

The Commissioners have been censured for raising the assessed valuation which was demanded of them by the State board. We got in communication with other counties and found they were coming up with their part of the increase which was done to let the state have little more money. We considered it a moral obligation as there will be necessarily more money needed to run a state than a territory. However we stated in making this raise that we intended to lower the levy right through so the taxes would not be higher in the long run, in 1912 than they were in 1911.

The fact of the matter the proposition of protesting to the Commissioners was gotton up by parties who took for granted what they heard was true and circulated certain rumors that would put the Commissioners in a false light before the peo-

Mr. E. B. Kemp stated to the Commissioners that the error in his rendition was due to a mistake of his and no one else. Mr. M. S. Groves stated to the Commissioners that he positively did not authorize any one to make the statements that were credited to him. It is up to the City of Artesia and School Board to lower their levies as others have done.
