The old saying "distance lends enchantment to the view," applies with no greater force anywhere than to the lives of great men who have passed away. History generously overlooks most of the follies and foibles of great characters. During Lincoln's first term, and during his second term until his death, the vilest names I have ever heard were applied to him. Who would dare to vilify him now? Who would even speak disrespectfully of him?

But Lincoln was not only human but very human. He was also an adroit politician but his methods were peculiarly his own. His ways were not the ways of the ward boss or the city boss or the state He could see far ahead and his plans were laid for the future. His scheme was always to catch his opponents in their own trap.

When Lincoln and Steven A Douglas were rival candidates for the U. S. Senate from the state of Illinois, both had their eyes on the presidency also. In the series of public debates that followed, Dougas (called the "Little Giant") expected by the great force of his ferent oratory and the deftness of his ogic to squelch his uncouth and les oquent opponent.

Lincoln did not attempt any oratorical stunts but he fired questions at Mr. Douglas that made him wince. A less skillful man than Douglas would have "taken the count." A list of questions which Lincoln had prepared to ask Douglas in future debate was submitted to his friend and advisor, Joseph Medill, editor of the hicago Tribune, for his opinion.

Mr. Medill opposed the questions and urged Lincoln not to ask them. Other political friends gave him similar advice.

Mr. Lincoln refused to accept the advice. He said, "Douglas can not possibly answer those questions in a way that will make him both U. S. Senator and president. If he answers in a way that will make him U. S. Senator from Illinois, the south will not support him for president. If his answer is satisfactory to the south it will defeat him for U. S. Senator.



A copy will be mailed to taxpayers who last year filed a return, but failure to receive the form does not relieve a taxpayer of his obligation to file a return on time, on or before March 15, 1922 The form has been reduced six to four pages, two of which are devoted to instructions which should be carefully read by the taxpayer before filling in the blanks.—A study of these instructions will greatly lessen difficulties heretofore encountered in correctly making out the

On Page 1, under the head of "Income" are spaces for reporting the following items; salaries, wages, commissions, etc.; income from part-nerships, fiduciaries, etc.; rents and royalties,; profit (or loss) from business or profession; profit (or loss) from sale of real estate; profit (or loss) from sale of stocks, bonds etc., and other incomes. are spaces for entering deductions, such as interest and taxes paid during the year; losses by fire, storm, shipwreck, or other casualty or by theft. contributions, bad debts, etc.

On page 2 are spaces for entering explantions of the various items; i. e., the total amount of income from business or profession, description ("grocery," "retail clothing," drug store," "laundry," "doctor," "lawyer," "farmer") from rents, and royalties, sale of proper-

Returns are required of every single person and every married person not living with husband or wife, whose net income for 1921 was \$1000 or more, and of every married person living with husband or wife whose net income was \$2000 more.
