State Aid for Farmers

Under the "Defense" Act just passed by the legislature the Governor has appointed Geo. Cook of Carlsbad and B. P. Williams of Artesia as financial Agents for Eddy County for the purpose of extending aid to worthy farmers with a view to cause the planting of land that would otherwise lie idle.

The Governors letter giving the details of the plan follows.

Santa Fe, New Mexico,
May 15, 1917.

Mr. B. P. Williams,
Artesia, New Mexico.

Dear Sir:

You are hereby appointed financial agent in your county for the purpose of extending to worthy farmers who are unable to obtain seed in any other way. The object to be accomplished is to cause the planting

of any additional acreage of land which would not otherwise be planted, and the seed (and provender if any is furnished) should be distributed only to such farmers as are considered reliable and able to properly plant, cultivate and harvest the crop and who will give security for the return of the money advanced.

It is left to your discretion to distribute the seed in such manner and to such persons as will accomplish the best results, both as to increased production and safe return of the money. It is suggested that you co-operate with the county organization formed for the purpose of distributing seed, or other similar organization if there is one in your county and if not, through such committees or agencies as you think best. Where there is an executive committee or other committee, to pass upon the applications, it would be best

to have approval. It may be necessary in such cases to provide grain, or hay and grain, to feed teams while plowing and planting. The quantity furnished each person to whom seed is loaned should be based upon the quantity required to feed each team for the number of days occupied in planting such seed.

You will take a note for the cost price of the seed (and provender, if any is furnished,) payable to C. R. Brice, State Disbursing Officer, on or before November 30, 1917, and as provided in the form of the note, together with interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, each note to be secured by a mortgage on the crop and such other security, either by including other property in the mortgage, or personal security, as can be had. Blank forms for note and mortgage will be sent you under separate cover.

When you have received a properly executed note and mortgage, you may give the farmer and order for the seed (and for hay and grain, if necessary) upon the dealer or person, or distributing agency directed by the county organization for that purpose, and if no such agency has been selected, upon some reliable dealer who will supply the seed at a fair price. If the seed is not obtainable in your locality, you may telephone or wire Mr. Phil H. LeNoir, Gen. Secretary of the Council of Defense, Santa Fe, stating the quantity and kind required and to whom they should be shipped for distribution.

The order given to the farmer should state the quantity of seed (and hay and grain, if any,) and the price of same. The dealer should make out a draft on the State Disbursing Officer for the amount, which draft, accompanied by the note and mortgage, should be forwarded to the Disbursing Officer direct or through some bank. Have the mortgage acknowledged, if possible before

a Notary Public who will contribute this service for the good of the cause, otherwise include the Notary's fee in the amount of the note, also in each instance where the debt secured and upwards file, and include filing fee in note.

As the time for planting is short, it is urged that you act as promptly as possible, limiting the distribution to those seeds which may still be planted in your county with good prospect of maturing crops.

The amount available for distribution by you is limited to \$1,000.00 unless it should be clearly shown that more is necessary, in which case please communicate such need, giving full particulars, to the General Secretary, Council of Defense, Santa Fe, and it will then be determined whether any more money is available for such purpose.

Mr. George Cook, has also been appointed as financial agent in your county and I would suggest that you communicate with him to determine the respective portions of the county to be covered by each.

I sincerely hope that you will undertake this duty in a spirit of loyalty and patriotism and that you will appeal to other loyal and patriotic citizens for assistance in this work. Every man who aids in such work and every farmer and laborer engaged in the production of food for the people and soldiers of the United States and our allies, will thus be doing his "bit" as well as those who go forth to battle.
