The results of this test, which were very gratifying has already been publish-So far as known a commercial fertilizer has not been tried in this community, but cotton growers who watn to enrich the land to increase the production are becoming interested.

The matter of a commercial fertilizer has been brought to our attention by P. P. Mann, who formerly was a successful cotton grower in the east. Mr. Mann states that practically all the farmers of the cotton land in the section of his former home enriched the land by a fertilizer and he believes that it could be used in the Valley with success.

Several additional producing wells will be ready to turn into the pipe line when completed. The Picher interests have informed us that they expect to shoot their No. 1 in Sec. 12-18-27 soon and will also begin active drilling on their No. 2 located 250 feet from the SE corner of the

Drilling wells in the valley now extends over the territory covering more than 100 miles in length, which includes the two new locations north of Roswell, south to the Blue Bird well near Carlsbad.



WE HAVE THE DROP ON SCARLET FEVER

Within the short period of a year, the research workers have discovered the germ that causes scarlet fever and have developed a vaccine to prevent it and serum to use in treating it. There is also a simple skin test for determining whether a person is immune. One of the prominent manufacturers of biologicals is putting these products on the market. So that the health officers may obtain

them through the regular channels. Children may be protected against scarlet fever in much the same manner as they are now being vaccinated against diptheria. We are hopeful that a few years may see scarlet fever declining as rapidly as diptheria is now doing in many of our

Meanwhile, we have even stronger grounds for enforcing the regula-

tions for the control of this disease, @ since we know that the infection can be carried in the nose and throat, both by the sick and well. Since children are susceptible to scarlet in greater proportion than adults, it is reasonable and proper that persons exposed to the disease should not mingle freely with children.
