CAN BECOME ACCREDITED

Plans have just been completed whereby flocks and hatcheries in New Mexico can become accredited says E. E. Anderson of the New Mexico Agricultural College. This is made possible through the efforts of the newly organized State Poultry Association, in cooperation with the New Mexico College of Agriculture, and will be of vast help to the poultry raisers of the state as heretofore it has not been possible to purchase accredited chicks in New Mexico. Anyone desiring

In order for a flock or hatchery to become accredited, it will be necessary to live up to certain requirements. Certain regular inspections will be made by an inspector authorized by the College, to see that the conditions are being met.

The purpose of this work is to improve the quality of New Mexico poultry. It will be a protection to the purchaser if accredited chicks are secured as he will be reasonably certain of getting well bred chicks. It will be of great value to the breeder and to parties who are conducting hatcheries. They can compete on the same basis with dealers in other states who are selling accredited chicks.

While it is getting late to accredit flocks and hatcheries this coming season, it will be possible to handle a limited number. ## \$225,000,000 INCOME TAX REDUCTION MAY **MEAN HIGH TAXES LATER**

NEW YORK .- Secretary Mellon predicted if congress reduced taxes below the \$225,000,000 recommended by the treasury, higher rates might have to be voted soon to meet government expenses, with a consequent harmful effect on business.

Addressing the Women's National Republican club, the secretary said that while it might be good business to lower taxes, "it most assuredly would not help matters to be obliged

"It must be remembered," he said "that our present revenues are due to the high lvel of prosperity which has obtained for several years and any reduction in taxes will be made on the assumption that this prosperity will continue without any abate-

"While at present the general trend is reassuring, nevertheless, if there should be a falling off in business, with a consequent and immediate reduction in the field of the corporation and individual income taxes, it may be necessary for congress to levy additional taxes and provide for the revenue needs of the government.

"One the excise taxs have been eliminated, they will not be restored. The first move will be to increase the rates on individual and corporation income taxes, and the very persons now urging an excessive reduction in taxes will be the first to pay the penalty in any increased taxes which may be necessary for the production

"From the point of view of the taxpayers, this is undesirable of course. But it has a greater significance than this. If productive business should again find itself burdened with disproportional high taxes, not only business itself, but the whole country would lose the benefits now beginning to be felt as the result of getting back to a more balanced system of taxation.

WHENEVER anything comes along for adoption or acceptance, and we ordinary mortals are hesitating as to our own procedure in the matter, our doubts are usually quieted or our courage reinforced by some one's assuring us that "all the best people are doing it," or using it or refraining

A year or so ago all the best young fellows in town, it was alleged, eschewed garters and went about with their socks hanging untidily over their shoe tops. If you met a young fellow with smooth-gartered hose you became aware at once that, in spite of his attractive appearance, he was second-class; he didn't rate, for all the best people had adopted the other

A man called at our house not very long ago with some sort of new-fangled machine for cleaning the cistern, or the furnace, or the chimney. When we hesitated about having the work done by machine and a man with which or whom we had had no previous acquaintance, we were assured at once that all the best people on the West side-which is the acknowledged habitat of the best people in town-were having their work done in that way. We could, of course, hesitate no longer. If the recognized leaders of the social life of the town were having their cisterns purified by a particular process, it behooved us to fall in line at once.

Sometimes one hesitates to ask oneself, "who are the best people, and making an estimate of the standing

Old Doctor Harwood was an outstanding figure in our community. No matter what the weather was or how deep the mud of the country roads, he never hesitated to respond to a call for help. His old roan horse and his rickety sulky seemed always on the go.

some one insisted on paying him for the service he rendered, he took the money, but that was not as often as it should have been. He was one of the most helpful, willing, unselfish people I have ever known. I am not sure that he would have been considered, at the outset, at least, as one of our best people by those who determine such matters.

A friend of mine was telling me an elaborate social gathering in a neighboring town not long ago-a wedding, or a dance, or a reception, or something of the sort-and all the best people of the town and of the surrounding country were invited and, the newspapers said, attended. It was an unusual function. After it was over there was a good deal of gossip as to the goings on. Liquor had flowed freely and some of the inexperienced in these matters-women as well as men-had had more than was consonant with an upright carriage. The vulgarity of it was all excused, however, on the ground that the guests were "our best people."



RECORD-BREAKING DAILY AVERAGE GASOLINE OUTPUT

Although daily average crude runs to stills in November did not quite come up to the record figures of the previous month, an increase in cracking and a new high level in blending of natural gasoline at refineries resulted in a record breaking daily average output of gasoline of \$52,000 barrels, an increase over October of nearly 20,000 barrels.

The indicated daily average domestic demand for gasoline exceeded expectations in November, when it amounted to 813,000 barrels, a decrease from October of only 9000 barrels. This indicated heavy consumption of gasoline in November may be attributed to the generally fair weather. It exceeded the indicated domestic demand of November, 1926, by 18 per cent. Stocks of gasoline on hand November 30, 1927, amounted to 30,401,000 barrels, an increase over the previous month of approximately 850,000 barrels. This marked the first month since March that gasoline stocks have shown an increase. At the current rate of total demand, these stocks represent 32 days' supply as compared with 31 days' supply on hand the previous month and 44 days' supply on hand a year ago.

Little change was recorded for the minor refined products, except in the indicated domestic demand for kerosene and wax, both of which showed material decreases.

The refinery data of this report were compiled from schedules of 322 refineries, with an aggregate daily crude oil capacity of 2,871,000 barrels. 

"GUARD AGAINST TYRANTS"

A speech made by Charles Dickens n 1864, which was not reported at the ime and has never since been published, has been found in the archives of the Printers' Pension, Almshouse and Orphan Asylum corporation in England. Dickens was chairman of the corporation in 1843 and 1864. The speech made by Dickens 63 years ago was as follows:

"The printer is a faithful servant not only for those connected with the business, but for the public at large, and has, therefore, when laboring under infirmity and disease, an especial claim on all for support. Without claiming for him the whole merit of the work produced by his skill, labor, endurance and intelligence, without him what would be the state of the world at large? Why, tyrants and humbugs in all countries would have everything their own way.

"I am certain there are not in any branch of manual dexterity so many remarkable men as might be found in the printing trade. For quickness of perception, amount of endurance, and willingness to oblige, I have ever found the compositor preeminent.

The afflicted printer who has lost his sight in the service, sitting through long days in his own room, the pleasures of reading-his great source of entertainment-being denied him, his daughter or his wife might read to him; but the cause of his misfortune would invade even that small solace of his dark seclusion, for the types from which that very book was printed he might have assisted to set up.

"The printer is the friend of intelligence, of thought; he is the friend of liberty, of freedom, of law; indeed, the printer is the friend of every man who is the friend of order-the friend of every man who

## **CONDITIONS FAVORABLE** FOR A LARGE INCREASE IN WEEVIL POPULATION


WASHINGTON .- The department of agriculture Saturday issued a re- in the past year to \$41,700.00. port on the number of boll weevils entering hibernation in the fall of termine damage by the pests on this year's cotton crop.

The records were made by utilizing Spanish moss collected around cotton fields and examining it for weevils. The number of live weevils per ton then was computed and used as a numerical index of abundance. A table for Tallulah, Louisiana, showed twenty-one weevils to the ton, as against 242 last year, but the department said it should be remembered that the Tallulah area was included in the Mississippi overflow and only a few fields were planted in cotton. The average for northwestern Louisiana was 18 weevils, against 242 last year; southern Louisiana, 357, against 192; average South Carolina, 1,525, against 48; average Georgia, 220, against 359; average Alabama, 148, and no figures for last year.

In Texas, late fall conditions were favorable for weevil multiplication. Growth of the cotton plants continaverage. An increase in weevil population was noted late in the season.
