Important Tax Notices Have Gone In Mail

millions of Texas property owners who receive a notice of appraised value this year from county appraisal districts, pay close attention to it." advised Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, "This notice contains important information concerning your 1986 property taxes." Patterson explained that the

notice of appraised value is designed to inform taxpayers of proposed increases in the appraised value of their properties and the possible effect on their property taxes. "The notice also tells you how to protest the appraisal to an appraisal review board if you disagree with it."

he added. In most cases, a notice of appraised value means that the appraisal district proposes to increase the property's value by more than \$1,000 over its value the previous year. It may also indicate that the proposed value is higher than the value the owner reported on a rendition form, or that the property is on the tax records for the first time in 1986.

Patterson counseled taxpayers to carefully inspect their notices of appraised value. "If the notice shows an incorrect description of your property, or if you simply disagree with the value, it's best to contact the appraisal district as soon as possible. By acting promptly. you can often clear up errors or

Holding Down Clothing Cost

While clothing costs are going up, they may have less of an impact on family budgets than in the past, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

According to clothing special-ist Becky Saunders, 1985 apparel and upkeep prices, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, rose 4.4 percent over 1984.

This is the first time since 1969 that clothing prices increased at a higher rate than prices for the "all items" category, she says.

Women's suits and women's separates and sportswear led the increase in clothing prices. notes the specialist. Only prices of boys' and girls' footwear and mens' coats and jackets declined during the year.

"In spite of the increasing prices, families are actually spending a lower percentage of their budgets on clothing,' Saunders reports. "In current dollars, consumers spend an average of 5.5 percent of their

total expenditures on clothing a related purchases, compared to 7.7 percent in 1972-73."

If you find that clothing costs are still taking too big a bite out of your income, the specialist suggests some advanced planning to avoid wasting money and winding up with a closet full of mis-matched, impractical clothes.

She advises taking inventory of your present wardrobe to determine what can be restyled or repaired before buying anything new.

Then if you still think you need new clothing, establish a plan for the items you need. Indicate how much you are willing to spend and set up a time schedule for buying the clothes.

"If you have the time and the inclination, shopping at outlet stores, at garage sales and rc-sale stores can also save you considerable amounts of money on clothing purchases," Saunders says.

from late May through the fall. The fruit that should be pruchased should have a hard rind, free of bruises and heavy for their size. Mature fruit is uniformly ivory-yellow and weighs two to three pounds.


Cure freshly harvested mature fruits should be stored at 80-86 degrees F and 80 percent relative humidity for 10 days. Store cured spaghetti squash at 50-60 degrees F and at a humidity of near 60 percent. If the stem is loosely attached when fruit is purchased, it should be removed to allow the injured area to heal.

Spaghetti squash is a fresh alternative to pasta for dieters. One three and half ounce serving (100gms.) of spaghetti squash contains only 29 calories compared to 149 calories for the same serving of spaghetti.

Spaghetti squash can be prepared following various cooking methods, or until tender. Then cut into halves and remove, the seed and pulp. Squash can also be steamed by cutting into halves, removing the seeds and pulp, and placing cut side down in a baking dish in two-three inches of water; steam for about 45 minutes, or until the shell yields to pressure. Prior to baking pierce the shell with a fork. Squash can be served simply with butter or margarine and seasoned with herbs and spices. It can be sprinkled with Parmesan, Romano cheese; blended with sour cream; or

served with traditional pasta toppings.

To prepare in the microwave, pierce the rind deeply several times with a sharp knife for stem outlets. Place on paper towel in oven. Microwave until squash yields to pressure and feels soft. Microwave a whole one pound squash on high for four to six and a half minutes. Let stand, covered, for five minutes. Halve crosswise. Scoop out seeds and fibers. Twist out



Mobile Home Summer Survival

Mobile homes lack the ventilated attic space, overhangs and insulation that make it easier to cool a site-built home. But that doesn't mean that mobile home residents have to suffer with the summer heat.

According to Texas A&M. University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring, mobile home owners can make minor improvements that will increase comfort and help maintain reasonable energy costs.

If your mobile home doesn't have large trees shading it, she suggests adding arbors and trellises to support vining plants that will provide shade. Lowcost, easy-to-build trellises are especially effective on east and west facing walls where the summer sun is intense.

When the roof can't be shaded, coat it with a lightcolored or aluminized treatment so that most of the sunlight will be reflected, says Quiring.

To protect windows from direct exposure to the sun, the housing specialist suggest awnings, light-colored or reflective draperies or reflective film for the glass on westfor the glass on west-facing windows.

While home improvements can help, mobile home dwellers should also be aware that their lifestyle will affect cooling costs and summer comfort, says the specialist.

Since running just a few appliances can consume a large part of an air conditioner's capacity, they should be run in the morning or late evening when it's coolest.

When you do run washers, ovens and other major appliances, she suggests shutting the ·air conditioner off and running the range exhaust hood over the stove to exhaust the heated air directly to the outside.

By investing in a fan to circulate air, it will also be possible to set the thermostat between 78 and 80 degrees and still maintain comfort.

On cool nights, the specialist recommends using a large capacity window fan to pull air through your mobile home. Install the fan in a kitchen or living room window so the air will exit there, and open windows in the bedrooms to let the cool night air flow through.



drical fruit four or five inches in diameter and eight to nine inches long with rounded ends. The rind is hard and ivory colored at maturity. The stringy flesh resembles spaghetti when scooped out of a cooked fruit, and has a nutty flavor.

Spaghetti squash is in the cucumber family which includes cucumbers, watermelons, cantaloupes, gourds, pumpkins, and squash. It requires fertile, well drained warm soil. Cultural requirements are basically the same for all vine crops. Plant two seeds in groups about four feet apart in rows about eight feet apart or in groups of three. 8' x 8' (hills). Fruits will mature on vigorous vines about 90 days after seeding. Spaghetti squash is popular in Texas gardens and is grown commercially on the High Plains. It is shipped to Texas cities from California and Florida, too. The fruit is sold year round in supermarkets and specialty grocery stores. Texas grown fruit are on the market





begin hearing protests from taxpayers.

'Again, it's best to file your protest soon after you received your notice of appraised value." advised Patterson. "It makes it easier for the appraisal district to schedule protests and to provide you with information you may need to back up your protest.

Among other information, the notice of appraised value lists the taxing units that tax the property, any exemptions granted for 1986, and value information from the previous year for comparison.

"State law requires the notice to show your estimated taxes for 1986, so that you can gauge the possible effect of the proposed value on your taxes." said Patterson

in mind that these estimates assume that proposed values won't change and that the taxing units actually adopt.

'Most Texas lawns use about 2 inches of water per week during the summer, and most of this usually comes from irrigation." Duble says. "However, as little as 1 inch of water per week can keep lawns alive and green.

Exactly what can a homeowner do to reduce his summer water bill?

"First, water your lawn only when grass starts to show signs of drought stress," explains Duble. "Look for discoloration and wilting. If leaves roll up in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking across the lawn, then water within 24 hours.

"Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it. right," he emphasizes. "Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of funoff.

"When watering, soak the

recommends the specialist. In heavy clay soils, watering for 15-20 minute periods may be necessary to prevent excessive runoff.

"Cutting back on lawn fertilization can also reduce watersays Duble. Applying ing." fertilizer in the spring and fall will generally keep your lawn healthy. Fertilizing during the summer, especially with nitrogen fertilizer, will green up your lawn, but it will also increase grass growth and water use.

"Mowing less often and cutting your grass at taller heights also will help keep your lawn in better shape during hot. dry weather," adds Duble. "St. Augustincgrass lawns do well when mowed at a 3-inch height. and bermudagrass lawns can be cut at a 2-inch height."
