
Is Explained Asks Citizens Of State To Subscribe \$100,000 For Preferred Stock In Association—The Plans Are Explained Here.





THE TAX PAYERS ASSOCIATIONS

County, state and municipal tax payers association are all right and will no doubt perform many worthy services, but it has appeared to us as we have watched the growing interest in such organizations and the formations of many associations throughout the state and county, that we have started at the wrong end. If the scissors are to be applied, let's use them on the seat of government extravagance at Washington and perhaps it won't be necessary to skimp and cut down the efficiency of some of our worthwhile organizations.

A prominent citizen who recently visited Washington says there is no evidence of the depression in the capitol city. There is lots of buildings under construction in Washington, everybody drives fine cars, dresses well and spends freely. This man has the reputation of being a shrewd observer, he isn't the type that would hastily draw a false conclusion.

This condition is made possible by the apathy of hte average American, who thinks the businesss of operating the government is none of his business and who further labors under the false impression that what ever one may get out of the government, the forunate individual is just that much ahead for whatever the government does, it does without cost.

Of course this is short sighted reasoning. The average fellow never stops to think that he is bearing the cost of government just as the wealthiest citizen. He may not pay a direct tax to the federal governmen but his cost is added to the clothes he wears, the auto he drives and he food he eats.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ACTIVITIES

More and more private concerns are to feel the heavy hand of government as the business competitor. When the government started in as a competitor of the printer several years ago, the ordinary citizen was an interested spectator only, it was none of his affair, but recent developments have brought the situation a little closer home to him. It now develops that thirty-five of the new post office buildings are to maintain restaurants for the feeding of their employees and anybody else who is a mind to patronize the post office restaurants. Fifteen of the new federal buildings are to rent out office space and several will have laundries in the basement. If the federal government with all of its increasing infringement in private industry and private enterprise runs behind in any department, its mighty easy to call on the tax payers to dig up the deficit. There's where the unfairness of government competition comes in. The taxpayers right now are having to dig up for some of the miserable failures of the government in the field of private business. How long will we stand for such practices?





TIME TO CARRY ON

Paul H. Nystrom of Columbia University in an address before the American Association of Advertising agencies said:

"We are all engulfed in a fearful business catastrophe, a disaster which cannot, by any logic or even imagination, be described as an 'act of God.' It was man made. It cannot be cured nor shall we see relief until business men, bankers and owners and maangers of business apply themselves to the renewal and rehabilitation of business.

"But it is most emphatically not a time for quitting, for slacking for withdrawing from activity. Businesss will get better when business men go out and make it better. This is a time for effort, a time for advertising, for sales promotion, for energetic selling. If your sales are not as good as they should be, find out why. If your selling methods are ineffective, change them. More important still, if your customers can no longer buy, because they have nothing with which to pay, find out the reasons for that and then consider the possibility for a little original service.

"This is no time for retiring from the market, for not trying. It is a time for serious thinking and some real planning to get business. The most hopeful aspect in the present storm is the increasing number of business concerns who are assuming their responsibilities for carrying on and are using their heads in finding ways in which to carry on. When others join them, business will improve."

OLD BILLS AND HOARDING.

The old-fashioned, large-sized bills which constituted the paper money of the United States until a few years ago have practically disappeared from circulation. Most of us do not see one of those Lills from one year's end to another.

It comes as a surprise, therefore, to learn from Representative Cochran of Missouri that no less than \$538,000,000 of this largesized money is still in circulation.

That, perhaps, is hardly the way to put it. It isn't in circulation; it is being hoarded. If it were in circulation it would vanish, for whenever one of those bills lands in a bank it is retired and replaced by a small-sized note.

The campaign against hoarding, evidently, still has quite a way to go, if half a billion in the old fashioned paper is still reposing in private caches .- Amarillo News.
