

### Nine Hundred Head Horses Sold to Go to Old Mexico

Probably the largest horse sale ever made in the valley was completed yesterday when H. M. Maple and associates, of El Paso, Texas, closed a deal for approximately nine hundred horses and mares. So far as we know the number involved in this sale is the greatest ever disposed of in this section even in the days when old Dobbin reigned supreme and horse sales were an every day occurrance. The approximate consideration was not learned, although it is known that the total sum of the sale will run several thousand dollars.

Arrangements have been made to drive the bunch of horses through to El Paso, it is understood, where they will be sent to Old Mexico, some to be put on the ranges and others will be turned to the Mexican government.



STATUTES FOR THE CONTROL OF DOGS (State Health Department)

With rabies prevalent in some parts of the state and likely to appear elsewhere, it may be helpful to reproduce ber 23, 24 and 25. the statutes now on the books, relating to the control of dogs. The fol- September 23, 24 and 25. lowing sections are taken from the 1915 code

"Sec. 3564. Animals running at yarge-Dog license. Fiftieth. To September 24 and 25. regulate, restrain, and prohibit the running at large of horses, cattle, 29. swine, sheep, goats, geese, and dogs, and to impose a license fee upon 30, October 1 and 2 dogs.'

"Sec. 218. Dogs-License required October 5, 6, and 7 -Penalty.



EFFECT OF SUNLIGHT ON GERMS IS MADE USEFUL .-For a long time scientists have known that sunlight kills germ life. This knowledge has been put to practical use in many different ways. But science does not know yet just why sunlight kills germs. The public health service, assisted by the bureau of standards, has been doing some valuable work along this line. It had been previously established that the germ-killing power of sunlight came largely from the actinic or invisible rays of the sun. For the experiments these rays were produced in regulated quantities. The health service supplied many different species of germs for the experiments. One type, bacterium colicommumis, is the kind most frequently found in sewage-tainted water. In some cases the germs died in less than one second after being exposed to the rays. After a long series of tests the scientists in charge of the work, W. W. Coblentz and H. R. Fulton, worked out the mortality produced by each different wave length of the invisible light

Proper Time to Paint An excellent time for interior and exterior painting is during the fall and early winter months. Surfaces are dry, and in good condition, if properly prepared, to receive paint or varnish. Sun and moisture are two of the greatest enemies to any paint film. A hot rays of the summer sun. They have gradually soaked up the snow of winter and the early spring rains. This moisture may not be apparent, but drawn out by the sun it is destructive to paint film, and frequently results in a blistered surface. The fall and winter months are ideal for interior decorating. When surfaces have been properly prepared, drying conditions are good, since the warm atmosphere of the house is free from humidity and dust.

There is another factor in the situation. Painters, at this season, have more time than during the "spring rush," and working conditions are more comfortable than during the hot weather. A real painter takes pride in his work. He dislikes to slight a job. During the fall and winter, painting will be done better because the men are not so hurried as they are in the busy season. Taking all this into consideration, coupled with the fact that property owners have from 10 to 20 per cent of the total cost by painting in winter, it is self-evident that this is the season for better painting.



ENGLAND DISHES

Probably no section of the country is as famous for its traditional dishes as New England. The eating of beans and brown bread has become

almost a rite in many of those old homes. Miss Lucy G.

Allen, head of the well-known Boston School of Cookery, has spent all her

life in New England. She has taught hundreds of women cooking in her classes, and has written many cook books,

#### Boston Bake Beans

England dishes.

It's the preparation and the slow cooking which makes Boston Baked Beans superior to all others. Pick over one quart of pea or kidney beans, cover with cold water and soak over night. In the morning, drain, cover with fresh water and simmer until the skins begin to break. Drain again. Wash and score a three-inch cube of fat salt pork. Put the beans in a big, earthenware beanpot. Bury the pork in the beans, leaving the rind exposed.

the beans, leaving the rind exposed. Mix one tablespoon of salt, one tablespoon of molasses, three tablespoons of sugar, and one-half teaspoon of dry mustard; add these seasonings to one cup of boiling water and pour over the beans. Then add enough boiling water to cover the beans. Cover the beanpot, put in hot oven and bake six or eight hours, uncovering the last hour of cooking.



#### Steamed Brown Bread

For a most delectable meal, serve steaming hot brown bread with the beans. It's a prime combination. Many folks like to eat catsup with the beans. Here's the original New England Brown Bread:

England Brown Bread:

Mix two cups cornmeal, one cup of rye meal, two teaspoons of soda, two teaspoons of salt, one-half cup of molasses and about three and one-half cups of milk. Let stand for one hour, stirring occasionally. The bread is better, if the meal swells before the mixture is put into the tins. Butter baking-powder tins, fill a little over one-half full, cover and steam several hours.

#### And Chowder

A hearty dish, liked especially by men, is fish chowder. It's economical too. Buy a four pound haddock, skinned with the head left on. Remove the fish from the backbone, cut into two inch pieces and set aside. Put the backbone broken in pieces and the head into a stewpan, add two cups of cold water, bring slowly to the boiling point and cook twenty minutes. Put into the chowder kettle an inch and a half cube of fat salt pork cut into small bits, and fry out.

Add one sliced onion and fry for five minutes. Add three or four medium sized potatoes cut in thin slices. Strain the stock from the fish bones over the potatoes and cook until they are soft.

Add the fish and simmer ten minutes, then add one quart of milk, one tablespoon of salt, one-eighth teaspoon of butter and either three or four pieces of pilot bread or six or seven cooking crackers. The longer a chowder can simmer or stand before serving the better it will be.



Codfish Balls

Wash one-half pound of salt cod-fish and cut into small pieces using kitchen scissors to make one cupful. Wash and pare potatoes and cut into pieces the size of an English walnut to make one and one-half pints. Cook the fish and potatoes together in boiling water until potatoes are soft.

Drain thoroughly through a strainer, return to kettle and shake over the fire until the moisture is evaporated. Mash thoroughly, add one half tablespoonful of butter, one egg well beaten and one-fourth teaspoon of pepper. Beat well with a fork to make fluffy and add salt if necessary. Drop by spoonfuls into deep fat and fry.

Pumpkin Pie

Pumpkin Pie Pumpkin pie when made right is a real delicacy. And this recipe for it is especially good. For a more elaborate dish it may be served with whipped cream.

For the pastry, measure two cups of flour unsifted and sift with one-half teaspoon of salt. Cut in, using two knives, three-fourths cup of lard. Add three-fourths cup of medium cream mixing with a knife. Chill before using.

For the filling, mix one and one-half cups of cooked and sifted pump-kin, with two-thirds cup of white sugar, one teaspoon of grated nut-meg, one-half teaspoon of sait, two eggs slightly beaten and two cups of milk or if liked rich, use part cream.

### Nice Brown Doughnuts

Try frying sour milk doughnuts according to this good New England recipe of Miss Allen's. The kitchen will be a most attractive place to all members of the family when they smell these tempting doughnuts.

Beat until light one whole egg and one egg yolk, add gradually three-fourths cup of sugar, beating all the time. Mix three-fourths teaspoon of sait, one teaspoon of grated nutmeg and two cups of flour.

Mix one half teaspoon of soda

Mix one half teaspoon of soda with one half cup of sour milk having the milk rather rich. Add milk and flour alternately to the egg mixture, roll and pat out, handling as little as possible, then cut and fry in deep fat.







AUSTIN, TEXAS .- Motion to dismiss the suit brought by the Texas and Pacific Railway Company with reference to rehabilitation of the Midland and Northwestern Railroad has been filed in the federal district court here, according to Earnest May, assistant attorney general.

On August 9, the Texas and Pacific filed a petition asking that the railroad commission, Attorney General Dan Moody and May be restrained from taking any action to compel it to rehabilitate and operate the Midland and Northwestern, unless and until the Interstate Commerce Commission enters such an order.

The suit will likely go to trial in

September. The Texas Railroad Commission, November 10, 1924, ordered the Texas and Pacific to repair and operate within ninety days the Midland and Northwestern, which runs from Midland to Seminole, a distance of sixtyfive miles. The railroad has never complied with this order, but twice has sought unsuccessfully permission of the Interstate Commerce Commision to abandon the Midland line.

Farmers who are worrying about can secure as much as \$1.25 a bushel by turning this corn into dairy feeds and market the dairy products.

M. D. Munn, president of the National Dairy council, who has been conferring with leaders in the dairy industry and bankers on the question, "this sumed in the form of corn meal mush, of the above described lands and bread or muffins in place of a bushel lease-hold interest be applied to the of wheat. At best we can only eat a given amount of bread and cereals, and an increased consumption of one form of bread necessarily decreases the consumption of another."

While corn meal mush and milk is palatable and healthful and should be freely eaten, it does not constitute an effective way of consuming the surplus corn. Milk and its products are the most healthful foods we have, and by consuming more of these people will have better health, be more efficient and at the same time directly assist in relieving the farmer of his burden of surplus corn providing they will feed it to the dairy cows in a properly balanced ration.

"If the public is really willing and anxious to help in relieving the farmer of this corn surplus burden," says Mr. Munn, "he can best assist by increas- tesia Advocate. ing the consumption of milk, butter, ice cream and cheese and at the same time be more healthful and efficient. The properly balanced ration for the dairy cow includes corn meal, corn gluten feed, together with ground oats, barley, bran, cottonseed meal, beet pulp, etc. This corn gluten feed is a by-product from the manufacture of starch and sugar from corn. Therefore the consuming public can further assist by using more corn sugar and less imported cane sugar."


