IS IT FAIR TO THE FARM BOY?

In a State where 506,614 occupational workers ten years of age and over are engaged in agriculture, 1.051 pupils are studying first year agriculture, 854 pupils are studying second year agriculture, 481 pupils are studying third year agriculture, and 533 pupils are studying fourth year agriculture. A total of 2,919 pupils are getting some training for agricultural occupations in high schools. The total of boys enrolled in high school is 13,169. The 2,919 who are studying agriculture arc 22 per cent of those enrolled in high school. Practicaly one boy in four of those enrolled in high schol is receiving some trainig in agriculture in this state where seven workers in ten are engaged in agriculpursuits. For the state to train as high a percentage of its farmers for their jobs as it is training of other workers for their jobs the enrolment in agricultural courses must be multiolied by 2, 8,

The ratio of those being trained for griculture to those needed by agriulture in the State is, however, more ignificant. The average tenure on he farm of the 506.614 workers in agriculture is two to four years. If we assume that the average tenure is four years, we then have a demand for 506.614 farmers every four years whereas the high schools are training 2,919. On this basis one farmer in every 173 would receive training for his work in high school.

Farming has become commercialzed nad highly complex. New probems are continually arising with hanging condicions in the social orler. Unless we do a better job of eaching the farm boys with training related to their occupation can we hope to have a self-sustaining agriculture in the United States?

CARLSBAD CAVES PICTURES TO BE SHOWN AT MAJESTIC

Carlsbad Caverns Photographed for the first time. Pictures to be shown at the Majestic Theatre next Wednesday and Thursday May 7-8.

For the first time since the discovery of the mysterious Carlsbad Caverns, twenty miles from Carlsbad, N. M., these vast subterranean chambers have been fully explored by U.S. government expedition and an Interna tional News reel camera has recorded all their awe-inspiring granduer and magnificence. 


