Boston, Aug. 9.-Finis will be written to the famous Sacco-Vanzetti case shortly after midnight tomorrow night.

The warden of the Charlestown state prison announced today that the condemed men would go to their death sometime between midnight and 12:30 Thursday morning.

And they will pass through the little door into the death room in this order: First: Celestino Madeiros (another



Miss Leah McClay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Owen McClay of Artesia, who has recently visited the Hawaian Islands, writes of the many places of attraction. Of particular interest was her visit to the volcano, Kilauea, located on the largest of the Hawaiian Islands. Her letter describing this visit follows: S. S. City of Honolulu, Wednesday

night. Dear mother and dad: Have had a pretty hard day sight seeing, but will write a little as I

want it to go out on this boat. We are on the boat going back to Pearson Bros. shipped a car load Honolulu from Hilo. We landed at Hilo about eight o'clock yesterday morning. Hilo is the largest city on A. J. Basel, of San Angelo, Texas, the island of Hawaii, which is much more fertile and tropical than the island of Oaku where Honolulu is located.

We left about ten o'clock for volcano Kilauea. It is about thirty-five miles from Hilo. Part of the road is paved, but part of it is terrible. We got there about noon. 


