ROSWELL MAN TO BUILD AN OIL REFINERY



Standfield was the third witness here on business Tuesday. called. Standfield said he was present near the scene of the fight between Justus and Fields and was standing by a car. He heard Justus curse Fields and heard the deceased accuse Fields of stealing his liquor. The first time he observed Justus after the fight, he was lying on his back, propped by the left elbow. He was excited he said and was not positive of what occurred but he though Fields had one arm and leg over the body of Justus. The fight, he said, must have occurred about ten or twenty feet from where he and Kessinger stood. He helped Justus get into the car and said that it was his opinion that Justus might bert Nihart. have walked unassisted, although both Fields and Justus were drunk. He said he did not see any blood from Roswell where he has been on running from the ear of Justus and did not remember of having seen any good sized stones near where the fight occurred, neither did he see Fields hit Justus with a stone. came home Saturday. When asked if he had been drinking, he replied that he was pretty drunk. After that fight had occurred he and Fields rode in the car for about an hour. After Justus had been placed in the car, he was taken to the pump station and washed up, but his condition was not considered serious. When asked a further question whether or not be observed any large rocks near the place when the fight occurred, witness said he saw several fair sized rocks. Kessinger is understood to have identified the rock, which was used on Justus, after his death, but said that since he had studied over the situation, what he told the officers about the rock might not be Tesimony of Jack Minnix.





# **NEW MEXICO STOCK** MEN HAVE LIGHT LOSSES THIS YEAR

In spite of the fact that the state has had one of the dryest years in its history, the losses of all classes livestock are reported by the stockmen as being small. This was due to a mild winter, and a heavy movement of stock from depleted pastures. The losses among horses amounted to 17 per 1,000, compared to 12 last year, and 17 for the 10year average. Cattle losses were reported at 50 per 1,000, compared to 40 last year, and a 10-year average of 53. Sheep losses were 55 per 1,000, compared with 45 last year, and 66 for the 10-year average. The condition of the several classes of livestock expressed as a percentage normal as of May 1, 1925 and 1924 respectively were: Horses, 90-92; cattle, 73-85; sheep, 85-93; and swine 93-97. These figures show that our stock were not in as good condition as they were one year ago, but it is remarkable that this con- gram. dition could have been maintained, and heavy losses prevented, when it is as seen that the ranges were only 40 per cent normal, compared with 82 per cent on May 1, 1924.

HUNGER'S EFFECT ON THE BRAIN IS ASCERTAINED .-Feed a rat an imperfect or insufficient dlet and you sharpen and John F. Anderson, who reported their experiments to the American Psychological association, put a number of female rats into a maze and noted the time they required to effect an exit. Those which had been partially starved were quickest to find their way to freedom and food, and similarly the poorly fed rats won the race to different maze. When all the rats were given normal rations again they were equally adept in solving the puzzle. The experiments indicate that habit formation is akin to psychological processes in the body. according to Drs. Smith and Anderson, and the results of these will be presented to the American Psychological society.

"The normal functions of the organs concerned with the process of habit formation are interfered with by the same alterations in nutritive conditions as have been found to bring about the well-known disturbances in metabolism, growth and reproduction."

### How Sense of Smell Guides the Insects

Smell in insects, much more highly developed than in man, seems to play a leading part in the guiding of their destinies. In the annual report of the Smithsonian Institution, Dr. N. E. McIndoo shows that among bees, while each individual may have its own odor, it is probably a combination of these that gives the hive odor. the recognition of which is a ruling power, and insures that the colony will hold together and be united in protection against interference from without. Associated with this or a part of it is the queen odor, which tells that all is well within the colony, the queen being present. The organs by which these odors are recognized have been traced to small pores. These are scattered or grouped on the body, and each pore, often protected by a hair, represents a nerve ending. In their power of discriminating between foods, greater than in man, bees and other insects are believed to depend upon smell rather than

### How Katydids "Talk"

The loud shrill noise of the katydid is made only by the male and is produced by raising and lowering the wings. Pathfinder Magazine reports. The noise-making organs consist of transparent drum-like structures at the base of the wing covers. The sound is produced by friction. The katydid is seldom heard except at night, although occasionally he is heard in the daytime. The noise made in the daytime differs from the night note. He is heard most frequently in the early evening. The notes suggest "ka-ty-did." Hence the name. Following each shrill "katy-did" there is a pause of several moments. The female answers with a chirp. Katydids belong to the grasshopper family.

# as Weather Prophets

Can meteorologists, even with the aid of wireless, forecast weather with more accuracy than country folk who short stay at Albuquerque. watch nature's own barometers? If vigorously, or stand with their tails to the wind the countryman will tell you it is going to rain and his prediction is invariably correct. If the fowls come out to feed on a wet morning there is little chance of it clearing up that day, says the Flower Grower. The appearance of toads, frogs and earthworms in unusual numbers invariably means rain, and so do the singing of blackbirds, the falling of soot or the creaking of furniture. If frequently or the house sparrow keeps to the ridge country residents prepare Texas. for rain, though if birds' frequent the eaves they will confidently prophesy

fine weather. Storms from the northwest or southwest are usually brief, but a storm from the northeast is likely to be long and severe. A veering wind brings barometer. Their significance is based upon the observation and experience of centuries, and the forecast made from them is quite as reliable as any issued from the meteorological observatories.



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

### LIME-SULPHUR SPRAY BEST WINTER REMEDY

The standard lime-sulphur solution has been the most generally satisfactory winter spray for fruit trees for many years. This spray has the advantage of killing insects and plant diseases, and thus combines insecticidal and fungicidal effects. It is a fool-proof spray for dormant use, and there is practically no danger of injury to the trees, according to the entomologists here.

Lime-sulphur may be purchased from commercial insecticide dealers or It may be made at home. In a number of communities one grower has constructed a cooking plant in which he prepares concentrated lime-sulphur for all of the growers of his community. The plant consists essentially of a small boiler and a cooking vat. In many cases the boiler of a gin or sawmili already present on the farm is used. The cooking vat is usually an ordinary 50-gallon barrel. Neither the plant nor the process is complicated, and a community of growers can make the lime-sulphur for considerably less than it can be purchased commercially.

The strength of the concentrated lime-sulphur solution is determined by a hydrometer, usually termed the Baume test. Solutions sold by commercial dealers usually test from 32 to 34 degrees Baume, and recommendations for dilutions are based on this strength of solution. Growers who use the homemade solution should test the concentrated solution to determine how much water to add.

### Control Grape Diseases

### by Pruning and Spraying tesia Advocate.

Black rot and anthracnose are two diseases that cause trouble to those who are growing grapes. These diseases not only attack the fruits and leaves. but also infect the twigs and stems, as well. The fruits and leaves are usually disposed of through picking and the forces of nature, but, unless will remain on the vines, and will subsequently cause widespread dissemination of the diseases when new growth begins. By studying the existing conditions one can readily see that sanitary measures are the best means for keeping down these diseases, says Dr. W. D. Moore, extension plant pathologist of the Clemson college, who suggests the following plan of work in the grape vineyard for this winter;

Prune the vines in the proper manner, but see that every arm and twig that looks diseased is cut out. The diseased parts are easily detected by the rough sunken and torn places in the bark. After pruning is completed, rake up all fallen vines and twigs and burn. Don't throw them in ditches or clean out all leaves and trash from around the vines. This can hest be done with a good hoe. When the ground will do to plow, turn the land thoroughly in the vineyard, as this will bury thousands of small twigs and leaves that could not otherwise be disposed of. Then, just before the buds begin to swell in spring, spray the dormant vines with a bluestone solution of 31/2 pounds of bluestone to 50 gallons of water.

### Severe Pruning Produces

### Better Growth of Trees

Severe pruning only seems to produce a better growth of the tree because the growth is concentrated in a few strong, succulent shoots, near the cuts. This excessive growth in the tops is made at the expense of the lower part of the tree, both because the shoots get more than their share of the food and because they shade out the lower growth. The result is that the number of growing points in the tree is greatly lessened and, as a consequence, the total growth of the tree is diminished. It is for this reason that pruning dwarfs a tree. On the other hand, the tree that is pruned lightly has few, if any, succulent shoots, but the growth is distributed all over the tree in a very large number of growing points. Thus the total growth of the tree is increased and at the same time the growth of the individual twigs is lessened, so that the tree comes into young or early bearing.

### Incomplete Fertilization

A few years ago nobody would have thought of improper or incomplete fertilization of peach blossoms, Quite recently the New Jersey experiment station has shown that there are some relationships between peaches. It has been shown, for example, that the J. H. Hale peach requires cross-pollination for good fruit production, Apparently there are other varieties that are benefited by cross-pollination but it will take time to tell the entire story. Greensboro seems to be self-fruitful.





"Immature and undersized pullets are the cause of low egg production in many flocks," continues Halpin. "Some people try to make themselves believe that they have a flock of good-sized pullets by weighing the largest ones. A pullet which is under-size or immature will not lay enough to be profitable. What one man considers a small pullet, may be considered large enough by another man. But there are standards of weight which are about right for egg production."

The time which the chicks should be hatched depends upon the man who is doing the feeding. Chicks under one man's care may mature much earlier than under the care of another. Pullets should be matured at a time when they will come into laying in the early winter months when egg prices are highest, advises the poultryman.

Cure Egg-Eating Hens

To stop hens from eating eggs provide plenty of oyster shell and feed the scratch grain in the litter, so the hens will be kept busy as much of the time as possible. Feed a balanced ration containing plenty of meat food-20 per cent-and darken the nests so the hens will not be so likely to see

ing receipts will exceed expenditures. This estimate by the director greatly exceeds his prediction made last Autumn of \$67,000,000 surplus. He attributed the increase to heavier revenue returns and receipts of the postoffice department.

Looking ahead to the coming fiscal year, the budget director predicted a surplus of \$373,000,000, the figure on which administration and congressional leaders are basing their estimates as to the possible extent of tax reductions.

Director Lord told Mr. Coolidge that the government's example in curtailing expenditures is being reflected in various states.

Hope for future tax reduction now lies principally with the states and lies municipalities he said, pointing out that two-thirds of the tax burden is due to their levies.
