He then dropped it back into the hole with the receding gas and escaped.





After the building had been begun Mr. Faneuil generously decided to make it two stories instead of one. The first story has been used as a market place from the day of completion to the present time.

There has been for many years sentiment in Boston in favor of discontinuing the use of it as a market place, and preserving it as a relic of the time when important history was made. Others think it emphasises its historical importance more by continuing to use it for the purpose for which it has been used nearly two centuries.

The second story of the building was used for town meetings, and it continues yet today to be used for public occasions. It was in the second story of this building that meetings of the enraged citizens were first held to voice their protests against the injustice and oppression of British demands. It is said that the plot to dump the cargo of tea into Boston harbor was hatched in this room, and it was also in this room that the final repeal of the infamous stamp act was celebrated.

When the British army officers were stationed in Boston they had theatrical and swell entertainments in this building. Later on it was used as a recruiting place for soldiers for Washington's army. In 1784 it was used as a place for a public dinner on a grand scale given as a tribute to General LaFayette. The building was used as a harbor for Union soldiers during the Civil War and as a station for mobilized police and state guards during the Boston strike a few years

In 1806 another story was added which improved its architectural appearance. The top story has been used and is still used as headquarters for old military organizations and other societies whose mission is to preserve the historical features of that historical city.

Faneuil Hall is as much revered by the Bostonese as Independence Hall is by the Philadelphians.

The Non-Partisan League program calls for the establishment of a state-owned bank operated along the same lines as the State Bank of North Dakota. The North Dakota law provides that all state, county, municipal, school district and township funds must be deposited with the State Bank and such funds may then be loaned within the discretion of the banking board in any great many boys and girls at one manner such board may see fit. In other words, the state-owned bank, backed by all of the funds collected from taxation, is placed in the hands of a political commission to maintain a Socialist political machine in In North Dakota the State Bank

is subject to no check of any kind and the Non-Partisan League Supreme Court by injunction has prevented the State Auditor from examining the accounts of the bank. Although bonds authorized for the establishment of statement owned industries have never been sold the Industrial Commission, which also controls operation of the State Bank, has used public funds to purchase and construct state-owned flour mills and grain elevators and to finance the operations of the State Home Builders' Association. The privately owned banks in North Dakota have been hard hit by the Non-Partisan League socialist program which has resulted in the withdrawal of outside money there in that state. Where millions of dollars from other states formerly passed through the banks of North Dakota every year practically no outside money is coming into North Dakota for investment today.
