This in a great measure offsets the fact that their bodies are too small to sell well as dressed poultry, however the buyers here pay as much per pound for them as for any.

They are accused of not laying as well during the winter as the larger hens. If the houses are cold enough to frost the combs of the singlecombed varieties they will not lay until their combs are healed. They hardly ought to be expected to, and rosecombed varieties do better on this account, but given comfortable quarters I have no trouble in getting them to lay in winter. Last December was a very cold month here, the temperature being below zero nearly every

morning during the month and some mornings more than 20 below. I had yearling hens laying, also pullets what can be done with the proposihatched in June that had been laying since September 1.

Other small breeds that I have tried fill all these points except one. have found none other so strong and hardy and consequently easy to raise, and so take them all in all, the Leghorn suits me for an all-around farmer's fowl better than anything that I have ever tried.

### Pure Breeds.

We keep all the way from 150 to 250 chickens, divided into six flocks. We prefer a pure breed to a cross or mongrels, says a writer in an exchange. There is more money in them, and a flock uniform in color adds very much to the appearance of a farm. Our breeds are Buff Plymouth Rocks and White Leghorns.

### A Convenient Roost.

A good roost is a 2x4 scantling. placed broadside over two 12-inch boards. These two boards form a platform which catch the droppings, and these are worth from 75 cents to a dollar a barrel. Do not place the roosts too high, for the hens will jump, and in so doing will have leg weakness or perhaps bumblefoot.

### A Guillotine for Chickens.

Most womenfolk find it no easy job to kill a chicken. Of course, they should never be asked to do it if there is a man in sight or within call, but If she has to the guillotine will help her to do it easily and neatly.

An old corn knife ground to a sharp edge and kept sharp, fastened to a block, will do the work.

for these small farmers, and the initial stock must constantly be supplied. Any man who produces birds good

enough to take premiums at the fall and winter shows and then advertises eggs and stock for sale, will meet with ittle difficulty in disposing of them.

Any business, by careful attention and intelligent management can be made successful and the poultry industry is no exception.

With a little careful reading any farmer can learn how to improve his stock and profits, and he will soon find that poultry raising is a very interesting part of the farm work, as well as one which amply repays for the amount of labor and money expended.

The slow steady growth of a flock of poultry is more to be desired than a large investment in fancy stock without previous experience. Study just what line of the poultry business is best suited to your local environment and then get to work and see tion. A mongrel hen might, in an occasional instance, lay as many eggs as one that is pure-bred; but the flock will not live up to the standard set by the pure-bred fowls.

### For Success With Chickens.

Constant care is positively essential in raising a lot of chicks. You cannot give them proper attention today and then tomorrow leave them to their own resources. Intermittent attention will destroy the hopes of a fine flock, and bring the profits down

## POULTRY NOTES

A hen needs nearly seven times more fresh air in proportion to her size than does the horse.

Selecting the hens according to their laying qualities is to some poul-

trymen a hard proposition. Any one keeping poultry must, of course, have houses to protect them

from cold or stormy weather. Fowls intended for market should be cooped for a week or two and fed

all the rich food they will eat. The early broilers always command

the best market. Little chicks will not thrive if pen-

ned in a small enclosure. Fine gravel is not the proper grit for poultry. They want a sharp mate-

rial with which to grind their food. The incubator should be located in a room where the temperature does not vary much during the day or night.

Remember that the early broods must at all times have a dry place and room to exercise when the weathso it cannot flop about, draw it tight, er will not permit them to go out-

Eggs will become fertile in from four to six days after mating. The effect of mating will continue several months.

It is necessary to feed the breeding ducks liberally, yet at the same hen that takes the prize is often the time feed so as to keep them active and healthy

Poultry houses which have cracks in their sides or leaky roofs should be covered with some kind of prepared roofing on both roof and sides.

Chicks sheltered from the weather and given plenty of good water will most profitable crop on the farm.

Soap Jelly, Freshly Prepared, the Best to Use-Some Minor Points, That Mean Much, Well to Keep in the Memory.

When the washing and ironing of silk is so easily done there is probably nothing so practical and useful as the silk waists. When preparing to wash silk waists separate them into colors, putting the white ones alone. Soap jelly is easily prepared, and is a valuable help. It should not be kept for longer than a week, as it soon loses its strength.

Have ready three bowls of lukewarm water, and into two of them place some of the soap jelly. In the first bath plunge the waist, having the right side uppermost. Squeeze the soapy water gently through the fabric, keeping it well under the water, and paying special attention to the neck, wristbands and armholes. When the waist is well washed in the first water squeeze the water out of it. Never wring the garment. Turn it on the wrong side and repeat the process of washing in the second bath of soapy water. Squeeze when well washed. Shake and rinse in clean, warm water to remove the soap. Then rinse in cold water, and if possible in running water. In order to make white silk a good color rinse in blue water. Silk must be ironed while quite damp or it will have a rough, unfinished appearance. Use a moderately hot iron and place a piece of muslin between it and the right side of the silk. It has been found that a hot iron yellows silk and gives a crimped, rough appearance. Iron the silk to give it a good gloss. Lace trimmings on the waist should always be ironed on the wrong side, as lace is never supposed to have a gloss.

### To Renovate a Black Coat.

To freshen and renevate the black coat which is perfectly good for further wear but lacking in freshness, brush it thoroughly hung on a line, or better, on a coat form against a wall in the outside air. After every speck of superficial dust has thus been removed, take a soft cloth of some black material, dip it in half a pint of gasoline, squeeze it a little and quickly go over the whole coat, rubbing lightly and paying special attention to any marks which may show on the cloth. Leave the coat in the outer air for some hours, that every trace of the asoline odor may disappear; then, should any rusty marks show along the seam, or any glossy places be visible, sponge with a pint of strong coffee (clear) containing a teaspoonful of ammonia. When nearly dry press on the wrong side with a hot iron, or on the right side, using a cloth under the iron. The coat will be wonderfully freshened by this treatment.

Sponges often become slimy through hard water, so a good water softener is advisable. This consists of a mixture of borax and oatmeal well stirred together and dissolved in boiling wa-



### LEGHORNS ARE BEST LAYERS

None Other Found So Strong and Hardy and Consequently Easy for Poultrymen to Raise.

Leghorns live and are profitable longer than other breeds. Large hens put on fat after the first year and do not lay so well afterward. Leghorns lay well until four or five years old and a Leghorn on free range will never get fat enough to hinder her laying.

Like all other fowls they are at their best during the first and second years of their lives, but as long as a Leghorn hen looks bright and thrifty she will lay profitably, says a writer in an exchange. This in a great measure offsets the fact that their bodies are too small to sell well as dressed poultry, however the buyers here pay as much per pound for them as for any.

They are accused of not laying as well during the winter as the larger hens. If the houses are cold enough to frost the combs of the singlecombed varieties they will not lay until their combs are healed. They hardly ought to be expected to, and rosecombed varieties do better on this account, but given comfortable quarters I have no trouble in getting them to lay in winter. Last December was a very cold month here, the temperature being below zero nearly every

morning during the month and some hatched in June that had been laying since September 1.

Other small breeds that I have tried fil all these points except one. have found none other so strong and hardy and consequently easy to raise, and so take them all in all, the Leghorn suits me for an all-around farmhave ever tried.

### Pure Breeds.

We keep all the way from 150 to 250 chickens, divided into six flocks. We prefer a pure breed to a cross or mongrels, says a writer in an exchange. There is more money in them, and a flock uniform in color adds very much to the appearance of a farm. Our breeds are Buff Plymouth Rocks and White Leghorns.

### A Convenient Roost.

A good roost is a 2x4 scantling, placed broadside over two 12-inch boards. These two boards form a platform which catch the droppings, and these are worth from 75 cents to a dollar a barrel. Do not place the roosts too high, for the hens will jump, and in so doing will have leg weakness or perhaps bumblefoot.

A Guillotine for Chickens.

Most womenfolk find it no easy job to kill a chicken. Of course, they should never be asked to do it if there is a man in sight or within call, but If she has to the guillotine will help her to do it easily and neatly.



After every speck of superficial dust has thus been removed, take a soft cloth of some black material, dip it in half a pint of gasoline, squeeze it a little and quickly go over the whole coat, rubbing lightly and paying special attention to any marks which may show on the cloth. Leave the coat in the outer air for Some hours, that every trace of the gasoline odor may disappear; then, should any rusty marks show along the seam, or any glossy places be visible, sponge with a pint of strong coffee (clear) containing a teaspoonful tion, said: of ammonia. When nearly dry press on the wrong side with a hot iron, or on the right side, using a cloth under the iron. The coat will be wonderfully freshened by this treatment.



A piece of flannel dampened in camphor will polish mirrors.

A pinch of salt thrown into the coffee pot will improve the flavor of the coffee.

Hot milk added to potatoes when mashing them will keep them from being soggy.

When a blanket becomes too thin for the bed do not destroy it. It makes a nice silence cloth or pad for the dining-room table.

. Castor oil becomes tasteless if beaten and thoroughly mixed with the white of an egg.

world. After the bread is mixed and molded grease the mixing pan in which it is to stand while rising, and the ease with which it can be taken from the pan when making into loaves will be a pleasant feature of the work. Please don't fail to try this at the next bread mixing.

Sponge Hint.

A sponge that has become slimy and sticky can be made as fresh as when new if well rubbed right into the very center with a freshly cut lemon and well rinsed. If one application be not enough the treatment should be repeated and the sponge put in the open

Sponges often become slimy through hard water, so a good water softener is advisable. This consists of a mixture of borax and oatmeal well stirred together and dissolved in boiling wa-
