




A barbeque meal will be served at noon to all members and their families. Registration begins at 8:30 A.M. (You must register to get a meal ticket).

Friona's Excel Plant Being Closed Monday

According to the Tuesday, February 23 issue of the Amarillo Daily News, Excel Corporation at Friona is closing the slaughter and fabrication) plant.

According to the story: "Excel Corp., a subsidiary of Cargill Inc., announced Monday the closing of its slaughter and fabrication plant in Friona as of Feb. 29, laying off 1,250 people in this town with a population of just more than 3,000.

"Cargill officials say the plant will be closed indefinitely, but local employees are hoping the closing will last only a week.

"Greg Lauser, Cargill spokesman from the Minneapolis, Minn. headquarters, said poor operating margins at the plant make this action necessary.

"It's straight economics," Lauser said. "The operating margin situation has been happening for a while and reached a point that it's no longer economical to continue operation."

"The plant will be closed

"An employee of the Friona Excel plant, who spoke on condition of remaining anonymous, said workers were expecting some changes because of current marketing conditions in the cattle industry, but they had been told the closing would last only a week.

"High cattle prices contributed to the lower profit margins, the employee said.

"Excel is the largest employer in Friona and the closing will have an effect, even if it's only for a week," the employee said.

"The plant has a slaughter capacity of 3,600 head and fabrication capacity of 3,500 head daily. It was acquired by Cargill in 1979 from Missouri Beef Packers.

A smaller slaughter plant in Cozad, Neb., is also being closed by Cargill on Monday, but the closings will not affect other Excel operations, a Cargill news release stated.'




"What we're doing now is working to improve for the next time," he added.



Seminars To Focus On Management For Ag Profit and resolving conflicts.

Seminars to explore incomegenerating concepts, facts and strategies in agriculture will be held in San Antonio on March 8-9 and in Breckenridge on March 10-11.

The seminars, planned by agricultural lenders, producers and county agents and specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, are aimed at providing farm and ranch business management training for landowners, operators and managers.

These will be in-depth seminars to help farm and ranch managers and operators and landowners improve their potential for increasing income from their assets, point out Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville and Jose Pena of Uvalde, both Extension Service economists.

Each seminar will begin at 10 a.m. the first day, with opening discussions focusing on the planning process, functions of management, setting goals, production objectives and priorities,

Other discussions the first day will deal with the budgeting process, including enterprise

budgets, whole farm and ranch budgets, cash flow projections, partial budgets and financial statements. Presentations will include how to use financial statements as a tool to evaluate a business' performance and financial condition as well as maximizing the use of accounting data in financial planning.

The second day's program will feature discussions on alternatives for restructuring the agricultural business, such as refinancing, changing the size or business organizational structure, and partial liquidation. Seminar participants will actually develop solutions to several case situations.

Other topics during the seminar include leasing arrangements, income tax management and a look at the new Texas A&M Whole Farm Planning and Analysis Software.

Lifesaving Class Being Offered

By Red Cross

On December 5, 1987, the Texas Board of Health passed Rule 229.173 depicting the Heimlich Maneuver for dislodging food from a choking person.

The rule requires a poster to be strategically posted in a food service establishment so it can assist patrons or employees in the emergency application of the Heimlich Maneuver. The implementation date of ninety (90) days after the effective date of the rule is April 1, 1988.

The South Plains Regional Chapter of the American Red Cross has posters available which are acceptable to the guidelines provided by the Texas Department of Health to fulfill the requirements of Rule 229.173. 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

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


