

WASHINGTON, D. C .- A reduction in freight rates on petroleum products from points in southern California to destinations in Arizona and New Mexico was ordered by the interstate commerce commission.

Ruling that the present rates were unreasonable the commission directed the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe and other railroads to put into Leonard and Levers, State No. 1, effect by September 30 rates on refined oil in carloads not more than 70 cents per 100 pounds from points in southern California to Arizona and not more than 80 cents to points in New Mexico.

Rates on distillate in carloads should not exceed 80 per cent of the rates on refined oil the commission




