



FOOD FOR THE CONVALESCENT

Food for the invalid is of vital importance, as often the restoration of



en to repair waste tissue. The physician's orders in regard to food should be carefully followed, as the nature of the disease from which the patient recovering modifies the feeding greatly.

In cases of extreme nausea, when milk in any other form can neither be kept in the stomach nor digested, the partly digested drink, koumiss, is a most valuable food to know how to prepare. Its sparkling effervescence makes it especially appetizing and grateful to a starving patient.

Koumiss.-Dissolve half a yeast cake in a half-cupful of warm water-not hot, or the yeast plant will be killed. Mix with it one quart of fresh milk or if the animal heat is gone, warm it to lukewarm temperature; add a ta-blespoonful of sugar. Stir until well mixed with the yeast and the sugar is completely dissolved. Put into bottles, the down the corks, unless using patent bottles with cork fasteners, and let stand in a warm place for twelve hours, for the yeast to grow. Put the bottles upside down; they are not so apt to throw out the corks. After twelve hours place the bottles on ice, and they will be ready to use after a day or two. Use care when opening the bottles to put the neck into the glass, or much of the milk will be wasted by its effervescence. A little practice will enable one to handle the milk with no waste.

Quick Beef Tea .- Broil a slice of thick steak for a minute on each side in a broiler or very hot frying pan. Score it with a sharp knife at right angles, and press with a fork or in a fruit press to squeeze out the juice. fruit press to squeeze out the juice. Season with a bit of salt and serve at

The meat from young animals, such as veal, should not be given to invalids. Young chicken may be served as broth or creamed, and in various ways. Chicken custard is especially good. Use half a cupful of chicken broth, well seasoned, add an egg, and cook in hot water in two small cups. When the egg is just beginning to set remove from the oven and from the hot water.

Parsnip Fritters.-Mash and season vell cooked parsnips, enough to make two capals, then sift together two cupfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix with two well beaten eggs and two cupfuls of milk. Add the parsnips, mix thoroughly and drop by spoonfuls into hot fat. This recipe may be divided if the quantity is too

Pea Soup.—Scald one pint of milk, adding a half-teaspoonful each of salt adding a hair-teaspoonful each of sait and sugar. Melt five tablespoonfuls of butter and add the same amount of flour, cook and add the milk; when thick add a can of peas which have been mixed with a quart of boiling water and mashed to a pulp. Cook in a double boiler fifteen minutes.

Mayonnaise Dressing.—Mix together half a teaspoonful each of powdered sugar and salt, a dash of cayenne, a tablespoonful each of vinegar and lem-on juice and the yolk of an egg. Beat until smooth and thick, then add a little olive oil until a cupful has been used. If the dressing seems too thick beat in a teaspoonful or two of cold water. When ready to serve use a little whipped cream to soften and en-

cream, the juice of half a lemon, salt

rich the dressing. Mayonnaise Tartare.-Add chopped pickles, capers, or olives to a mayon-naise dressing. Use one-quarter of a cupful of the chopped mixture to a cupful of the dressing. Mayonnaise may be colored with the coral of lobster or with spinach green. Spinach or parsley pounded and the juice used gives a very wholesome color.

Garnishes.-Edible garnishes the only ones to be recommended. The custom of tying-up food with ribbon is not to be encouraged. A wedding cake might be an exception; but milli-

nery is not in place on a dining table. Fruit skins, such as bananas, oranges, lemons and apple cups, make desirable receptacles for salads. A variety of colors are to be avoided in garnishing.



LETTERS FRUM FRANCE

(The following letters were received from Ben Russell, Co. B. 111th Field Signal Bn., 36th Div.

Sept. 30th, - Have moved since I wrote you last, what I mean is, we are moving towards Berlin. We had lots of fun getting over here. I had settled myself for a nice sleep in my palatial side door pullman with a big pair of hobnails ir my face and several more distributed over other parts of my body, when we received orders to disembark. We beat it out to our station at some g. m. in the morning with full pack. I had always thought the first sound of the guns would be quite a sensation but the flash of the big guns against the sky and the clouds, the roar of the explosions and the play of the signal rockets didn't get much response.

I can understand now how soldiers in battle pay so little attention to the danger, they are too tired. For three days and nights I slept only a few hours, but believe me I have caught up with my sleeping and eating now. I am sleeping in a billet formerly occupied by Germans, French, English, Russian and American soldiers. Don't think that I have been or am in any danger for I am as safe as you are.

Tell my little girlie that I will not be over here long, the d- Dutch are on the run.

Oct. 4th .- Everything is going fine here except at night when I have to repulse strong attacks from the allied forces of "fleas and cooties." We have a sort of truce in the day time, but of course they don't always observe it and continue the raids in exposed areas. If they don't cease their operations I shall have to get me a can and boil up all my clothes. This will necessitate my

putting them on again wet or wait ing until next summer for them to dry, as the sun never shines long enough to even dry a handkerchief. We are in a pretty good little village with a "Y." Also, it is possible to see a few women and kids. But when a fellow can only say "bonjour" and "finish" there is little satisfaction in conversing with the inhabitants. We have had little time up to the present to learn French and now few of us have any desire to learn as about all we think about in our leisure hours is how soon we can lick the Kaiser and get home.

I have never seen Bab or Bill and fear now I shall not until after "lagenerr finish" and return to God's country. Of course I would love to see gay "Paree," Constantinople and other places of interest, but after this big fuss is settled I am afraid they will hold little interest for me, There are two girls in old Texas that I want to see first of all. Tell my baby girl her daddy loves her and looks at hers and mothers picture every day. I carry her little hand kerchief with me at all times, it makes me feel safer. It has been pretty cool here. Heavy frost night before last. Your own honey bunch was pretty well camouflaged in hay and blankets, so don't worry. In fact I have learned to get along with almost anything and not worry. I heard some Roche planes bombing a few nights ago and it sounded awful close, but we stayed under our blank-

I heard yesterday that Frank Woodell's outfit (111th Engineers) has been over the top. Frank McDonell's company is not far from me, do not know if he is with his company or on detached service. Haven't had time to go see him. It took me two days to learn where I am on the map -and I was considerably surprised when I did learn. 

OF THE PEACE TREATY

SIR ERIC DRUMMOND IS NAMED SECRETARY GENERAL AND COMMITTEE APPOINTED.

ACCEPTANCE IS UNANIMOUS

Express Regret, but Do Not Press Amendments.

Paris.-The covenant of the league of nations in revised form, moved by President Wilson, was adopted by the peace conference in plenary session without a dissenting vote. The president's motion also named Sir James Eric Drummond as secretary general of the league and provided for a committee to inaugurate the league

Thus one of the notable works of the conference passes its final stage and is incorporated in the peace treaty.

The French and Japanese amendments, after a brief discussion, were not pressed and the way was then cleared for unanimous acceptance of the league.

Italy was not represented at the session, but the name of italy appears as one of the members of the league in the covenant as finally adopted Nine labor principles were adopted for insertion in the treaty.

President Wilson was recognized at the ontset for a detailed explanation of the new covenant of the league. His speech was without oratorical ef fect and confirmed the explanation of the textual changes, most of which Belgium, Brazil, Greece and Spain on

the league council.

Baron Makino, head of the Japan ese delegation, in a brief called renewed attention to the Japanendment on racial equality.

Paul Hymans, representing Belgium expressed regret of the Belgian people at the selection of Geneva as the seat of the league of nations, while approving the high aims of the league. How ever, he did not offer an amendment changing the seat of the league from Geneva to the Belgian capital.

Chairman Acevedo of the Uruguay an delegation said he saw in the league a great aid to the realization of Latin-American industrial and com

Leon Bourgeois, former premier, spoke for France. He said that the French amendments to the league including a demand for a national army and pelice force, and the limitation of verification of armaments of all na-tions had not been adopted. France, however, would sign the pact, M. Bourgeois declared.

The South American representatives expressed approval at great length before the covenant was adopted. Dur-ing this part of the afternoon a distinct restlessness was noticeable. Pres ident Wilson walking over to a friend and Premier Lloyd George disappear-

ing from the room.

When the decision was taken. Pres gates and friends, who congratulated him on the constitution of the league, which he had steered past many

Former Kaiser Will Be Tried.

Washington.—Trial of the former German emperor for "a supreme of-fense against international morality and the sanctity of treaties" has been determined upon by the allied and as sociated powers. Holland will be requested to surrender the royal refusee for arraignment before a court emposed of five judges named by the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan. Thus the peace con ference commission on responsibility for the war has solved its most weigh-

COVENANT MADE PART ITALY'S PREMIER GOES WILSON SAYS FIUME HOME FOR CONFERENCE

ITALIAN CIRCLES IN PARIS ARE LESS BELLIGERENT THAN

WILSON UNWILLING TO YIELD

Reports Say Italian Troops Are Pour-ing Into Fiume and That Only Italians Remain.

Paris .- Although Vittorio Orlando, !talian premier, has withdrawn, temporarily at least, from the peace conference and returned to Italy to fer with the Italian parliament, he still is in communication with conference circles in Paris.

The departure of Premier Orlando is defined in diplomatic circles not as a rupture, but as a "suspension of Italian collaboration" in the actual peace conference. It is expected that the Italian delegates remaining in Paris will continue to collaborate on such interallied commissions as the economic council and armistice com-mission and others of like character.

The American delegates, while expressing regret over the controversy with the Italians, seem confident that a settlement will be reached after a conference of Premier Orlando with the Italian parliament.

President Wilson outwardly has displayed ne disposition to yield to the Italians on the question of Italy's as-pirations, and the opinion voiced in American circles is that only through a change in the attitude of the Italians can an agreement be reached.

CANNOT GO TO ITALY

EXPECT ITALIAN DELEGATION THE CONFERENCE.

Paris.—In a statement just issued by President Wilson explaining his po-sition on the Adriatic question, he de-clares that Fiume can not become a part of Italy. He points out that every condition concerning the Adriatic settlement has been changed since Italy entered the war upon the promises of the pact of London, the Austro-Hungarian empire having disappeared. He notes that new states have been created for which Fiume is the natural outlet to the sea, and also contends that the strategic necessity pleaded in behalf of Italy's claim to the Dalmatian islands no longer prevalls, as the Austrian naval menace has ceased

In issuing his official state. nent the Adriatic question President Wilson let it be known that he desired once again to call attention to the fact that there were certain well-de-fined principles which have been accepted by the peoples of the world the basis for a lasting peace. President Wilson's emphatic declaration that he will not yield on the Adriactic question has created the most profound sensation in the peace conference. He has thrown down the gauntlet to the supporters of secret treaties in a manner which almost took away the breath of the dele gates who have been urging compromises on points covered by many se-cret documents and at variance with the president's fourteen points.

President Wilson's sweeping declaration, while aimed directly at the Adriatic problems, also reaches the Kiau-Chau contreversy, in which Japan relies on secret agreements ma with Great Britain, France and Italy in 1917, to support her claim to the concessions held by Germany in Shantung.

The peace delegates generally re-gard President Wilson's statement as a challenge which once for all will dispose of the question whether se-

cret document, of which many nations participating in the war were ignor-ant, are to figure in the peace follow-ing an armistice in which all the allies pledged gave no regard to secret

treaties. Vittorio Orlando, Italian premier has delayed his intended departure for Rome long enough again to sit in conference with the other members of the council of four—Premier Lloyd George, Premier Clemenceau and President Wilson.

MAKE PUBLIC REVISED COVENANT OF LEAGUE

FINAL DRAFT TO BE PRESENTED MONDAY AT PLENARY SESSION OF CONFERENCE.

Washington.-The revised covenant of the league of nations as it will be presented to the peace conference in plenary session has been made public by the state department.

Attached to the text is the hiter-to unpublished "annex" referred to in the covenant, in which are named the 31 states, including the self-governing Brisish dominions, which are to be the original members are all the nawhich declared war on Germany and, in addition, the new states of Czecho-Slovkia and Poland. Those invited to become members by acceding to the covenant are the three Scandinavian countries, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Spain and Persia, and the American republics of Argentine, Chile, Columbia, Paraguay, Salvador and Venezuela.

Mexico was not represented in the conference of neutrals at Paris, and. as was expected, does not appear in Provision is made in the covenant, however, for the admission country which will give the required guarantees, upon a two-thirds vote of the assembly, composed of representatives of the member nations.

The covenant provides that the

league shall act through an assembly, in which each state shall have one vote and not more than three delegates, and a council, comprising for the present one representative of each of the five great powers and each of the four other powers to be selected from time to time by the assembly. Members of each class represented on the council may be increased by unanimous consent of the council and a majority of the assembly.





In boys' and girls' club work prejudice and preconceived opinion, founded on lack of knowledge or misrepresentaon lack of knowledge or misrepresenta-tion, are two obstacles that county agents and demonstrators meet every day. To surmount them is not the easiest task; to convert opposition into hearty support is an achievement calling for unusual patience and tact. That both of these virtues are pos-sessed in large measure by a majority of the extension workers near head. of the extension workers may be ad-duced from the reports constantly coming to that bureau.

A farmer in Maryland had no use

for "book farming." He upbraided his son, a member of a boys' club, for following the agent's instructions in seed-corn selection. He called the test for 100 per cent germination "foolishness," and walked off in utter disgust.
