He happened to be taking a bath at the time, but he leaped out of the tub and ran naked to see what his wife was screaming about. His wife told him a snake was


under the sofa. So, he got down on the floor to look for it, and here came his dog and cold-He thought it was the snake






City Police Report



Soil Sampling Needed; And Economically Sound

More than half the farms in the Texas Panhandle may have a serious fertility problem, a recent study by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 indicates. But an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says this is a good time, economically, for farmers to correct their problem.



couple of years, this is a good time to take care of your soil fertility needs," said Dr. Brent Bean, Extension agronomist here.

The price of anhydrous ammonia has dropped approximately \$45 a ton over the past three years, Bean noted.

Results of laboratory analysis of 853 soil samples collected from 215 farms in the counties it serves was recently released by the water district. The analyses were conducted at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Plains Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock, under the direction of Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension soil fertility specialist.

The study indicated that 69 percent of the samples collected from the top two feet of soil were low or very low in nitrate nitrogen, and 52 percent were low in phosphorous.

"Unless the fertility problem is corrected, these farms won't produce acceptable crop yields, regardless of weather condi-tions or water supply," Bean

"The only way to insure that a field has an adequate supply of nutrients to produce an optimum crop yield is to collect soil samples from the field and have them analyzed," stressed.

The Extension soil testing laboratory at Lubbock charges \$6 a sample to test for nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. Samples will be tested for those three nutrients and micronutrients for \$10.

"Considering the reduced profit that would result if a field lacks nutrients, this is a real bargain, " Bean said.

The higher than average rainfall throughout the Panhandle in 1986 may have caused soil nitrates to leach deeper into the soil profile than normal, especially in more sandy soils,

Since the soil nitrate concentration may be deeper than norman, Bean suggested taking some soil samples from a depth of two to three feet, in addition to samples from the normal depth of five to eight inches.

'If plant-available nitrogen has leached below the normal sampling depth, a misleading fertilizer recommendation may be given," Bean cautioned

Comptroller Cancelling **Tax Permits**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said he was canceling the sales tax permits of more than 46,000 taxpayeres who are delinquent or inactive.

"We're simply not going to carry deadwood accounts on the books because it costs the state money," Bullock said.

"And, at the same time. delinquent accounts are going to be put out of business until they pay the state what they owe in taxes, penalties and interest."

Bullock said he expects to collect between \$500,000 and \$1 million from delinquent ac-

counts seeking reinstatement. He said closing out the inactive accounts will save the state more than \$115,000 a year in paper, processing and

"Pulling these permits is our way of reminding folks that there's no such thing as a free ride," Bullock said. "We did it last year and we'll do it again until we clear the deadwood out of Texas' tax system.'

In April, 1986, Bullock cleared the tax rolls of more than 150,000 delinquent and inactive accounts. The state collected \$9.1 million from taxpayers who settled their debts.

Businesses required to carry a tax permit must hold a current permit to operate under the law, Bullock said.

'This could result in a significant amount of money being spent unnecessarily on fertilizer," Bean said. "A fertilizer recommendation is only as good as the sample being tested. So care should be taken to collect representative soil samples."

Additional information on soil sampling techniques, cost and types of analysis, and soil sample containers, can be obtained at county Extension offices.

Range Weeds To Be Heavy This Year

see heavy weed populations on rangelands in 1987. Dr. Tommy Welch with the

Texas ranchers can expect to

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, says abundant rainfall last fall and early winter over most of the state and a relatively mild winter have provided near ideal conditions for a heavy weed crop on rangeland.

"Many winter annuals have germinated and are currently in the rosette stage,' Welch, a range brush and weed control specialist. "Among these is annual or common broomweed, one of the most common weed problems in Texas. Another weed that infests many acres is western ragweed, a perennial. Both of these plants can be controlled easily with herbicides.

"With the exception of poisonous weeds such as bitterweed, the weed crop is a blessing for sheep and goat raisers because weeds are an important part of sheep and goat diets," says Welch. However, he points out that

controlling weeds with herbicides is a practice that will produce substantial returns for cattlemen because dense weeds will significantly reduce forage production. In addition, a heavy weed infestation will keep grass cover from improving. Also, some weedy plants are poisonous and cause considerable livestock losses.

Data from result demonstrations conducted in the Central Texas Extension District as part of "Operation: Ranch Management' showed an average increase of 2,250 pounds of grass per acre due to weed control.

"This increase was equivalent to growing an extra pound of grass for every pound of weeds controlled," Welch points out. "An increase in grass produc-

tion of 750 pounds per acre will pay for a herbicide application. If a weed problem is identified early in the season, herbicides may be applied to provide efficient and economical control, says the specialist. He encourages ranchers to check rangeland for weed infestations

in late winter and early spring. "Most troublesome annual weeds and western ragweed are easy to control if a herbicide is applied at the proper time and growth conditions," Welch points out. "Weeds such as annual or common broomweed, camphorweed, bitter sneezweed and western ragweed are easily controlled with 2,4-D when plants are small and growth conditions are good."

Herbicide mixtures are available for plants that are more difficult to control, especially many of the perennial poisonous plants. These mixtures include the commercial formulations Weedmaster (1:3 mixture of dicamba and 2,4-D) and Graxon dicamba and 2,4-D) and Grazon p†D (1:4 mixture of picloram and 2,4-D). Banvel (dicamba) and Grazon PC (picloram) may be tank mixed with 2,4-D at the same 1:3 and 1':4 ratios, respectively.

Proper grazing management combined with weed control will help improve grass cover," Welch notes. "And good grass cover on rangeland will reduce the potential for future weed problems. Weed control is a practice that will provide both short-term and long-term returns when used properly."




