

EDUCATE AGAINST SELFISHNESS.

Recently addressing a body of New England students, Richard Olney, secretary of state under President Cleveland, urged them to the duty of subordinating interests of their respective future crafts to the highest claims of citizenship. Which is only another way of saying, that in educating our young people we should teach them first the art of living, and second, whatever art by which they are to live; that is, that living comes before getting a livelihood. The claims of citizenship are above those of any trade or profession. Our schools that go in for the vocational training, eminently good in itself, need to look out lest they lay the chief stress upon the matter of ture. Over most of the dry farming getting hold of technical knowledge as the means of making a living. The schools, none of them, are teaching too much about how to become good and worthy citizens, how to make dynamic men and women out of ordinary boys and girls. There is the place for the stress. That, we think, is what Mr. Olney had in mind when he urged those students to sink selfish plans for immediate aggrandizement in the larger purpose of doing good and being good for their country, says the Omaha Bee. For as sure as they do they will have no difficulty in picking up a livelihood somewhere. So if our curriculums' could be made to teach and throw their weight against selfishness in education our educational system would be improved right here.

From Copenhagen comes information which will be received with interest by all who are alert to electric progress. Professor Hannover, president of the Polytechnic academy of that capital, is asserted to have invented an electrical accumulator that has five times the capacity of the accumulators now in existence without any increase over them in size and weight. He uses porous lead alloy sheets, the capacity of which is increased by perforating them with millions of microscopic holes. Professor Hannover's accumulator, while it is likely to be more expensive than those now in use, will be most valuable for aeroplanes sheep and hogs a cheap fattening by getting the disk nearly straight and and submarine boats and in lighting food for finishing them off in the railroad trains.

Keystone of Success Is Conservation of Rainfall.

Enough of Crop Should Be Grown to Supply Work Horses With Roughage in Winter and Supplement Summer Pastures.

In all the dry farming areas the conservation of the rainfall in the soil where it becomes available to growing crops is the keystone of successful agricultural operations, says the Northwestern Agriculturist.

This is generally done by the cultivation of the soil during the entire growing season. If no crop is produced on the land this operation is called summer fallow or summer cularea nearly if not as good grain crops can be grown following a cultivated crop as on summer fallowed land.

When the bare fallow system is used a whole year elapses without any returns either on the investment or for the labor performed. If a cultivated crop can be grown with as good crops following it should more than pay its expense, which will consist of the cost of seed, planting and harvesting; the cultivation would have to be done anyway, so this should not be counted against the cost of production of a crop of corn. Corn is pre-eminently this cropfirst-because it produces an abundance of cheap feed-second-it shades the soil during the excessively hot days of July and August, thereby preventing loss of soil fertility, and third-a cornfield has a cooling rather than a heating influence on the winds that blow across it.

On most farms in the dry farming area enough live stock should be kept to pay most of the running expenses of the farm. Hay and pasturage are very short in such areas and consequently too dear for cheap live stock production. Enough corn should be grown to supply, first, the worl horses with roughage during the winter, if not the working season; second, to supplement the pastures of the summer and fall as a soiling crop or in the form of ensilage and to form the bulk of their winter ration; third, to supply the fall.

soil water, and forces the corn ahead very rapidly. On the dry farms the corn should be cultivated after every rain as soon as possible in order to bottle all water possible in the soil. As soon as the corn is cut the land should be disked lightly but it should not be plowed. Should any heavy soaking rains come after this in the fall the land should again be harrowed. In the spring wheat should be sown as early as possible but very rarely should the corn land be plowed before seeding wheat.

SOD-BOUND ALFALFA FIELDS Methods Employed in Regenerating


Vary Great Deal-Disking Is Most Popular System.

(By H. F. PATTERSON.) The methods used in regenerating an old field of alfalfa vary a great deal. Perhaps the method that is used to the largest extent throughout all of the northwest states is the method of disking the land early in the spring. Whether or not it is a good plan to disk alfalfa land is a question upon which there has been much difference of opinion. However, if this work is done properly there seems to be a good reason for so handling our field.

In localities where there is but a small amount of rainfall and where the soil becomes hard and impervious to water it is a very good practice to follow. Then again in regions where there is sufficient rainfall and where the winter season is open, the thawing and freezing will tend to loosen up the ground and in that way have the same effect as disking in the arid regions. It is a well-known fact that the disking of the stems will cause them to become very much thicker. However, in disking alfalfa there is some danger in that the crowns very often become infected with fungus diseases which will oftentimes destroy the entire plant. We must keep this in mind and must govern our actions accordingly. That is, we must use extreme care in order that the crowns of the plants will not be injured to any great extent.

The disking of course will cut the crowns and there is always the danger that the fungus diseases will set in. However, if we are careful and do not alow the diseases in our fields on the start and are careful that our disk is very clean, this danger will be almost entirely eliminated. The disk should be so set that it will cut the crowns of the plants rather than gouge them out. Some farmers have had success running the disk each way. This will divide the crown into four equal por-



The clover will die out in a year or two and we will still have a good stand of alfalfa. We would suggest the following of this plan upon a large number of our alfalfa fields that have grown alfalfa for three or four years. By getting in and disking it is possible to thicken up the stand to such an extent that we can grow our alfalfa upon the same field for three or four years longer and still obtain large and profitable crops. NEW FIXTURES FOR BATHROOM

Glass Twisted Towel Rods With Nickel-Plated Brackets Are Latest Accessories:

Every year something new appears in the way of bathroom accessories. Decidedly new this spring are glass twisted towel rods with nickel-plated brackets in colonial designs. The twisted glass prevents the towel from slipping off the rods, as so often happens with plain glass rods.

Another new fixture, which will be found useful in a small bathroom where it is impossible to have a stationary washstand, is a basin and soap holder of rather heavy wire, white enameled. This holder is made to span the bathtub from one side to the other by means of a heavy wire extending out on each side. Both ends of this wire are nickel-plated and made very strong where they clasp the sides of the tub. The whole arrangement has an extension feature which enables it to fit any width bathtub.

A white enameled manicure table, with glass top over oak, will be found convenient for either dressing room or bathroom. This table is finished with nickel rims. At one end is a quartercircle drawer in which may be kept the various manicure instruments.

CARE OF THE FURNITURE Prudent Housekeeper Will Shun Polish Recommended to "Cover All Defects."

The prudent housekeeper will be as wary of doctoring her furniture with polish that is recommended to "cover all defects" as she would be of a patent medicine which is guaranteed to cure every disease. The highly-polished surfaces of furniture have often been ruined by a too free use of a so-called polish which, not having been rubbed dry, has hardened and collects all of the dust before drying, has caused a dull film to appear over the polished surfaces. A simple and effective polish for cleaning furniture and removing scratches is made of one-third linseed oil and two-thirds benzine. It should be applied with a paint brush which has very soft bristles and rubbed dry with an old soft piece of muslin or soft fiannel. For polishing, fold it into a pad, sprinkle a few drops of alcohol over the surface of the pad and rub the furniture firmly and quickly. Rub only a small part. at a time and be sure to rub until the





YUAN PARTIAL TO AMERICANS

How Chinese Dictator Obeyed Orders of Late Dowager Empress and Saved Foreigners.

Maj. Henry Leonard of the United States marine corps, retired, who lost an arm at Tientsin and won a captaincy in Pekin, has seen a great deal of Yuan Shih-kai, who, according to the dispatches, is now dictator in the Chinese empire. "Yuan's son used to come a great deal to my quarters in Pekin," says Maj. Leonard. "He spoke English fluently, but his father did not speak the language at all. For all that he seemed to have a great liking for Americans. That he is a man Office in Residence two blocks west of great sagacity and foresight was shown by the way in which he obeyed the orders from the throne in 1900 to march against Pekin and crash the foreigners who were cooped up there in the legation quarters. At that time there was only 1,800 of us, all told, and matters had become so desperate with us when we were relieved that we had already drawn lots to see which would kill the women and children in case the Chinese army attacked us. "Had Yuan come against us he could

easily have exterminated us, as we wouldn't have had a show. Yuan was not afraid to lead such an attack, but he never reached Pekin. He marched his army up and down in Shantung province, of which he was governor, for a whole month. He could always report that he was actively in the field against the foreigners, but he was careful not to get near enough to us to attack us.

"Therefore, when China decided it wanted peace the foreign governments had Yuan as the mediator, and the dowager empress thought so well of his services that he could have had anything he wished in China so long as he lived."



NEED NOT ALWAYS BE SERVED IN SAME OLD WAY.

Should Be Thoroughly Chilled Before Frying to Get Best Results-Various Nice Ways of Serving as Breakfast Dish.

There is a proper and an improper way to cook bacon. One unfortunately sees too much of the latter. Baked on a rack or a broiler, it is considered more wholesome than when it is fried, but most of the trouble with fried bacon lies not in the fact that it is fried, but rather in the way it is fried. It is too often sent to the table either half cooked and floating in grease, or else it is dried up and half burned.

To fry bacon ideally, it should, after It has been cut into thin slices, be placed on ice to become thoroughly chilled. The pan must be very hot, so that the bacon curls into little rolls as soon as the pan is shaken. Fry it thoroughly, but not long enough to barden it.

Bacon baked as follows is free from grease: Cut it into thin slices and place them on a rack such as is used for roasting meat or upon a gridiron plaged over a dripping pan. Have the oven very hot and let the slices remain in it until they are crisp and bro n.

The following is a unique way of brolling bacon: Cut it into thin slices as usual, place cracked ice over them, and let them stand in this way until they are chilled. After broiling the elices on one side -place them again on the ice. In a moment or two put back on the fire, and broil them on the other side until done. The sudden change of temperature is believed to improve bacon.

There are many nice ways of serving bacon as a breakfast dish. Tomatoes fried with bacon are a favorite dish in many English households. Cut the tomatoes in slices, season with salt and pepper, and, if preferred, dip in egg and bread crumbs before frying.

A catsup gravy is very nice when tried in bacon. Pour off the superfluous grease after frying, add a little catsup mixed with water and thicken with flour, if necessary. About a quarter of a cupful of water is added to balf a cupful of catsup.

Fried bacon with cream gravy makes a nice breakfast dish in spring, with corn bread. After cooking the bacon free it from superfluous grease. Add a little flour and milk to the drippings that remain, cook the sauce on top of the stove and pour it over the bacon. Another way to prepare this dish is 'o soak the bacon in cold milk for 20 minutes before cooking, afterward dipping the slices in flour and frying in a very hot greased frying pan. The soaking in milk gives a fine flavor to the bacon and the flour, and the nour insures a crisp crust. Shake the pan well while cooking, and after browning thoroughly on both sides remove the bacon. Pour off superfluous grease and place the slices on rough brown paper to absorb any fat that may adhere to the outside. Stir into the frying pan one or two tablespoonfuls of flour, gradually adding the milk the bacon was soaked in, and season with salt and pepper. When the sauce is thick pour it over the bacon and serve at once.

CANADA'S PROSPERITY.

The New York Times of March 28, 1912, in an article dealing with Canada's progress, says:

"At the present moment eight shiploads of European immigrants are afloat for Canada, while there are signs that the outward movement which is customary with us during labor troubles will be marked this year. There is no such startling record of our loss to Canada. Our citizens quietly slip over the border in groups or trainloads, but their going is not advertised.

"There is no mystery why Canada is the 'good thing' the United States used to be. It is because Canada is following in its neighbor's footsteps that it is repeating the fortunate experience which its neighbor is envying, even while deliberately turning its back on the teachings of the past. A fortnight ago the Dominion budget speech reported the unprecedented surplus of \$39,000,000, and on Thursday the Government passed through the Committee on Supply credits of \$38,000,000 for railways and canals. With this assistance the railways themselves are both enabled and compelled to increase their facilities. Accordingly we find a single road allotting ten millions for work of its own. Naturally the Canadian newspapers contain announcements calling for fifty thousand men for construction work. This influx is apart from those Americans who go with money in their pockets obtained by cashing in their high-priced American lands.





Put into a saucepan the following: One cup brown sugar, one cup water, one-third cup lard, two cups seeded raisins, one-fourth grated nutmeg, one teaspoonful cinnamon, one teaspoonful ground cloves, pinch of salt; boil together three minutes, then let cool. When cold add one teaspoon soda dissolved in hot water, two cups flour in which one-half teaspoonful baking powder has been sifted. Bake one hour in moderate oven.






