The price of crude was increased 25 cents a barrel, according to a notice posted here Monday morning by both the New Mexico Pipe Line Company and the Illinois Pipe Line Company.

25 CENTS A BARREL

CRUDE OIL INCREASED

This brings the price of local crude to \$1.95 a barrel, regardless of gravity, the former price being \$1.70 a barrel.

This increase in the price of crude in the field will act as a great stimulant to future drilling and development in the field and the Caprock district, according to operators.







## WHO IS MC-CULLOUGH? WEEKLY MENU

Editor Advocate: I was standing the other day listening to the usual talk that is going now 'Politics, when the candidacy of W. H. Mc-Cullough for District Attorney, came up, and some one in the crowd asked "Who is this fellow McCullough and what has he done that he should have this office?"

He stayed through until the Armistice was signed and peace came, then he was put into the office of Prosecuting Judge Advocate where he made an enviable record and came out of the army after over three years service, came to Roswell with his family and opened a law office with Dillard Wyatt, who shortly afterward was elected to the office of District Attorney, then going into practice alone.

In 1924 he was elected to the Legislature, and was by the Democrats of that body made Floor Leader. When the legislative contest came up he was appointed on the contest committee and it was by reason of his thorough work as attorney of the committee in the investigation of the San Miguel county election frauds that the democrats in that body from San Miguel county, and from the record and evidence he obtained that the democrats were able to win the contest against every republican county official except one.

The above number includes cases handled in Eddy county only and does not take into consideration the great number of cases handled in Chaves and Lea counties.
