Proper store location is one of the most vital problems of retailing and upon its solution depends in a large part the success of the venture, the Domestic Commerce Division says. A good location is frequently a store's best asset, while a poor location may be the cause of failure when sound





#### FEDERAL FORECASTS ARE FAR IN ACCESS OF REAL PRODUCTION

NEW ORLEANS LA. - Warning against the depredations of cotton speculators has been issued by commissioners of agriculture in five southern states in an appeal to growers of cotton to do their selling with the utmost care in order to realize a worth while profit.

It is pointed out now that cotton brings but little more than it costs to produce and the government census indicates that the available supply will barely meet the needs of the world this year.

The selling of cotton at a cheap price not only results in a loss for the farmer, but means a handicap to other growers who also are forced to sell at a low figure, it is said.

The commissioners agreed that the government forecasts of cotton production are fare in access to the actual crop and the various agencies inimical to the cotton farmer have seized upon these forecasts to hammer down the purchasing price to far below the cost

## WASH REFRIGERATOR THOROUGHLY



(Prepared by the United States Department | should be cleaned as

The refrigerator should be thoroughly cleaned about once a week, at a time when it contains only a little ice. says the United States Department of Agriculture. Remove the ice and all the food. Take out the racks, wash them in hot water containing soap or soda, rinse, and wipe dry. If possible, remove the drainpipe, scrub inside with a long-handled spiral brush or swab, and scald. If the pipe is not removable, it should nevertheless be thoroughly cleaned out, for it may contain not only solid matter from the melting ice, but also slime formed by the organisms that thrive in such a dark, cool, moist situation. The small trap in the drainpipe should also be cleaned, and the drain pan washed and scalded. Wash the inside of the refrigerator with hot water containing soap or soda, rinse, and dry thoroughly. A small pointed stick like a skewer may be used to clean the corners and seams.
