The children should be divided into teams, and take turns in preparing, serving, and clearing away the lunch. Cafeteria service should be practiced in order to reduce the work to the minimum The question of supplies may be settled in two or three ways. They may be brought from home by the children themselves, donated by members of the community, or purchased with money set aside for that purpose by the school board, brought from home by the children or raised by school entertainments. The results to the health of the child are so beneficial, and the effort on the part of the parents, local leader and the teacher is so comparatively slight, that every school, especially in the rural communities, should start a hot lunch club as soon as the coming school year opens. Immediately afterward the was passed as an effort to profit by our mistakes of the past; and the realization by the American people of the necessity for preparedness for national defense and of the plans being made therefor is as sacred an obligation as is going to the polls and voting.

> After considerable study, the President and his Cabinet have decided that we, as a people, could not more fittingly observe the anniversary of the Battle of St. Mihiel than by holding appropriate ceremonies in celebration of that great victory and by testing the plans so far prepared by the war department.

The test has nothing to do with any militaristic program, policy or propoganda. It constitutes no obligation upon the civilian participants to enlist in any organization or to make any contract for military service. It means simply taking stock of ourselves and a pledge that should we ever again be called upon to go to war in defense of this country, we shall not be found in such a state of utter unpreparedness as existed before, in 1917.

The fundamental objective of the defense test is: To interest citizens and local communities in our defense plans and to acquaint them with their part therein. The best means of insuring this objective is to secure as many citizens as possible in the Defense test demonstration. It is sincerely hoped that September 12th will be observed by patriotic demonstrations in every city, town, and community in the whole United States.

everal shallow wells they have a contract to drill in the Bell well area. The first well is now down 150 feet and so everything is working smoothly an early completion is expected. As this well is being drilled on

proven acreage there is a feeling of absolute assurance among the people interested that good paying production will be secured in this and all other wells drilled in that immediate vicinity as the Original Bell well showed conclusive evidence of paying production in the shallow sand at

52-658 feet. In addition to that sand another good sand of about equal thickness vas encountered about ten feet below, but not tested as the hole was full of water. It is believed that the two sands may merge together in ome direction from the original well in which case a very big produc-tion may be readily expected .-- Pecos Enterprise.
