In Profile

What Does Your Police Officer Do At Night?

(Editor's Note: After asking several weeks ago to spend a shift riding with a Muleshoe City Police Patrol officer, it was found that a lot of 'paperwork' was necessary to have the necessary releases absolving the city of any claim in case of accident or incident.

On Friday, February 5, all the necessary paperwork was done and filed with the city and permission granted to ride with an officer on patrol. Saturday night, February 13, and Sunday morning, February 14, was chosen to be *The Journal's* night on patrol.

This is the first in a series of "In Profile", spotlighting not only the city police, but other local and area businesses and government entities.)

At 6:54 (or in police lingo, 1854), Muleshoe City Police Sergeant Richard Bonham signed in by radio for a 12-hour tour of duty on the streets of Muleshoe. Sgt. Bonham knew he had a passenger for his shift that night, and drove to the police department to read reports and check up on activities of the department for the last 12

It was an extra-long meeting for the Muleshoe City Council Tuesday morning as they were joined by the Bailey County Commissioners Court, two representatives from the South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock; and representatives from General Telephone and Five Area Telephone, Inc.

Addressing the group was Jerry Casstevens, executive director of SPAG and Karen King, director of Regional Services.

The session was an informational session on the 9-1-1 emergency number, citing new state legislation.

According to Casstevens, a number of options in the 9-1-1 emergency number are available for communities desiring to obtain this emergency service.

This includes the basic 9-1-1 emergency, which will be answered by a dispatcher-such as the local police dispatcher.

Then there is 9-1-1 ANI, which is Automatic Number Identification, a process where the callers' telephone number is displayed on a screen at the answering point.

ALI, which is Automatic Location Identification displays the address from which the call has originated.

Then, there is enhanced 9-1-1, a process that allows the public safety agency the ability to respond to a 9-1-1 emergency call without the caller needing to speak. The callers' telephone number, and address are both displayed on a computer screen instantaneously, providing the dispatcher immediate information.

In other action by the Muleshoe City Council, bids were opened for sealcoating of city streets.

Seven bids were received, ranging from \$56,000 to \$90,000 for 100,000 units.

The bid was awarded Great Plains Paving of Amarillo, with their low bid of \$56,000.

With brief discussion, city council members authorized the installation of three street lights on Highway 214 near the north city limits.

It was also tentatively approved to close the east-west

portion of the 'T' alley between Ellis Funeral Home and the Primitive Baptist Church of Muleshoe.

Following the publication of legal notices, local residents will be given the opportunity to comment. Closure of the alley will give Ellis Funeral Home access to the back of the funeral home property.

Final action was approving the use of a portion of a street (right-of-way) where a garage at a residence has been located for many years.

Activities get underway at 7 p.m. with lots of games for all ages, and plenty of food.

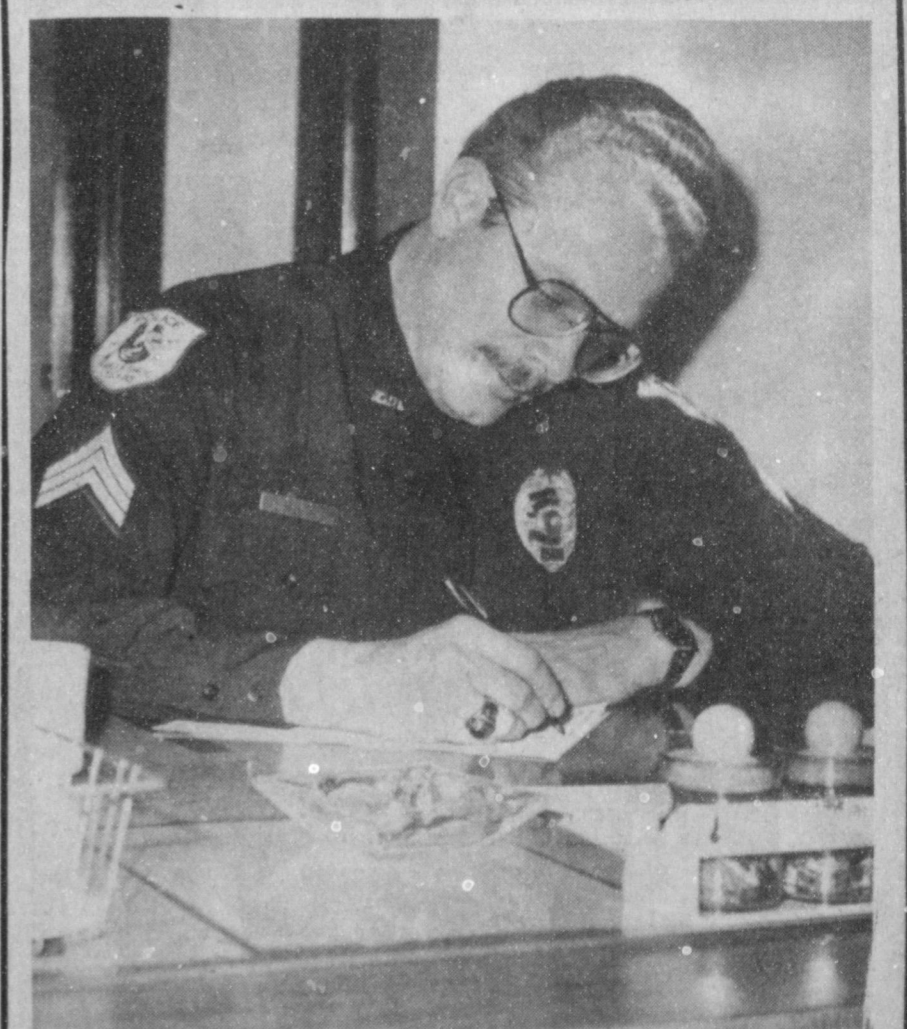
Coronation of the King and Queen from Muleshoe High School and the Prince and Princess from Watson Junior High, will take place at 9:30 p.m.

When the adhesive on an envelope won't stick, use a few dabs of finger nail polish. It dries quickly.

February Dates

Memorable dates in February include: The battleship *Maine* was blown up in Havana, February 15, touching off the Spanish-American war, in 1898.

Cubans were at the time revolting against Spanish rule, which had been tyrannical. The Navy sent the *Maine* to Havana, where it docked close to a Spanish battleship.

Some Spaniards resented the *Maine's* presence in the harbor (Americans were sympathetic to the Cubans). When the ship was blown up with the loss of 252 Americans, relations deteriorated quickly into war, although the Spanish probably weren't guilty of the sinking.

On the 23rd, in 1847, General

Zachary Taylor defeated a large force of Mexicans at Buena Vista, forcing Santa Anna to retreat southward and helping to win the Mexican War. (General Winfield Scott was operating with an army near Mexico City.)

Chester Nimitz, the naval commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet in the Second World War, was born on the 24th, in 1885, at Fredericksburg, Texas, a German-American settlement.

William F. Cody was born on the 26th in 1846 in Scott County, Iowa. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was born on the 27th, in Portland, Maine, in 1807.

The 29th, this year, is Leap Year.

VOTING STRENGTH IS NEARLY 3,000

Bailey County's voting strength this week was estimated to be at least 2,800 and may even be as high as 3,000. This "guess" was placed after J.C. Burchaman, county tax assessor and collector, had reported issuing the greatest number of poll taxes ever bought by county citizens, 2241.

It was five or six hundred more than were ever issued before. The tax office was open until a late hour Saturday night to take care of late comers.

Twenty-four exemptions were issued for those who became 21 in 1947 and thus get a free vote this year. It is believed over age exemptions will run around 600.

MULESHOE SCHOOL EXPANSION BEGAN WITH CONSOLIDATION IN 1947

The school expansion program first started back in 1946 and 1947, in the consolidation with Baileyboro. Before the consolidation there was only the old elementary building and a high school building. To house the larger number in attendance, the school purchased six barracks from the government at approximately \$60 apiece.

In 1949 and 1950, the high school building was built at a cost of \$500,000. The same year eleven rooms were added to the old elementary school at approximately \$55,000 cost and renovations to the old high school at the cost of \$25,000. In 1953 and 1954, the gym at high school was built at the cost of \$76,699. In 1955, the new Junior High School was built for \$220,000 and the high school lunch room was enlarged at approximately \$40,000 cost.

This year marks the addition of Richland Hills, the administration office, the lunch room for Mary DeShazo unit and an addition to high school for approximately \$490,000 cost plus \$50,000 for furniture.

To have the expansion there must be a reason for expansion and a means of securing the money for expansion.

The reason is the increased number of teachers and

students. In 1943, there were a total of 621 students in the system. At the present time there are 1,775. To handle this many pupils, the teachers have increased from 57 in 1943, to 81 at last count.

LABOR HOUSING PROJECT PRELIMINARY WORK BEGINS

A long awaited day is near, the beginning of construction on the Labor Housing Project in East Muleshoe. Harmon Elliott said Tuesday morning that although a few minor details will still be necessary to be worked out, preliminary dirt work is proceeding at this time.

In October, it was announced that Farmers Home Administration had approved a grant of \$810,000 and a \$90,000 loan for construction of the labor housing project in Muleshoe.

Elliott said the project is expected to be completed by mid-September of this year.

Included in the project will be 53 units on the 10 acres of land acquired between East Ave B on Sixth Street, across from the city park.

He explained that the new housing will not be free rental housing and said "These facilities will be rented to the people who live in them and the rent will be paid by the week."

MICROWAVE COOKING

The microwave oven may be used in a variety of ways to assist in conventional cooking. To soften brown sugar, place a slice of apple in a plastic bag with the brown sugar, tie the top securely with string or a plastic strip, microwave on High for 25 seconds or until the lumps soften.

office. On learning that the state of Texas does not have 'Reserve Officers' Sgt. Bonham checked into the police department opening in Muleshoe. He was employed here as a patrolman in March, 1983.

Sgt. Bonham attended the SPAG Law Enforcement Academy after he was employed in Muleshoe, and shows a marked interest in law enforcement.

He said the big difference in military law enforcement and civilian law enforcement breaks down to --

"Military law has a lot more regulations than a city," he said. "They operate more by the book."

"A civilian officer has a little more leeway in making decisions about what you're going to do about a given situation."

He and his wife, Mary, have four children, and two grandchildren.

At 12:40 a.m., Sgt. Bonham saw a station wagon coming into the city limits with one headlight, and stopped the driver.

As the driver stepped from the car, the Sgt. immediately called the other officer, Maddox to show up as a back-up.

In administering a field sobriety test to the man he had stopped, the man failed, badly.

He was taken to the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center where he was administered a breathalyzer test, which he also failed. After that, he was booked into the jail, on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

After that, it was back to the police department to lock confiscated beer into the evidence room.

Just after arriving at the PD, the dispatcher notified DPS Trooper Manuel Ponce that a stabbing had just occurred at Progress.

She gave a description of the

vehicle the suspect was driving, and as the DPS Trooper and Deputy Sheriff Jerry Hicks, who had been summoned from his home, drove toward Progress, the city officers moved to the west area of town in case the suspect tried to come into Muleshoe.

It was found that the stabbing was minor, and the suspect never showed up in Muleshoe, so it was back to local patrol, driving and driving some more.

Early morning hours can become very tiring, as the officer faces little to no traffic, and usually is all alone on patrol.

Sgt. Bonham says when he is on patrol in early morning hours and finds it quiet, and he is not so alert, he will walk awhile, checking buildings afoot.

His last traffic stop for his 12-hour tour of duty was clocking a truck coming into Muleshoe at 68mph. The driver said she was 'running late,' but that didn't stop her from receiving a citation for driving that speed in the city limits.

A local man invited Sgt. Bonham and this reporter to a restaurant for an early morning cup of coffee before going off duty.

Final stop of the tour at the PD was to update the oncoming patrolman of activities of the night.

Shortly after 7 a.m., another tour of duty, or shift, had ended for a Muleshoe City Police Officer, and he was off to his home.

Basically, that's what happens at night, when you are asleep, and the officer, or officers on duty, are not totally visible. They're there, driving -- driving -- and driving -- checking businesses, the residential area, around the schools and government offices, trying to make it "just a little bit safer for you to be out there."

A part of her discussion was on the Radio Auction Day, scheduled for this Saturday, February 20, 6 a.m. at KMUL Radio.

Senatorial Candidate Visits Monday

With the March 8 Super Tuesday elections coming up very shortly, it's candidate time throughout the State of Texas. This includes local races as well as state and national races.

Monday at noon, more than 50 people were on hand at the Old Corral Restaurant to meet Texas Senatorial candidate Mel Phillips, from Amarillo.

The candidate was introduced by Gordon H. Green, Bailey County judge, who cited his long friendship with Phillips.

Phillips started off by praising the excellent weather for his campaigning trips, then told the group the community is very fortunate to have Gordon H. Green here.

According to Phillips, he grew up in Amarillo, but went to no fancy camp each summer. He said he went to Hale County each summer where five uncles

had farms.

In a humorous manner, he told how he learned to start irrigation tubes, graduating as he went from one to two inch tubes.

"Government needs to stay out of farming," said Phillips, "and stay out of the way of the farmer."

He said that since he 'knows the ropes' having served in the legislature in Austin previously, he would be able to lead making changes in Austin.

He advocates bringing local taxes back to the local communities, reminding that when \$7 is sent to Austin, this part of the state only gets back \$1.

Part of what he discussed was that marriage licenses formerly cost \$12.50. This was increased to \$25, with the balance to go to help the abused child.

Phillips said that instead of the extra money going to help children, most of it is spent on high-powered, fancy TV ads, media consultants. "Isn't it about time we took the \$12.50 and left it in your county to be used right here?"

He also said that as he was speaking to the group in Muleshoe on Monday at noon, a Blue Ribbon committee was meeting in Austin to see if they can't increase taxes, and to work on a state income tax.

"I will not, under any circumstances, vote for a corporate or personal tax," he emphasized.

He also asked another question: "Local control -- when did we lose it -- why did we lose it?"

Phillips said bureaucrats in Austin 'really care' about what is happening, but are spread too thin, to visit Bailey County.

He also told the group that what applies to Austin or Houston has nothing to do with what goes on up here (in the Panhandle-South Plains).

"They're not running your

business well at all," he added.

According to the candidate, he has friends in virtually every state agency, and included that his wife is a niece of Lloyd Bentsen, so he has an inside track.

"I want to be your Senator and vote the way you would vote if you were down there," he added.

He spoke briefly of the Texas Aeronautics Commission, the Canadian River Authority, and said he was instrumental in Texas and the Panhandle lasting as long in the Super Collider bid as they lasted.

"All of West Texas needs to pull together to do something," he continued.

He was asked if he was opposed to a state lottery, which he confirmed.

He was also asked about Indigent Care -- and said he would plan for the state to have Fiscal Responsibility, adding, the taxpayer finds himself ultimately 'stuck' with the bill to pay for new programs.

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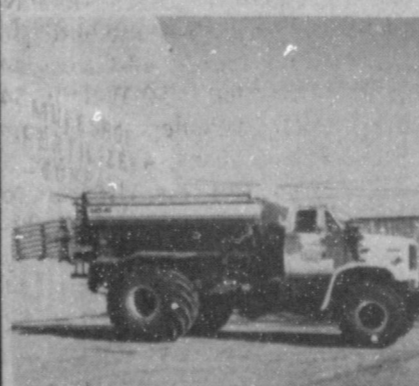

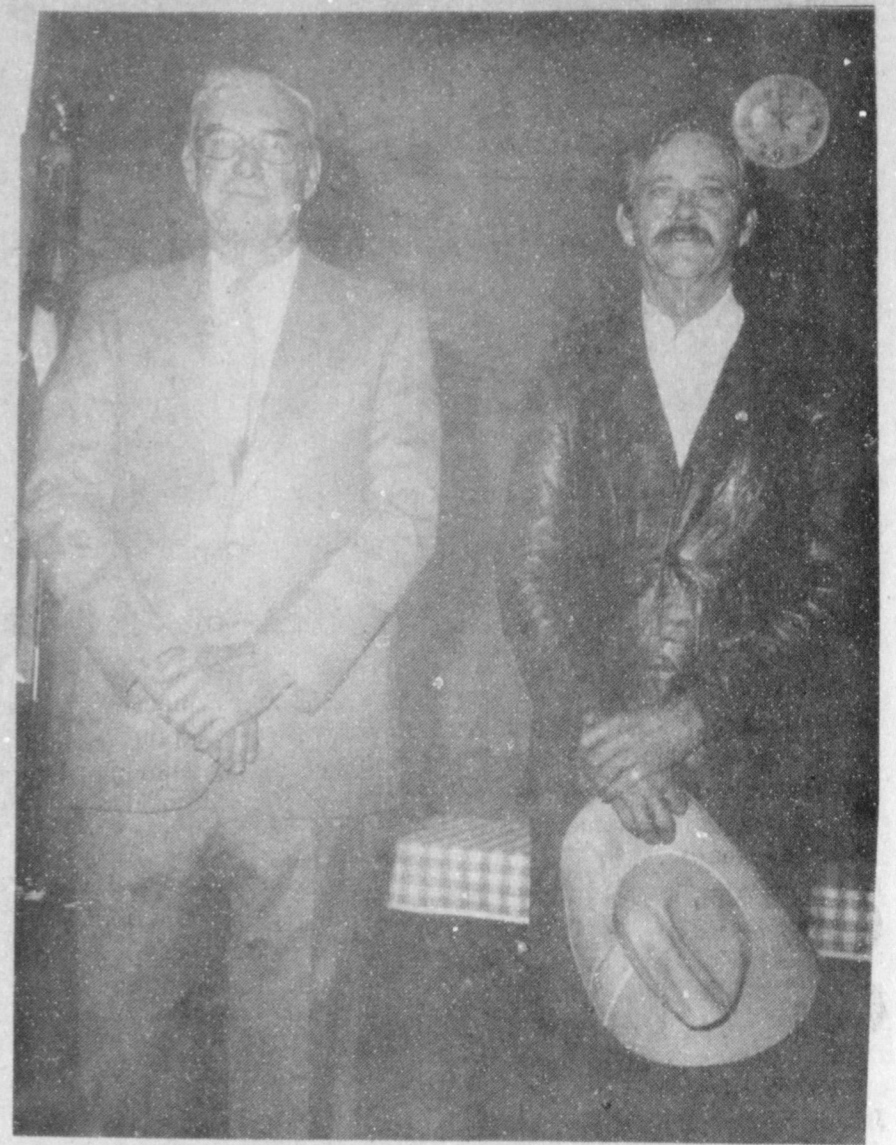

Blackwater Valley Soil And Water Annual Report

Jim Lutz, local manager of the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District, said the SCS has completed its forty-sixth year of operation in Bailey County. Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District, certified March 20, 1941, is a legally constituted unit of state government created to administer soil and water conservation work within its boundaries, he explained. The district was created after petition, public hearings and a referendum showed that landowners and operators wanted such a local organization to deal with mutual conservation problems.

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District composed wholly of Bailey County, is in the southwestern part of the "Panhandle" of Texas. Located in the High Plains section of the Southern Great Plains, the total land area is 532,480 acres. The district is rectangular and extends about twenty-five miles east and west and about thirty-three miles north and south.

BVSWCS is bordered on the west by Roosevelt County, New Mexico; on the south by Cochran County, Texas; on the east by Lamb County, Texas and on the north by Parmer County, Texas.

The conservation district is directed by a board of local people elected by the people. By this action, the district is

self-governed. It has the authority to enter into working agreements with other governmental agencies and with private concerns to carry out its purposes.

A District's governing board, called a Board of Directors, is made up of five landowners, one from each of the five zones. Each year, a director from one of the zones is elected.

A Director serves a five year term. Current Directors are: Zone-1, Ernest Ramm; Zone-2, Carl Bamert; Zone-3, J. L. Dale; Zone-4, Lewis W. Shafer; and Zone-5, Johnny Furgeson.

District Directors receive no salary, however, they do receive expenses for attending meetings. Directors have accepted their positions because they recognize the seriousness of the conservation problem and the opportunity it offers for invaluable service.

Lutz also said soil conservation districts do not aim toward power, but rather to bring about widespread understanding of the needs for soil and water conservation and to activate the efforts of the public and private organizations and agencies into a united front to combat soil erosion.

It is not the intention of soil conservation districts to give or receive something for nothing, added Lutz. He stated that they strive to instill in the minds of the people that it's their

individual responsibility to do the job of soil conservation. Upon their request, soil conservation districts receive aid from many sources.

But, with all this help, concluded the soil conservationist, the farmers and ranchers must exercise the initiative in applying their conservation program.

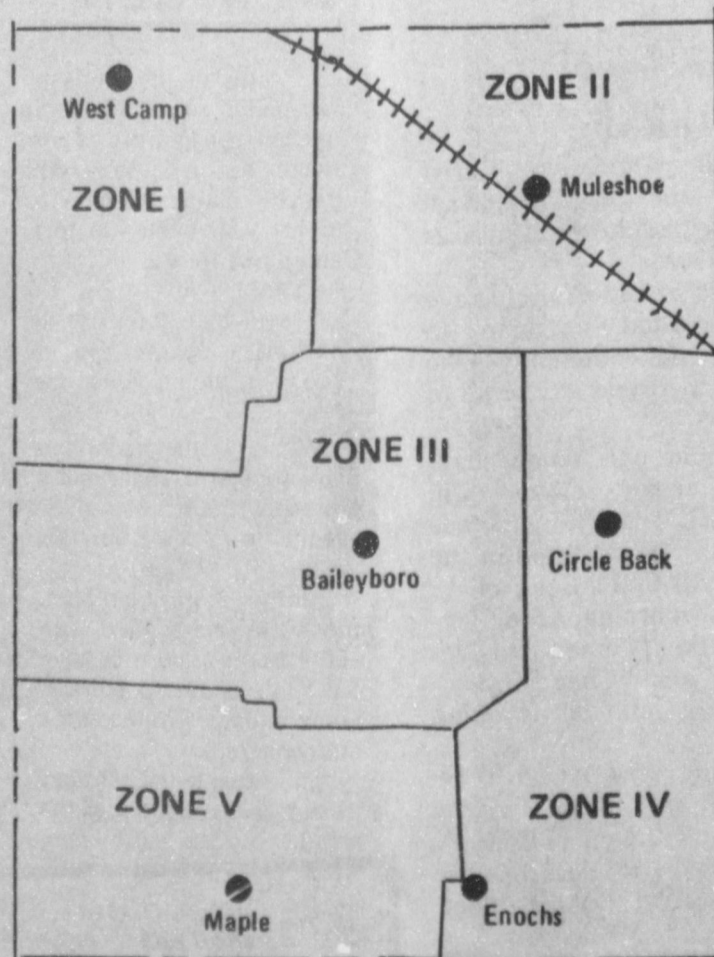

This legislation instructs the Postal Service to trim its budget by \$1.245 billion over the next 21 months, requiring reduction of \$815 million in capital expenditures and \$430 million in operating expenses. The law prohibits borrowing or raising rates to cover the expenses.

He also said, "Our local efforts mirror those taking place nationwide and have been carefully evaluated to minimize impact on our customers."

"Our efforts have always been directed at holding down expenses, while adding customer conveniences. We will continue to operate with the customer in mind in all our future efforts."

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

CAN LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR HOME

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. For example, if your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth only \$45,000.

You qualify for a homestead exemption if you owned your home on January 1 and used it as your primary residence on January 1. It doesn't matter whether your home is a house, a condominium or a mobile home.

Exemptions are available to all homeowners on their school taxes. Additional exemptions are available to homeowners who are disabled or age 65 and over. Other exemptions may be offered to homeowners by school districts, counties, cities, and special districts. All taxing units offer exemptions to disabled veterans.

Apply to your local appraisal district office at the address shown below for all exemptions you may qualify for. Application forms are available at this office.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1987, you won't need to apply again for 1988 unless the chief appraiser requires you to reapply.

However, if you passed your 65th birthday or became disabled before January 1, file a new application to receive the additional exemptions.

If you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, make a new application for 1988.

The deadline for applications is April 30, 1988. Contact your appraisal district before then if you need more time.

PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS

HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income-such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

- You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. Even if your bill goes to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or else paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record. If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.
- File renditions** with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available at this office.
- The new deadline** for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.




