Enough Votes To Defeat It - Hoover Has Announced He Will Veto Bill If Passed.

WASHINGTON, D. C. - The banner of victory was hoisted above the house of representatives Wednesday by the army of 20,000 war veterans bivoucked at the capitol to demand immediate payment of their bonus cer-

tificates. By a 209 to 176 vote, the house agreed to the issuance of \$2,400,-000,000 in new currency to meet the demand of the veterans who have converged on Washington from all sections of the nation.


JONES STILL UNCONSCIOUS

TWILIGHT OF LAME DUCKS

One improvement in the American scene is marked by the passage of the Norris amendment, which is already before several states for ratification. Under it, the terms of the president and vice-president will begin January 20 instead of March 4, and congress will convene on January 3. Thus each new congress will get to work within a few weeks after its election. Under the present system, the old congress holds over four months. Men who have been deefated at the polls continue to make laws. These are the "lame ducks." In 19 of the states lying chief- day. ly in the north central and western sections of the country where the value of vaccination and revaccination is not generaly accepted as preventative measures against small pox, there were 22,-413 cases of smallpox reported in 1931 out of a population of 48,900,000 people or 46 cases per 100,000 population. While in 15 states along the Atlantic seaboard with a population of 48,-711,000, where vaccination and revaccination are accepted as preventative measures, there were only 1063 cases reported or 2 cases per 100,000 population.

These figures are given by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., and should convince any reasonable person that vaccination is a very valuable preventative mea-

Prior to the discovery of smallpox vaccination, about 95% of the population contracted small pox at some period of life and about 25% of those who contracted the disease died. A large percent of those who recovered were badly scarred.

New Mexico is fortunate indeed, o have a compulsory vaccination law and only a small percent of the population that oppose it. Eddy county is fortunate to have almost 100% of her school children protected from this disease. DR. O. E. PUCKETT.

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
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
