INCOME TAX IN A NUTSHELL

The revenue act of 1926 provides that the status of a taxpayer relative to the amount of his personal exemptions shall be determined by apportionment in accordance with the number of months the taxpayer was single, married, or the head of a family.

Would You Buy a Farm Sight Unseen

Few of us would have the nerve to buy a farm or a house and lot in the city sight unseen. If requested to do a thing of this kind we would ordinarily pass it off with the remark that "somebody had placed us on the sucker list." Yet many people have acquired property in this manner; some to their sorrow. Thousands have invested in Florida real estate. Many purchases have been made through the mails where the purchaser never saw the property and the trade was satisfactory, others woke up to the sad fact that their property was in the middle of the everglades. But whatever might be the individual opinion, the majority will agree that it would be the height of folly to buy a farm or real estate by the sight unseen method.

So it is with the average individual, the same rule will apply to the careful purchases of the smaller things, the necessities of life. Ordinarily we exercise the same care in buying our clothing, our food, our household furniture, our automobiles. Experience has taught us that it is infinitely more satisfactory to see what we buy. Sometimes an examination will reveal that the thing we wanted most is the thing we need the least, whereas if the purchase had been made through a mail order catalog, we feel duty bound to take it even though the article we wanted so badly proves to be unsatisfactory, but the purchase was made in good faith and we stand "hitched."

The majority of the mail order houses are usually honest in their claims relative to the value of their goods, still you can't examine them until they reach you. They tell you to send it back if not satisfactory, which means that you must go to the freight or express office, take it to your home, unpack it, repack and take it back to the depot if it is not what you want. While this operation may not cause you much trouble and worry it may come at an inconvenient season when you need the article badly and can ill afford to spare the time in making the exchange.

It so often happens that the mail order purchaser receives a letter to the effect that the concern is just out of the article wanted, but is taking the liberty to substitute something else just as good, which you may like, but if it happens to be on the order of phonograph records and the shipping clerk not knowing your tastes may send you "Turkey in the Straw" for "Carusos' O Sol Mio."

A full share of patronage from the home people has enabled the local merchant in many instances to increase his volume of sales and reduce the cost to the purchaser. Modern methods of transportation has enabled your groceryman to sell you fresh vegetables in a season you can appreciate the mostwinter time. More often the vegetables carried is for your accommodation, perishable as they are, the grocer often loses the profit on the entire lot when a part of them must be discarded, because they have rotted on the way.

There is no substitute for HOME PATRONAGE, where you see what you buy and have the benefit of the friendly suggestions from the local merchants, who probably knows your individual tastes.






