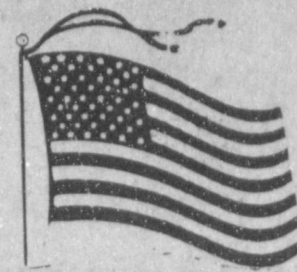

It is very unlikely that Bailey County will be eligible for the new 0-92 farm program, according to Danny Noble, County Executive Manager of the ASCS office.

Girls Coach Asking Help For Tournaments

Muleshoe High School girls' track coach Jerry Johnson, was guest speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday at noon. He was introduced by Dr. Robert Lepard, who was in charge of the program for the day.

Coach Andy Gamble and Coach Ray Donaldson accompanied Coach Johnson to the meeting, where the main topic of discussion was the upcoming track season.

Calling attention to the new track around the perimeter of the football field at Benny Douglass Stadium at Muleshoe High School, coach Johnson said Muleshoe will be hosting track meets here for the first time in several years this spring.

The coach is asking for volunteers, from 30-40 adult volunteers to help conduct the track meets.

For instance, for the High School invitational tournament on March 19-20, workers will be needed for field judges, timers, ending judges, etc. The MHS coach said a clinic will be conducted for workers before the track meets.

Also scheduled in Muleshoe are a junior high school invitational tournament; and two district track meets.

the eighth annual winter agriculture conference at the Bailey County Coliseum Monday.

"The 0-92 program may not be applicable to Bailey County due to the CRP," said Noble. He said the CRP encompasses 323 farms, who have placed 98,471.1 acres in the program. This brings in an average of \$37.84 per acre, for total payments in this county of \$3,741,900 million each year for the next ten years.

Noble said the 0-92 program is a 'bid' program, much the same as CRP or the PIK program. However, once the CRP is taken out of the base, then the mandatory set-aside is deducted, he does not believe Bailey County can take advantage of the new program.

He said information about the program is very sketchy at this time, and is changing almost on a daily basis, much the same as any new program before final guidelines are set down.

In speaking of other programs he said Bailey County not have an emergency, so farmers cannot hay at any time during the year, although grazing may be conducted all year.

He also warned about weeds on CRP land. Noble cautioned producers to keep weeds off their lands. Any land in violation will be cited by letter. If not corrected within five days, the producer loses all government benefits.

For Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District No. One, Jim Lutz gave a slide presentation on the mandatory soil conservation plan for highly erodible land.

He said that by January 1, 1990, all producers must have a plan, and by January 1, 1995, must have that plan in place to stay eligible for farm program benefits.

What works for one farm may not work for another, said Lutz. There are several alternatives on wind erosion as well as water Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

"My name is Larry Cox, and I am publicly announcing my candidacy for the position of sheriff in Parmer County.

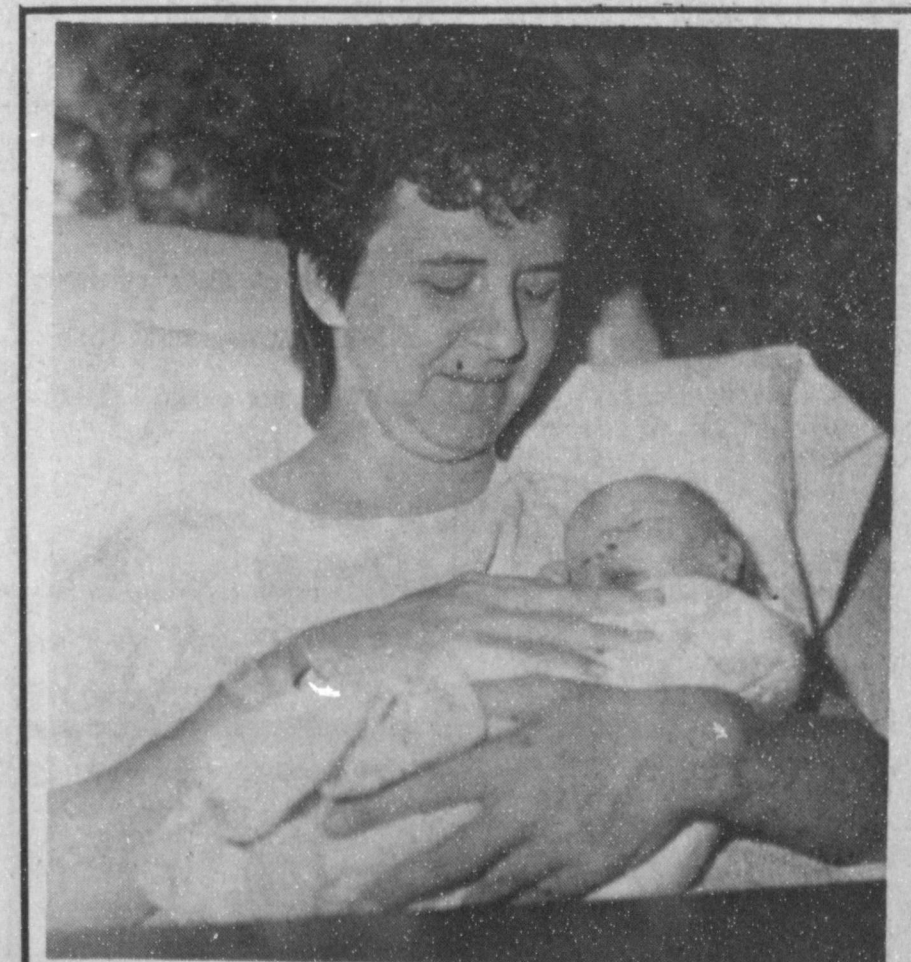
"I have been a resident of Parmer County 27 years, and graduated from Lazbuddie High School in 1973. I attended West Texas State University, Canyon."

CUISINART DESSERT RECIPES

FOOD PROCESSOR TECHNIQUE: MELTING CHOCOLATE

To save a step in many recipes requiring melted unsweetened chocolate, melt the chocolate in the food processor instead of on the stove. Use the metal blade to chop the chocolate with the sugar. Heat the liquid (such as butter, coffee or water) required for the recipe. Then, with the machine running, add 3 tablespoons of the hot liquid through the small feed tube, 1 tablespoon at a time. Slowly pour in the remaining liquid. If the recipe requires melted sweet chocolate, you can chill it well and then shred it rather than chop, but you must switch to the metal blade before adding the hot liquid.

Almost any fresh fruit can be used to make food processor ice cream, frozen yogurt and fruit ice so long as the fruit is cut into 1-inch pieces before freezing. The following recipe is for Fresh Strawberry-Frozen Yogurt; for other flavors substitute an equal amount of other fruit.

To make Fruit Ice eliminate the yogurt. Instead freeze 3 cups of the fruit according to the instructions and add 1 cup chilled fruit with the sugar and lemon juice.

FRESH STRAWBERRY FROZEN YOGURT

4 cups frozen strawberries, ½ cup superfine or confectioners' sugar, 1 teaspoon fresh lemon juice, ½ cup plain yogurt, stirred with a fork

Insert the metal blade and process the frozen berries until coarsely chopped, scraping the bowl and lid as necessary. Add the sugar and lemon juice and process for 10 seconds, scraping the bowl as necessary. With the machine running, pour the yogurt through the feed tube. After all the yogurt has been added, scrape the bowl and process 5 seconds more.

Goodwin, assistant professor of agricultural economics, Texas A&M University, College Station; Dr. Bob Davis, professor of agricultural economics, Texas Tech, Lubbock; Dr. David Bender, Assistant professor of horticulture, Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Lubbock, and Paul Richwine, research associate, Texas A&M Vegetable Research Center, Munday.

Goodwin will emphasize market trends for red potatoes. Davis will discuss competitive potentials for High Plains vegetables. Bender will report results of broccoli variety tests and Richwine will report on chinese cabbage variety performance.

The latest information on multicrop insurance will be presented by Ralph Hunt, insurance specialist with the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Assn., Harlingen. The educational program on hazardous chemicals, mandatory for producers and their employees, will be explained by Dr. Jack Price, Extension agricultural chemist, College Station, and Jimmy Bush, pesticide specialist with the Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin.

Following lunch and a business meeting of the growers and shippers council, Robert Campbell, of Plant Genetics, Inc., Davis, Calif., will discuss biotechnology being used to improve seed potatoes.

Two concurrent sessions in the afternoon will provide detailed information for producers of potatoes and onions.

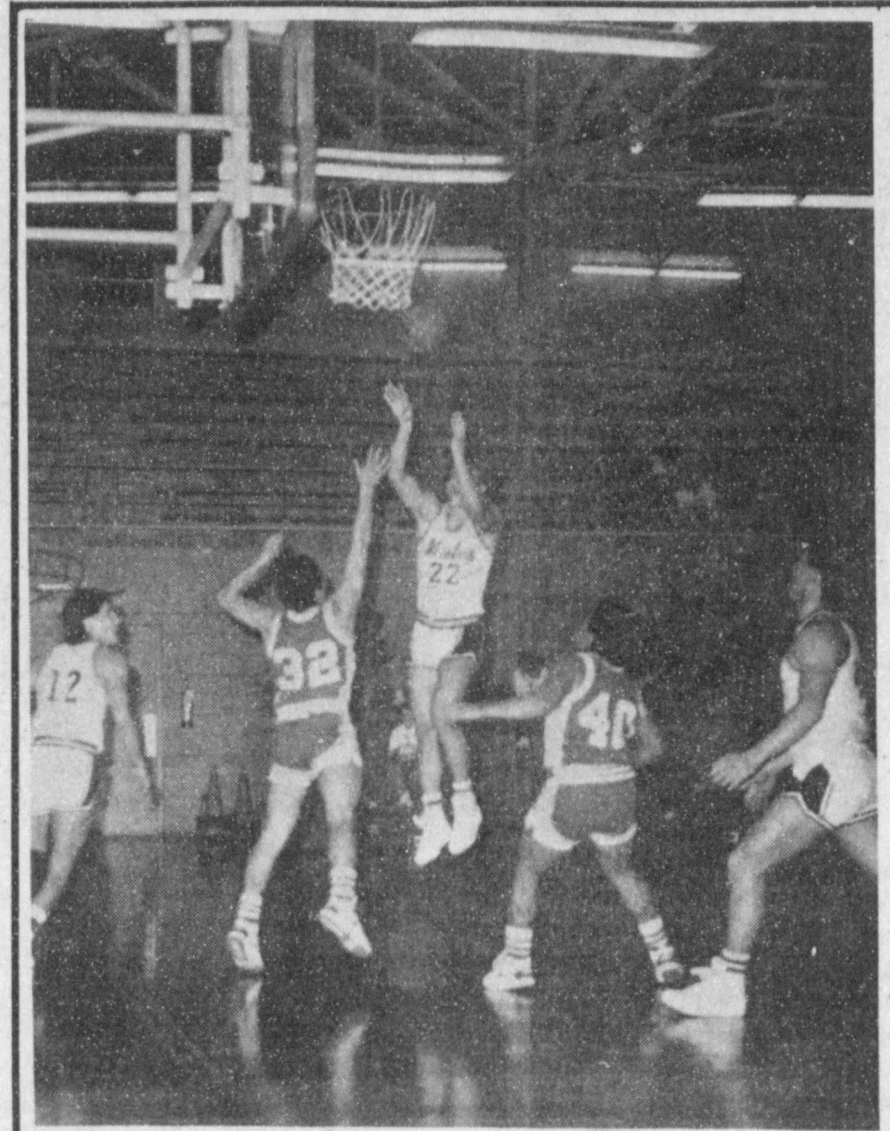
In the potato workshop, Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension soil chemist will discuss the effects of nitrogen fertilization on potato quality. Use of trickle irrigation will be discussed by Dr. Richard Zartman, associate professor of plant and soil sciences at Texas Tech.

How soil compaction reduces potato yields will be examined by Willie Green, Tech graduate student. A report on new potato varieties will be made by Dr. Creighton Miller, professor of horticulture at Texas A&M, and Douglas Smallwood, Experiment Station research associate. Pro-

erosion, so each farm stands on its own, and will have a program to fit its own needs.

For the local FmHA office, Bob Crozier said they have currently received about 25 applications for loans this year, and expect to have about 100 before the loans are all processed.

The loan rate is nine percent on regular loans and six percent on limited resource now, he added.

No funds are available for farm ownership, and FHA expects a cut back in funds again, he added.

Speaking about local bugs and pests, Dr. Pat Morrison, entomologist for the Texas

Agriculture Extension Service, said Bailey County has the dubious distinction of being the first place in the United States that the Russian Wheat Aphid was found and identified.

In 1986, the Russian Wheat Aphid was found in seven states; and in 1987, it was found in 14 states, all the way north to Montana and west to Oregon.

"The Russian Wheat Aphid is here to stay," said Dr. Morrison. "It will not be eradicated from your crops."

In early December, Dr. Morrison said that in tests conducted in Castro County, the Russian Wheat Aphid was found in four of 12 fields.

He explained why 'good bugs' such as the ladybug, has little to no effect on the Russian Wheat Aphid.

He suggested producers start checking for the Russian Wheat Aphid the last week in February or the first week in March. Look for bleached out, curled up leaves, he said. And the longer an insecticide application is delayed, the greater the yield loss of the crop.

"The more stressed the wheat is, the better the Russian Wheat Aphid likes it," he added.

Cotton planting times, and the best seeds to plant were discussed by Dr. James Supak, cotton specialist with the TAES.

In speaking of test varieties, Dr. Supak commented, "Spencer (Tanksley, Bailey County Agent) has one of the better variety test plots on the High Plains," said Dr. Supak.

He also discussed seedling diseases and what to look for, adding, "seedling disease is getting to be a big problem, and is an early problem in the fields. He said chemicals will help with fungi, and pushing the planting date too far back can create problems."

TAES Plant Pathologist Dr. Harold Kaufman, spoke on stalk rot in feed grains, and told of warning signs, and corrective measures to take.

Soil fertility was discussed by Dr. Michael Hickey who told the producers how to take samples for testing. He told the producers what test plots to conduct and where to take all

the samples to get the best overall picture.

Boosting the use of fertilizer, Dr. Hickey said, "Fertilizer will always give a return according to your investment."

Bill Rogers of the Texas Department of Agriculture, concluded the program with a discussion of the new Bailey County Herbicide Laws.

He said that shortly after January 15, a new regulation book will be available by contacting Texas Department of Agriculture, 4502 Englewood Ave., Lubbock, TX 79414. Call 806/799-8555.

The Lubbock TDA office can also give necessary fee amounts and set up mandatory inspections of spraying equipment.

The morning session will stress major vegetable crops grown on the High and Rolling Plains, new opportunities in the market place and techniques for marketing and production that have proven successful.

After a catered luncheon, the potato director of a leading biotechnology firm will trace potato propagation from test tube to farm. Then, two concurrent sessions will focus upon special concerns for the area's two major vegetable crops, potatoes and onions.

The conference has been planned by the Extension Service with the cooperation of the Deaf Smith County Extension Vegetable Program Development Committee, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech University and the High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council.
