### HOARDING

President Hoover's commission appointed to encourage people to place their money in the channels of business, isn't going to accomplish a great deal without some economic adjustments. The common fellow has learned that the big financiers have been just as badly fooled as any of the rest of us, and this of course has caused a good many people to loose confidence in the leaders.

The American people have been foolish in the investment of foreign bonds. We have loaned money to European countries to start an armament race or rather the European countries have sought to build strong armies and navies with American money rather than paying their debts.

When the big boys get down to earth and stop sinking their money in foreign countries and in worthless securities, then we can begin to stop hoarding.

### THE BEST RISK

When you read in a paper or magazine that during 1930, \$845,-000,000 was tied up in closed banks, don't jump at the conclusion that the \$845,000,000 was lost. Experience shows that since 1854 closed banks have paid back to depositors approximately 90 per cent of their total deposits. This average is ten times as much as ordinarily paid to creditors in commercial failures. Stockholders in closed banks usually lose, but depositors rarely lose more than a small per cent. 

# VALUATION DAIRY COWS TO BE LEFT TO BOARD APPRAISERS

The New Mexico tax commission will refer to the county board of appraisers in east side counties the problem of meeting an assessment on dairy cattle problem, Chief Tax Commissioner Byron O. Beale said Friday.

The tax commission will probably act upon whatever recommendation is made by the county appraisal boards.

Appeals for further relief on dairy cattle assessments have reached the tax commission, particularly from Roosevelt county, and with reference to the action of the tax commission this year eliminating "common dairy cattle" from the tax commission schedule for appraisals.

"There is no such animal as a 'common dairy cow,' even thought a common classification has been included in tax commission schedules in the past," Mr. Beal said. "Dairy cattle must be either graded or registered. The tax commission this year eliminated the erroneus 'common' classification from the appraisal schedule, but at the same time made a flat 20 per cent reduction on the graded and registered class valuations.



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



# ROSWELL NEGRO IS WE THANK YOU CHRIS TUCKER DIES IN EL PASO I AT ROSWELL FRIDAY

Booker T. Miller, 22-year-old Roswell negro was fatally stabbed in the state national guard armory
