There were a few speeches and everything passed off smoothly. To a stranger it may have seemed a rather strange pro-But those who had their ear to the ground, know that there was

behind it all a strong and growing sentiment. In fact, there was a tensity of nerves that was well concealed and we believe that for the good of the future town, that cause should be shifted to the bottom.

The town of Artesia can not afford to let misunderstandings grow. Neither should the visitors council such feelings, for nothing has ever been accomplished where a spirit of animosity prevailed. We of the town must be equal to the task of creating harmony and good will with the new people who come here to live.

We have given thousands of dollars to advance the importance of our city. We should be glad to give ourself to tactfully carry out the offices of administration. All of us, we believe, realize that it is no bed of roses to deal with the rapid strides of growth which our city is having, but certainly our officials are not going to allow a spirit of animosity to be fostered, which might, at this early stage of our new development, go so far as to keep back our rapid industrial progress.

The Advocate does not for a moment countenance lawlessness, and neither do we believe any of our citizens, old or new, have any desire to see our city grow less law abiding. But we must realize that we have problems hat call for the best of judgment, where discression is the better part of valor.

Responding to the desire, manifested at the meeting of the oil men, for a little more consideration of their grievances, we can show the right spirit and thus help make for harmony and pave the road for solid good fellowship and understanding all along the line.

As a parting word, we would suggest that a meeting of two committees, one appoined by the oil men and the other by the Chamber of Commerce, be arranged so that the existing differences be worked out. The difficulties and existing differences, which may arise between citizens of any town, will often times be minimized when we come to know each other and learn that all of us are working toward the same end.

One of the greatest issues before July 8, 1911. the American people is whether our public school system shall remain democratic, or whether it shall be used more and more in the direction of equipping a professional class.

STATE PLANS TO GET RID OF ALL BAD CROSSINGS

The state highway department's policy is to do away with all grade crossings as rapidly as it can, according to State Highway Engineer James A. French.

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MEXICAN KILLED NEAR DEMING LAST WEEK

Tenogenes Lopez, a Mexican, was shot and instantly killed about 3:30 o'clock Thursday morning by officers at a point near the water tank of the C. W. Hoskins farm, which is ten miles south of Deming.

Lopez was riding a horse and leading a pack mule which was carrying a load of intoxicating liquor. He was not following any road but was traveling a cross country trail of his own selection through the mesquite at the time he was shot.

The officers for the past month had been endeavoring to catch Lopez on one of his periodical trips, but he either had not been making any trips or else was following a different route.

This time Deputy Sheriff Andy Allison and Immigration Inspector Mc-Garr happened to be waiting at a ten feet of them, when they threw the glow from a flashlight on him and commanded him to halt. This warning was repeated three or four times, both in English and Spanish. The flashlight showed that as Lopez turned his horse off to one side instead of stopping he was also reaching into his pocket for his gun and leaning forward on his horse.

Seeing that Lopez had no intention of stopping, but instead was trying to get away, both officers fired with the intention of crippling or killing the horse and mule and then look to the capture of Lopez after he was on foot.

One of the officers was armed with a 22 calibre high powered rifle and the other with a shotgun loaded with buck shot. Lopez had gotten about thirty paces away when the officers fired. At that distance the buck shot scattered so much that one of them went through Lopezs right hand and broke the handle of his gun, while another shot struck him in a vital part and he died in less than five minutes.

As Lopez and the animals fell the officers rushed up and saw Lopez reaching for his gun under his horse's neck where it had dropped. He made a second atempt to get his gun when he was grabbed by the Va feet and dragged back so that the Fu gun was out of his reach.
