

Editorial

Senate bill proposes health care mandate

Fixing the health care problems of this nation will no doubt be a defining issue of the current administration, just as it was during the years under Pres. Bill Clinton. We can only hope that some measure of success comes from this most recent effort.

We recognize there won't be a cheap solution, but some of the ideas that are being bandied about seem to be... well, troublesome at best and the source of additional problems.

Case in point is a US Senate bill that would authorize individuals and families who "refuse" to acquire health coverage to be fined \$1,000 or more.

On the surface it seems like a great idea... identify those who have been draining the health care system, and should they refuse to subscribe to an insurance company's offering, hit them with a heft fine.

The problem is this idea reeks like the old vagrancy laws in which individuals were tossed into jail for the mere fact they didn't have what it took to rub a couple of nickels together. Initially intended to discourage property thefts, in the end the vagrancy laws targeted those hit by poverty and were used to dissuade the economically downtrodden from settling within or traveling through

If you were arrested for vagrancy, you obviously spent time in jail, after-all, if you could post bail you wouldn't have been arrested for vagrancy in the first place.

In the same light, the Senate's idea of "shared responsibility payments," the Democratic majority's euphemism for "get medical insurance, or else," will in many instances target families who don't have health insurance simply because they can't afford health insurance.

These families already find themselves in a no-win situation... either purchase health insurance, in effect "robbing Peter to pay Paul," or not purchase insurance — gambling that their existing financial resources will be sufficient to carry them through a health crises.

While the Senate proposal reportedly will include the possibility of subsidies for certain low and middleincome families, the fact is this bill is yet another federal unfunded mandate, aimed not at lesser government entities but rather at the nation's individuals.







Barber shop celebrates 50th anniversary in Muleshoe

"There are just not many real barber shops anymore," Muleshoe barber Frank Parker of Sanitary Barber shop, which celebrated 50 years in business on July 1, 2009, related recently, remembering the remark a New York visitor to Muleshoe's Mule Memorial made after seeing the striped barber pole in front of the shop.

Of course, there's a good reason for that, due in large part to the decrease that occurred during the long-hair fashions in the 1960-70s.

Frank and Johnnie Parker came to Muleshoe in 1959. Frank had attended barber school in Houston, and along with his brother purchased the barber shop on July 1,1959.

There were four barbers shops in Muleshoe at the time, with a total of 10 barbers working.

In 1959 and haircuts were \$2.

Curtis Smith came to the shop in December 1968 after attending barber school in Lubbock.

For those who aren't familiar with the history of the barber's striped pole, it came from a time in which physicians weren't surgeons, instead leaving such gruesome chores to the local barber, whose bloody rags decorated their shops and eventually marked the location haircuts and shaves were available.

NOTICE DISABLED VETERANS

Disabled veterans in Texas can apply to receive a major property tax break, thanks to some recently enacted legislation, which takes effect this year.

It gives a total exemption on the homestead property for 100% disabled or 100% unemployable veterans.

This is a separate exemption than what veterans currently have. They must apply for the new exemption, and will have to provide proof of eligibility and the amount of their disability rating.
