The discovery of 28,000 acres of base lands, worth \$84,000 made by the investigation of three out of every ten state comptroller's office of the State Land Office, will more than repay the state for the entire cost of the comptroller's office for the present year, according to information here today.

top of the revelation, made through the Federal Trade Commission, that the Aluminum Company of America stands charged with being a monopoly, cited for unfair trade practices, comes the revelation that the Company received from the Government in 1923 the sum of \$15,589,641.39 on who accompanied Mr. Baca. It was an amortization claim covering the years of 1918 and 1919.

That this huge settlement was disclosed during hearings of the Senate Couzens' committee investigating the Treasury Department is called to attention by Representative Lamar independent investigation of the ac-THE OFFICE ON TUESDAY TO IN- tivities of the income tax bureau of the War Department.

Mr. Jeffers shows that this settlement is ten times more than even the Aluminum Company itself originally claimed to be due it for amortization on its war contracts with the Government, but the claim was subsequently increased to about \$18,000,000, of which the Treasury Department allowed nearly \$16,000,000.

This huge claim was allowed in land books in the recent audit by the June, 1923, more than two years after Mr. Mellon became head of the Treasury Department.

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



Only a few days ago a prize of \$50 was awarded a country school in Virginia for an exhibit made at the county fair. The second school also won a substantial reward. In other counties of this State and in many other States boys' and girls' clubs organized in the country schools have been winning prizes at the county fairs. At practically all the State fairs the boys and girls are being richly rewarded for the exhibits made by their corn and canning clubs, their pig and poultry clubs and for the showing they are making through many other clubs organized in the schools. But the many prizes are not the only rewards. The club which does not win may be worth thousands of dollars to the community in which it has aroused new interest in farm activities. Many a future farmer will date his success to the work begun by him in the farm club while in the elementary school or the high school. carrying out his projects on the old home place. The many thousands of boys and girls who have made the club movement so successful know that theirs is not a dreary life and that farm work is not drudgery. Many teachers can testify that the pupils most interested in their club projects are the ones making most satisfactory progress in their studies.
