

STATE BRIEFS

BODY OF MAN SAID TO BE JOHN TEAL HELD AT CLOVIS

On the order of Sheriff H. A. Douglas, of Muleshoe, Texas, the body of a man supposed to be that of John Teal, alleged murdrer of Miss Evelyn Monts, Bailey County school teacher, is being held in the undertaking establishment of C. V. Steed in Clovis, pending further investigation. The body was brought to Clovis Tuesday after a hearing in Muleshoe the first of the week in which there was a deference of opinion as to whether or not the dead man was really John Teal. Brothers of Teal stated emphatically it was not he, while Texas sheriffs and others believe it is the man who was accused of killing Miss Monts in 1918.

In the spring of 1918 this part of the world was shocked by the news of the cold blooded murder of Miss Evelyn Monts, a school teacher in Bailey county. John Teal, a rancher and owner of a bunch of horses was accused of the crime. The story read that Teal and Miss Monts had been to a neighborhood Sunday afternoon gathering; that he escorted her home in his car and after a short conversation at the gate had ruthlessly shot her down. He jumped in his car and disappeared.

Notwithstanding the efforts to capure Teal he apparently disappeared into thin air until the story came of the killing of a man at Calexico, California, about two weeks ago, who was shot while resisting arrest-this man bearing such a resemblance to Teal that officers are claiming the big reward offered for him, 1605 to 1650 feet-grey sandy lime dead or alive. When information was 1650 to 1665 feet—red sand received relative to the death of the man alleged to be Teal, Sheriff L. L. Campbell of Sweetwater, Texas, went there and brought the remains to Muleshoe for further identification. Sheriff Campbell was well acquainted with Teal and it is said he is positive the dead man is the slayer of Miss Monts. The body will be held in Clovis pending further identification and orders from Muleshoe officers.
