C. H. McDANIELS DIES SATURDAY FOLLOWING STROKE OF PARALYSIS

C. H. McDaniel, age 54 years, died Saturday afternoon at his home in Artesia, following a stroke of paralysis. Mr. McDaniel had suffered a stroke of paralysis previous to his last illness, but the first stroke did not prove fatal.

Mr. McDaniel had lived in the Artesia community some ten or twelve years and enjoyed a wide acquaintance. Funeral services were held at the McDaniel home Sunday afternoon, Rev. L. R. Simmons, pastor of the Baptist church, officiating. Interment was made in the Woodbine cemetery.

The deceased is survived by a wife and daughter.

Whereas, it is deemed necessary to take drastic steps to prevent exposure to the disease, it is hereby ordered that no children under the age of twelve years shall be allowed off their own premises.

Please do your duty by keeping your children at home. This order shall be in force and effect until it is withdrawn by Eddy County Health officer.

## **NEW MEXICO CROPS** ARE LATE THIS YEAR RESULT OF DROUGHT

New Mexico crops are all late this years as a result of the winter and spring drought, which was broken by general rains about the second week in June. Previous to this it was too dry for farming operations, hence farmers have been extremely busy plowing and planting. GOOD FOR SLOPING LAND

The method of irrigation to use depends upon several factors, such as the type of soil, slope of land, and kind of crops grown, says Prof. A. S Curry, of the New Mexico A. & M. College. In some sections where the land possesses an extreme slope or is very impervious in spots, most methods may prove inadequate in securing an even distribution of moisture. These "spotted" impervious areas may vary in size from a few feet in diameter to several hundred feet, and always present a serious et als NE¼; E½SE¼ 22-17-21; W. problem to the farmer because the water may pass over them without penetrating the soil more than a few

In order to obtain a satisfactory method of irrigating this type of soil, the border-furrow method is being tried. This appears to have its merits in attempting to solve the above problem, and can possibly be developed to such an extent that it will become a valuable asset to the irrigation farmer.

This method, as its name indicates, is a combination of the border and furrow method and can be used on smooth fields of any practical slope. Like the furrow method, it should be that the use of a mower or similar field implements is made very difficult, if not impossible.

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

To shorten a pattern for a small person, fold a tuck in it half way between the armseye and the waist line, and another tuck halfway between the waist line and the bottom. In cutting sraighten the seam lines as necessary. If a shorter sleeve is required than that of the pattern, take tucks half-way between the elbow and armseye and halfway between the elbow and wrist, so that the elbow always remains in the correct position. Such alterations must be carefully fitted to the person before the material is cut.

Shoes that are too large are a misfit. The foot is not snugly supported. Blisters are often formed, especially on the heels, and stockings are needlessly worn into holes. Shoes should be correctly and carefully fitted.





## QUARANTINE ISSUED YOU TELL'EM FOR CONTROL OF THE

WASHINGTON, D. C .- New revised quarantine regulations for control of the pink boll weevil in Texas, Arizona and New Mexico, and the Thurberia-weevil, were issued by the agricultural department Friday.

PINK BOLL WEEVIL

Cotton lint in the three states must be compressed as well as disinfected, under the new regulations, to prevent spread of the pink weevil. No interstate shipments of cotton will be permitted from Arizona districts where the Thurberian weevil has been discovered.



## STATE GAS TAX TOTALS 495,100.15 FOR FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 1927

SANTA FE .- A total of \$495,-100.51 was collected by the Motor Vehicle Department of the State Comptroller's office during the period from January 1 to June 30 it is revealed in the semi-annual report issued here Tuesday by H. Charles Roehl, Assistant State Comptroller in charge of the department.

The tabulation shows that 49,100 private passenger cars were registered during the period, exclusive of reregistrations and non registrations while cars for hire and trucks brought the total registrations to 50,556. Official cars, exempt from license number 619 while registered trailers, dealers, private and official motorcycles numbered 432.
