
PLANS STILL GOING FORWARD ON ALFALFA FESTIVAL OCT. 1-2-3

ROADS AND TRAILS WILL BE BUILT TO PROTECT SACRAMENTOS FROM FIRE

AIAMOGORDO. - J. F. Mullen, United States forest inspector for New Mexico and Arizona in company with Supervisor O. Fred Arthur spent the week in the Sacramento mountains going over the area seriously damaged by the windstorm of December 10. The object of the inspection was to formulate a program for the building of roads and trails into the area to more adequately protect it from forest fires. It is estimated that timber amounting to a quarter of a million dollars was blown down by the storm, making a hazardous fire siutation.

Thee forest officials state that a program will be outlined soon for road and trail construction and will cover a

three to five year plan. The El Paso and Southwestern railroad, the State Land Commission and the Southwest Lumber company, all of whom have extensive timber holdings in this section will cooperate with the forest service in protecting against forest fires.




