This well is being drilled primarily to test out the oil sands in that locality, though present indications point to a flow of 100 to 200 barrels per day. A deeper test hole will be drilled later on to reach the deep oil sands.

The Lincoln Oil Company have been making a readjustment of their casing, and have cemented the bottom of their well. Drilling will cease for a week or ten days for the cement to become thoroughly hard. On resuming they will begin drilling into the oil rock.






