

The passage of the Fordney-Mcumber bill through the House of Representatives was followed almost immediately by reprisals on the part of several European countries-formerly our good customers. Spain retaliated by imposing a practical prohibition on the import of our vegetable oils. Switzerland has enacted a retaliatory tariff law against us, and Canada, in a number of tariff acts and proposals, has shown her resentment against the foolish and harmful provisions of the Fordney-McCumber bill. What these countries have done may be expected from others.





The people of Eddy county are entitled to govern themselves and to elect their own officers by a majority of the legally cast votes in this county and without being treated like citizens from Juarez.




