places. From a health point of view house cleaning is not sufficient. The alleys, the back yards and vacant lots need to have the winter's accumulation of trash removed. The garbage pile and the manure heap must be taken away before the disease germs from them are spread about. Stagnant pools, rain water barrels and ditches breed mosquitoes. They should be drained or oiled and cleaned up before the warm weather sets in. Weeds in vacant lots and along the banks of streams must be cut, and parks and picnic grounds need cleaning and planting.

Spring is the time to build up the defenses against typhoid fever and then the community will be safeguarded against attacks of the fever in the fall.

There were seventeen cases of typhoid fever in Eddy County reported to the Health Department and two deaths from typhoid fever in 1926.

Outdoor toilets should be condemned by the Town Board where sewer connections can be had. In country districts and where sewer connections can not be had, deep pits and fly proof toilets should be used.

BE FOOD FOR MAN?

One of the leading scientists associated with the cotton oil industry recently stated that another big step would be made in the utilization of the cotton seed. This, he predicted, would be the production of protein food for man from cotton seed. Already cotton seed has developed from a taste product to a fertilizer, and then to industrial national importance in making feed for livestock and in the manufacture of a number of valuable products from the oil, says C. W. Botkin of the New Mexico A. & M. College. It is questionable whether cotton growers are receiving a price for seed that is proportional to its economic value. This question deserves more attention and is of growing importance because of the increasing value of the products manufactured from the seed of this plant. Some reports say that seed from

the western part of the cotton belt runs higher in protein. Other reports show that the oil content may be higher when grown under irrigation. The most recent studies show that both variety and climatic conditions are important factors in determining the quantity of protein and the quantity and quality of the oil. Another, but undesirable, constituent of cotton seed is a toxic substance called gossypol, which is associated in small quantities with oil. Its concentration is said to be lowest in seed from the Southwest. Professor Botkin has made an analysis of twenty-five samples of delinted Acala seed grown in five different New Mexico counties during the 1925-26 season. These samples average 23.4 per cent protein and 23.5 per cent oil, which is about the same average as for other varieties and other localities. The samples included, however, some immature seed, and immature seed is lower in both protein and oil.





For the fiscal year ended June 30, 1926, the dead-letter service received 24,056,928 undeliverable letters, an increase of 2,724,696, or 12.7 per cent over the number handled in the preceding year. This large increase is probably due to the change in postal rates, on account of which many direct mail advertisers mail their advertising matter under seal that formerly went third class. Users of postcards and private mailing cards also now use sealed envelopes. This mail, when undeliverable, was formerly disposed of by postmasters, but now is sent to the dead-letter service. 





Coming Spring Pig Crop-Must Have Proper Care

Success with the coming spring pig crop depends to a large extent upon the manner in which the brod sows served by Mrs. Moots to the memare being handled at this time. During the winter sows should receive feed that will support their own bodies, as well as supplying material for growth of the litter. It must be remembered, however, that sows must not put on excessive fat during the gestation period.

There are very few home-grown feeds that cannot be fed with safety to the pregnant sow. Corn and oats can be used as a base for different rations, adding tankage, middlings, bran or shorts, skimmed milk, etc., according to the individual requirements. Barley may be cheaper than corn, and can be used to good advantage. With any ration exercise is of vital importance. Give the sow plenty of exercise, and force them to take some each day if necessary.
