OIL SPRAY NOW TAKES PLACE OF LIME SULFUR

Oil sprays are now being used in the place of lime sulfur as, an insecticide for the control of San Jose scale, red spider and peach twig borer says R. F. Crawford of the New Mexico Agricultural College. Oil sprays if properly prepared by persons who understand the process and know that directions must be followed carefully, are highly successful and efficient as an insectitude. An oil spray is the spray obtained when the proper amounts of oil, water and emulsifier are combined, and should be placed on the tree as late as possible, preferably just before the buds begin to swell.

In experiments conducted with oil sprays in the Mesilla Valley, it has been found that the best results were obtained by the use of Red Engine Oil. While other oils can be used, it is hardly possible to obtain a cheaper oil which gives satisfaction. The use of crank case oil should be avoided since it produces a mixture varying widely in composition and not to be depended upon. The emulsifier proving most convenient and at the same time reasonably cheap, is the commercial preparation Kayso. Only a small quantity is required.

The strength of oil spray most frequently used is a four percent emulsion that is four gallons of oil to 100 gallons of water.

If using Kayso, add just enough water to it to make a creamy paste. To this add two gallons of water

Putting all one's eggs in one basket? It looks like it, since should anything happen to this incomparable variety the pineapple industry would presumably be destroyed.

It has happened before to other soil products, since every product of the soil has its insect enemy. Coffee growing was formerly a rich

industry in Ceylon and Java. It was built up on a single variety of Arabian berry. The berry became ill, an unknown and apparently uncombatable plant disease seized it, and the berry was destroyed. 

#### Several Good Varieties of Everbearing Berries

There now are several good everbearing varieties of strawberries. With care these may be successfully grown and strawberries enjoyed during most of the summer. A common mistake is to expect these plants to bear a continuous crop. This practice is not desirable. Early varieties should also be planted and harvested in season. During this period the flowers should be removed from the everbearing plants. the plants in vigorous growth. At times it is desirable to apply fertilizer.

A little experience will enable one to tell the best time to stop removing the blossoms. This may be done at about the time the early varieties begin to ripen. When this is done the everbearers will be ready for use soon after the early berry season has passed. They should bear almost continuously during the rest of the summer. Water should be applied to the plants during dry periods. Culture and care are practically the same as with the regular varieties. Best results should not be expected unless the bearing period is limited to summer and fall.

#### Old Paintings Throw Light on Indian Life

Six paintings of American Indians made in the 1730's and forgotten for 200 years have been given to the world in reproduction for the first time in a publication, released from are drawings of the life and culture of the Indians of Lower Louisiana made between the years 1732-35, by A. DeBatz, a Frenchman, presumably an architect or an engineer.

The drawings are the earliest known to have been made in Lower Louisiana, and they are likewise believed to be the oldest pictures existing of members of the Acolapissa, Atakapa, Choctow, Fox, Illinois and Tunica tribes. The paper has turned yellow with age, but the colors remain clear and bright, and many details are shown with great exactness.

The sketches yield an astonishing quantity of information on the clothing, habitations, temples, fighting activities, games and domestic animals of the Indians around the Mississippi. Though crude, they are very graphic and prove DeBatz to have been a careof the Indians.

She was alone on the vine-covered veranda of the old Latimer homestead when he called. He felt the smooth little hand in his as she led him to the far end of the porch.





#### Flue Lining Imperative to Prevent Fire Losses

Where it is necessary to limit the cross-sectional area of the chimney, flue lining takes on more than the ordinary importance, since practically no form of masonry chimney will endure for long without the protection of some form of fire-resistant lining.

unless the walls be unusually thick. It is generally recommended that where the walls of chimneys are less than eight inches thick lining should be used. Otherwise, erosion of the masonry mortar joints may cause a disastrous fire at some hidden point where the woodwork comes in con-

tact with the chimney. In general, the fire-clay type of lining is best, since it is formed under extremely high temperatures and is practically everlasting.

#### INDIANS WILL GO TO BASKETBALL MEET IN CHICAGO

ALBUQUERQUE.- Members of the Federal Indian school basketball squad, high school champions of New Mexico, were dusting off their war bonnets preparatory to leaving on a scalping trip to Chicago, March 30.

This will be the first national American team to represent New Mexico. The Indians will compete in the national high school basketball tournament to be held in Chicago, April 3-7. The Redmen nosed out the paleface Las Cruces team by one point to win the state championship. The football title last fall also rested between the Indians and Las Cruces.

The tribes represented on the team are Zuni, Pima, Navajo and Pueblo. They will wear full Indian regalia and will come on the basketball court in Chicago in feather headdress.

#### Better Grapes Secured if New Wood Is Pruned

All cultivated grapevines produce better fruit if about nine-tenths of the new wood is pruned away each year either in the fall or before winter ends. It is not easy to tell just how to prune grapevines in words. In the first place, the bunches of fruit are borne on shoots which start from a cane that grew the year previous. The fruit that you expect to get comes from the shoots of 1928 which start from the buds on the 1927 canes. Therefore, cut back most of the canes of 1927 to three to four buds. Occasionally it is well to encourage a new shoot to start near the ground so as to have it replace a much older trunk.

A shoot refers to the wood growth made this year and it becomes a cane next year. Practically all grapevines produce too many buds so it is better to prune them back severely. The best and strongest buds are those near the base of the canes. Each shoot which starts out should have from one to three bunches so it is easy to have too many buds left.

TOR MAPS OUT TRIP RODMAN WANAMAKER DIES AT HIS HOME IN ATLANTIC CITY FRIDAY

> ATLANTIC CITY, N. J .- Rodman Wanamaker of New York and Philadelphia died at his Ventor villa "Buck Hill" at 1:30 o'clock Friday morning from uraemia.

With him were his son, Captain John Wanamaker, and his daughter Mrs. Farnanda Wanamaker Munn, and his physician, Dr. David Berner of Atlantic City. The veteran mer-chant came to his home here about four weeks ago to recover from a cold he had contracted. He was apparently recovering until he suffered a relapse about ten days ago when uraemia set in.

Thursday his condition became alarming and he lost strength until the end came shortly after midnight. Captain Wanamaker said that the funeral arrangements had not been completed, but that the services would be held in Philadelphia. Mr. Wanamaker, although gener-

ally known as Rodman Wanamaker, was christened Lewis Rodman Manamaker. He was 65 years old.

#### Mixing of Brick Mortar

Important Consideration Mortar, as generally used in brick masonry, is some mixture of sand. time, cement and water.

It may contain all of these sub stances, or only three of them, and the quality as well as the quantity of each substance may vary. The

the solid ingredients have been adopted or recommended by the American Society for Testing Materials, and may be found in their book of stand ards. In some large jobs, materials are rigidly specified and carefully and accurately checked. But in most jobs the purchase of materials from reliable sources is sufficient guarantee of

It is then only necessary to see that they are properly mixed to produce the desired mortars and to see that the mortar is properly used to obtain the right kind of brickwork.

The first hydraulic cements used in this country were natural cements. manufactured by the calcination of argillaceous limestones containing sufficient silicia, alumina and iron oxide to confer hydraulic properties when the burned rock was pulverized and gauged with water. These natural cements, though used for years, have been almost completely replaced by portland cement, which is much more uniform in composition and behavior.

Modern methods of manufacture produce portland cement of uniform physical properties and behavior, although the chemical composition may

Natural cements set more rapidly than portland cement, and are slower in developing strength. The strength of 1:2 natural cement mortar is about equal to that of 1:4 portland cement

The name "lime" is generally used to mean "quicklime." It is also used to embrace "hydrated lime."

Chemically, lime is calcium oxide, but in a broader sense it is the class name given to a wide variety of products manufactured by the calcination of limestone, which consists of heating to expel the carbon dioxide. The resulting product is quicklime.

### Clinkers Occur When

Furnace Is Overfired Clinkering usually occurs during the very cold spells when the furnace fire is being driven full blast to keep

the house warm Any coal will clinker under such strenuous firing, for clinkering is due to bringing certain portions of the fire to high temperature in a short space of time. Instead of burning out

to a normal ash, the coal has not time to do this, but fuses and melts together into a clinker. A thin fuel bed of uneven thickness is likely to produce clinkers. Proper firing will always avoid them, and they should be avoided, for the same causes which make them are

very liable also to burn out the furnace grate. Localized intense neat will almost always produce clinkers,
