The tire would have to be an exworn out by this 100 miles of sheer dragging under the weight of the car. Considering how few car owners take the matter seriously enough lel, there can be no doubt that a large portion of tire expense is eaten up by this careless wear.

One of the most useful things to carry along in the car is a 25-foot rope. In the first place, it is an admirable tow-rope. It can be wrapped around the axle and spring after some of the spring leaves have been broken to get home without breaking the rest of the leaves. It can be cut in two and wrapped around to give traction in a mud hole where it would be impossible to fasten chains. The rope can be used even as a tire when the last spare has blown out, and will save the rim on the journey home. Always carry one

One of the chief factors in prevening the spread of the chamiza, if to its wider dissemination, is injury from rabbits and other animals. covey of quails will destroy many of the seedlings shortly after germination has taken place. They are evidently very fond of the young leaves and succulent sprouts. Mice at times dig the seeds out and destroy them. Ants and other insects are also more or less injurious. But the greatest damage appears to be done by rabbits. From the results so far accomplished in this experiment, it seems probable that they have had greater influence than the small amount of available moisture shrub. After the seedlings are a year old or more, and four or five inches tall, rabbits will destroy the stems down to the surface of the ground or slightly below, leaving many of the leaves lying on the ground where the small bush stood. The bushes may sprout up later, but growth is seriously choked; and often they are killed.

The Experiment Station is planning to make more extensive plantings the first time moisture conditions are favorable. Fall and winter plantings, with seed at least two or three years old, have given the best germination. Several of the larger cattle and sheepmen are cooperating in the experiment. Seed and directions for planting may be obtained free of charge from the Experiment Station, State College, New Mexico, by others who would like to test the growing of this shrub in their
