Girl Scout House Renovation Is Explained To Rotary Club

Last summer, Nelda Merriott happened to have a visit with Betty Ashford, who was concerned about the Girl Scout

program in Muleshoe, which had become inactive during the previous year, and had come to a complete stop.

As Mrs. Ashford's daughter, Robin, was interested in Scouting, she formed a troop and gained some 22 members. But, the Girl Scout Little House was in a very sad state of disrepair, and Mrs. Merriott and Mrs. Ashford visited it to see what needed to be done.

Tuesday, at noon, Mrs. Merriott was special guest speaker for the Muleshoe Rotary Club and brought the group up-to-date on what had transpired following that initial visit to the Girl Scout Little House.

They found some of the plywood walls mildewed, a new roof was needed, the carpet rotted in places, a ceiling brace needed plumbing, a commode and lavatory for the bathroom necessary, along with window panes, paint, paneling, sheet rock, air conditioner, tables, chairs, cookware, stove, refrigerator and other items.

So, as she pondered a way to start, Mrs. Merriott thought of the local civic clubs. As the building was city owned, and they provide the water, as well as mowing for the lot, they still did not provide maintenance for the building.

She explained that following many stories by local media, which also included a two-page spread of pictures of the

deteriorating building, money, supplies and labor started flowing in. A new roof was installed, the building was painted, window panes were replaced, screens repaired, a ceiling brace was installed, a room was painted. Donations began to include such as a stove and refrigerator, a table, curtains, silverware, a flagpole, a flag, a couch. This was accompanied by a lot of donated labor by a lot of people.

The carpet which was donated by more than one person will be installed as soon as renovation has gotten far enough along, and a man as volunteered to install the carpet at no cost to

City Sets Two-Hour Parking At Mule Lot

Car Found; Sotelo, Garcia Still Sought

Early this week, Louisiana law enforcement officials notified Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan that they had recovered a vehicle reported to be stolen early on August 3, following a double shooting in Parmer County.

According to the Louisiana officers, the car had been recovered in Livingston Parish, La. and was completely burned.

Still at large is Rene Garcia, 22, of Muleshoe, who is reported to have shot Christi Sotelo, 25, inflicting fatal wounds; and also shooting Tonya Parkinson, 23, who has since been released from Clovis High Plains Hospital.

Uninjured in the double shooting are witnesses Rosa Sotelo Vital, 23 and Hector Sotelo, 12, who escaped in the darkness following the nearly 1 a.m. shooting six miles west of Bovina. They are a sister and brother of the dead Christi Sotelo.

Missing, and unaccounted for since the shooting is 18 year old Ida Sotelo, who was reportedly abducted at gunpoint following the shooting of her sister, and a family friend.

Family members have told officers they have not seen or heard from Ida Sotelo since the night of the shooting and kidnapping.

There have been several reports of sightings of Rene Garcia in Muleshoe, all of them beginning approximately six to eight days following the shooting and kidnapping.

Officers have reiterated, "If you see Rene Garcia, do not approach or accost him in any way," but note where he is, a vehicle description, color and license number if possible, and what direction he is traveling. If he is on foot, where he was when seen, what direction he was moving, and the clothing he was wearing. If at any house in the area, directions to the house, color of the house and other pertinent information, such as occupant of the house and how many people inside, if known.

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is offering a \$50 reward for information leading to the capture of Rene Garcia. Anyone with information is asked to contact the nearest law enforcement officer or agency. Your name will be held in complete confidence.

Tuesday morning, Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan told The Journal that he had spent a major part of last Friday in a plane flying over the entire area where the Sotelos and Garcia were last seen, with no results.

Of more immediate concern to law enforcement officers is the fact that so many people are converging on locations where officers are conducting house searches for Garcia.

Deputy Sheriff Jerry Hicks said, "It really bothers the officers. We get a tip that Garcia has been seen at a house, and officers go to the house to thoroughly check it out. Area residents see all the officers' cars and move in very close. They must realize how dangerous this can be, not only for the officer, but for themselves. In the event of gunfire, they could be caught in a crossfire.

"Also, in many instances, officers could not shoot, if necessary, as people are standing too close to the area we are trying to search.

"We can't stress enough how important it is for people to stay well away from an area we are searching."

It wasn't a long meeting for the Muleshoe City Council Tuesday morning, but it did turn out to be a fairly important meeting.

With unanimous approval of the city council, Ordinance No. 267A is to take effect as soon as signs are erected at the Mule Memorial Lot.

Ordinance No. 267A is "An ordinance adding Section 19-68b and schedule XI of Section 19-70, Chapter 19 of the Muleshoe City Code of 1974, regarding the traffic ordinance of the City of Muleshoe, Texas."

The ordinance has been amended to read Section 19-68. Parking Time Limited on Certain Streets and Public Areas.

b. When signs are erected in a public parking area giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for longer than 2 (two) hours within any public parking area or lot described in Section 19-70 Schedule XI, attached to and made a part of this ordinance. (Ord. 187A, S 68, 9-12-78).

Schedule XI. Parking Time Limited on Mule Memorial Lot.

In accordance with §3c, 19-68b, and when signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for a period of time longer than two (2) hours within that area commonly known as the Mule Memorial Lot.

The ordinance also calls for a penalty, in other words, when a vehicle of any type has been found to be parked for longer than two hours on the Mule Memorial Lot, that vehicle will be ticketed, and the vehicle owner/operator will be subject to a fine.

This particular parking problem has been discussed many times in recent months by the city council, who have added this particular ordinance to the traffic code.

Muleshoe City Manager Dave Marr said signs would be ordered following the city council meeting and erected as soon as they are received by the City. At that time, the ordinance will be effective.

He also explained that the new ordinance will be effective seven days a week, 24-hours a day.

Meeting with council members was Merlyn Neel, manager of Muleshoe Antenna Co.

Although it was not required, Neel explained that with ex-

panding services for subscribers, and increases in rates from suppliers of television stations for the local cable service, Muleshoe Antenna will be raising rates for the first time since 1981.

Effective with October billing, Neel explained that rates will increase for the basic service from \$10 to \$11.25, a \$1.25 per month increase. He also said all other charges will remain the same.

After placing Muleshoe Antenna on the market, Neel said the owners had negotiated with potential buyers, who had 'big city ideas' about Muleshoe. He said the cheapest rate increase proposed by a potential buyer was \$2.95 per month. The owners determined they could make it work for less, added Neel, so the present owners will keep Muleshoe Antenna under local ownership.

In other information, City Manager Marr briefly discussed pending litigation for the city, the Sanderosa Well Field, farming at the airport and a possible lease on the Sanderosa

The enthusiasm and spirit of this group was rewarded by the presentation of four spirit sticks; one for each nightly evaluation.

Along with the technical aspects of cheerleading, the MHS squad also participated in the psychology of cheerleading by being involved in personal evaluations, goal setting and

MEATBALLS

3 lbs. lean ground beef, 1 lb. ground pork, 2 cups cornflake crumbs, 1 cup chopped onion, 1 cup snipped parsley, 4 eggs, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1/4 cup soy sauce, 1/2 teaspoon pepper and 4 Ziploc Microfreez bags.

Combine beef, pork, cornflake crumbs, onion, parsley, eggs, lemon juice, soy sauce, and pepper; mix well. Shape mixture into 128 meatballs (about 1 tablespoon each). Place 32 meatballs in each of the 4 quart-size bags. Seal bags, leaving 1-inch vent in center. Cook each bag in microwave oven 6 minutes at HIGH, or until meat is no longer pink. Carefully open bag to allow steam to escape. Drain. Repeat with remaining bags. Reseal bags and freeze. YIELD: 4 servings.

ORDINANCE NO. 267A AN ORDINANCE ADDING SECTION 19-68B AND SCHEDULE XI OF SECTION 19-70, CHAPTER 19 OF THE MULESHOE CITY CODE OF 1974, REGARDING THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, Chapter 19 of the Muleshoe City Code of 1974 has become inadequate, and

WHEREAS, there exists a need for amending Chapter 19-68 by adding Section b and adding Schedule XI of Section 19-70 of the Muleshoe City Code of 1974.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS: THAT Chapter nineteen (19) of the Muleshoe City Code of 1974 is hereby amended by adding Section b which shall read as follows:

Section 19-68. Parking Time Limited on Certain Streets and Public Areas.

b. When signs are erected in a public parking area giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for longer than 2 (two) hours within any public parking area or lot described in Section 19-70 Schedule XI, attached to and made a part of this ordinance. (Ord. 187A, S 68, 9, 12-78.)

THAT Schedule XI shall be added and shall read as follows: SCHEDULE XI. Parking Time Limited on Mule Memorial Lot.

In accordance with Sec. 19-68b, and when signs are erected giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for a period of time longer than two (2) hours within that area commonly known as the Mule Memorial Lot.

New Heart Medicine Can Reduce Attacks

A drug used to treat chest pain has been found effective in reducing second heart attacks by 50 percent in a group of heart patients who are prone to recurring attacks, researchers at Baylor College of Medicine and eight other North American medical institutions reported today.

The institutions tested the drug, diltiazem, in patients who are considered highly prone to recurring heart attacks. The study results were reported in today's New England Journal of Medicine. Patients in the study had what are known as "non-Q-wave" heart attacks because of the shape of the wave on their electrocardiograms, which account for about one-third of all heart attacks.

There are about 1.4 million new heart attacks per year in the United States, of which 400,000 would be non-Q-wave heart attacks. This is the first therapy ever to be shown to prevent heart attacks in this group of patients.

Robert Roberts, M.D., chief of cardiology for Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital, directed the study.

"Thirty percent of all heart attacks are non-Q-wave, which primarily involve the inner layer of the heart," Roberts said. "Although this usually means less extensive injury, these patients run a 15 to 20 percent risk of a second heart attack occurring within a year."

A total of 576 patients were studied over a four-year period. Half received diltiazem, and the other half an inactive drug (a placebo). Treatment was given 24 to 72 hours after the onset of a heart attack and was continued up to 14 days.

A second heart attack occurred in 9.3 percent of the placebo patients and 5.2 percent of the diltiazem patients--a reduction of 51.2 percent.

In addition, the frequency of severe angina, or chest pain, in patients taking diltiazem was also reduced by 50 percent.

Diltiazem is a calcium channel blocker, which means it helps supply more blood to the heart and reduces the rate at which the heart beats.

"For a muscle in the body to contract, it needs calcium," said Roberts, a cardiologist with Baylor's DeBakey Heart Center. "The blood vessels sending blood to the heart are lined with smooth muscle. A calcium channel blocker opens these vessels even more, so that additional blood is carried to the heart. Diltiazem also decreases the heart rate so that it doesn't have to work as hard."

Until recently, non-Q-wave heart attacks were considered benign and patients were often sent home after a few days. Roberts said it has only been since 1981 that physicians have recognized the vulnerability of these patients for recurring heart attacks and have considered more intensive therapy.

"We now recognize the unique opportunity in these patients to prevent a second heart attack and potentially reduce morbidity and mortality rates," Roberts said. "It would

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
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
