This week, the Mules travel out of town for the third straight week when they meet the Friona Chieftains on the Chiefs home field. Friona is also 4-1 for the year, having downed Pampa 19-13 last Friday night.

At this time, the Mules have scored 122 points, while giving up 80; and Friona has scored 115 points, giving their opponents 49 points.

Most of the Mules are expected to be physically healthy when they arrive in Friona, but a Muleshoe-Friona game is always full of 'next-door neighbor' rivalry. As this is the first district game of the year, gametime will be at 7:30 p.m. at Chieftain Field.

After five games, the Mules have 212 rushes for 1123 yards, averaging 5.3 yards per attempt. Their opponents have rushed 169 times for 728 yards, an average of 4.3 yards each

In passing, the Mules have made 79 attempts, completing 29 for 469 yards, a 40.8 percent

completion ratio. This is 16.2 average yards each completion. Their opposition has completed 24 of 92 attempts for 425 yards, for a 26.1 completion rate.

The Mules have punted 17 times in the first five games, for 587 yards for an average of 34.5 yards per punt.

Muleshoe has 80 first downs, broken down to 66 by rushing and 14 by passing, while their opponents have 59 first downs, 44 by rushing, 12 passing and three by penalty.

Penalties and fumbles have hurt the Mules. They have 31 penalties for 294 yards and have lost six fumbles. Their five opponents to date have 25 penalties for 230 yards and have lost the ball eight times fumbling.

Individually, Todd Bessire has carried 48 times for 414 yards and received five passes for an additional 158 yards, for a total of 506 yards.

Michael Dunham has carried 64 times for 273 yards, and caught one pass for one yard for total of 274 yards.

Armando Del Toro has carried 52 times for 272 yards, and has received four passes for 61 yards, a total of 333 yards to

Superintendent Joe Hall explained to The Journal that Lazbuddie had only 14 players going into last Friday night's game with Bovina. Two players were injured, joining a previousinjured player, leaving only players for the Lazbuddie

He also said four of the 11 players were only freshmen, so order to prevent further injuries to the players, it was decided to cancel the season.

"We are by far the smallest school in the district," said the superintendent. "We only have a total of 64 students in high school.

"This year, we only had two seniors on the team, and we lost six good seniors from the team at the end of last year."

#### Richelle Watkins Has Ambulance Data For Rotary

Todd Ellis was in charge of the Rotary program Tuesday at noon, and introduced Richelle Watkins, director of the Bailey County Ambulance Service.

She explained that Bailey County had taken over the operation of the ambulance service in this county effective September 15, after it had been operated out of West Plains Medical Center for the past two

Even if the present operators of West Plains Medical Center should terminate operation of the hospital, Mrs. Watkins explained that there will still be an ambulance service in the county, owned and operated by Bailey County.

In the near future, Mrs. Watkins, said they expected to have charges for use of the ambulance in line with what medicare would commonly pay for the ambulance. Although the ambulance is still based at the hospital, it is totally separate from the hospital.

At this time, the ambulance is operated by three fulltime employees and four part-time volunteer employees, all of whom are licensed EMT's, or in one instance, a paramedic.

The ambulance director also said an Emergency Care Attendant Class (ECA) will begin around October 21. It will be 11 weeks for 44 hours, with classes being conducted on Tuesday and Thursday nights, conducted

However, he is NOT and has never been a member of the Westworld Community Healthcare Governing Board for the hospital -- and in fact, no local doctor is now, or has ever been a member of the board. No doctor has been invited to be a member of the governing board, he added.

According to the doctor's explanation, he goes into the governing board's meeting, is there just long enough to read the minutes of the doctor's staff meeting, then immediately leaves the meeting.

'That is my sole connection with the governing board," he said, "I never even sit down."

Mason residents have responded well to their hospital's appeal for more business, says the hospital's administrator. "It's really been a positive

maybe not overwhelming, but a positive - response," said Mason Memorial Hospital administrator Dean Leiser. Leiser told the community, in

letter printed in June in the local newspaper, that Mason residents need to use the local hospitals as much as possible, instead of traveling to other cities for basic care.

"Without this support, the primary health care system in Mason cannot survive," Leiser said in the June 30 letter

He also said the cost of emergency room, outpatient and nursing home care would increase. Surgical, obstetrical and other special care would no longer be offered, he said.

The hospital consolidated some areas of service, such as dietary service and the business office, in July, Leiser said.

With those expenses down and an increase in hospital use, the hospital has been able to keep the monthly loss well within the corporation's \$40,000 limit, Leiser said. The hospital previously had lost \$100,000 in two months.

The hospital is licensed for 18 patients, and it had nine patients on Thursday. The hospital averaged one patient a day in 1985, and this month the daily census has been two or more, Leiser said.

"It's doubled in other words," Leiser said. "I know it's easy to double one, but it's a significant increase.'

Leiser said he is working to establish a half-day clinic each week, in which specialists from Fredricksburg would travel to Mason to see patients.





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

## Wolverines Expected To Beat Michigan State

When it's football season, it is very difficult to be in another university in the same state with the University of Michigan. The Spartans of Michigan State have been in this rather uneviable situation for at least 78 years. At least that's the number of times the two football teams have faced each other. Michigan State has lost 51 of these encounters, tied 5, and won 22. The most Spartan victory was in 1984, 19-7. Normalcy returned last season as the Wolverines zapped Michigan State 31-0. But State is looking to make 1986 the year of The Win. The common opponent has been Notre Dame. Michigan edged Irish in its opener 24-23 while the Spartans beat Notre Dame 20-15 the following week. The game is in Ann Arbor .. another crowd of probably 105,000 or more .. and probably another Michigan victory.

On the West Coast, Arizona and U.C.L.A. won't play to quite that large a crowd-though in the Rose Bowl it might be close-but it will be the second key conference game in two weeks for the Bruins. They

hosted Arizona State last week. The wildcats, though they're unbeaten and have rolled up 139 points in their four wins, like to associate with the upper U.C.L.A. slipped by Arizona 24-19 last season, but we think the untested Wildcats are going to pass this test Saturday.

One of the features of every football season has been the clash between Oklahoma and Texas. This year's game in Dallas may not have the lustre on both sides - just the awesomeness of Oklahoma. It looks very one-sided for the Sooners.

Brief look at the ferecasting percentage: our average, through games of Saturday, September 27th (which was Bad Day at Black Rock) is .739 based on 553 right, 195 wrong.

There are two biggies in the Southwest Conference where host Baylor will be favored in a close contest over S.M.U., and Arkansas entertains Texas Tech. The Razorbacks should win.





COLLEGE STATION - A vaccine to protect shrimp against one of the most common marine diseases has been successfully developed by Texas A&M University researchers, pushing the feasibility of Texas shrimp farming - and the jobs it would create - one step closer to reality.

"In today's market, you can sell all the shrimp you can get. With proper development, the Texas Gulf Coast could become one of the world's foremost saltwater farming centers," said veterinary researcher Dr. Don Lewis, who headed the team that developed the antibacterial solution.




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
