### Farm Labor Is Short More Pickers Needed

A serious shortage of farm labor is now apparent as a result of the cotton picking opening up. It is estimated that there is now approximately half enough help to gather the crop on time. Efforts have been made to get additional help but of little avail. Orders placed by the local farmers at the various state employment agencies have brought some help, but more pickers are needed.

Some of the cotton growers are scouring the country for help, but the present demand has not been supplied. The price paid for picking has been raised, ranging around \$1.75 per hundred pounds. The raise, however, has had little effect on the present labor

#### STATE TAXES HAS LOST NEW MEX. MUCH MONEY ON BONDS IS CLAIM

On August 31, 1924, the books of the state treasurer showed that there funds in twenty failed banks. The total amount of state funds in thirty banks which failed during 20 months prior to August 31, was \$1,062,260.90. secured by surety bonds. During that 20 months the deposits in 10 banks were recovered. The recoveries were \$374,961.92 from surety companies; \$631.92 from personal bonds. This

Add enough water to the sponsibility for adequate fire preven- mixture to make a damp, crumbly mash. A good mixture will be wet, but will scatter in uniformly small flakes. The arsenic may be added evenly by sifting through a bit of fly screen, working in with a shovel until it is uniformly mixed. Scatter at the 8-28-tfc rate of from 20 to 25 pounds to the acre, covering the ground with a very thin, even coat.

Since grasshoppers feed most readily on bright days when the temperature reaches about 75 degrees F., a fresh supply of bait should be available between the hours of 11:00 A. M. and 1:00 P. M. Since the amyl acetate used to attract the grasshoppers, evaporates quickly, it is not desirable put the bait out too early.

Care should be taken to use a good grade of coarse wheat bran, as the use of shorts causes the mixture to ball, making even distribution impossible. As there is enough poison in two pounds of the mixture to kill a three year old steer, it is important to scatter the mixture thinly enough so that chickens and stock can not get it. A few flakes to the square foot is sufficient to poison the grasshoppers.



Its complete plan to acquire control of the El Paso & Southwestern system, and through the Arizona Eastern, one of its subsidaries, construct extensions in Maricopa, Yuma and Pinal counties, Arizona, together with its proposed financing arrangements, were given the approval of the Interstate Commerce.

The new construction of the Arizona Eastern will total approximately 175 miles and will connect the Southern Pacific lines with the Arizona Eastern. This connection, with the connection of the Southern Pacific lines with the Rock Island system, will constitute a double track route from Chicago and Missouri River territory to Southern California.
