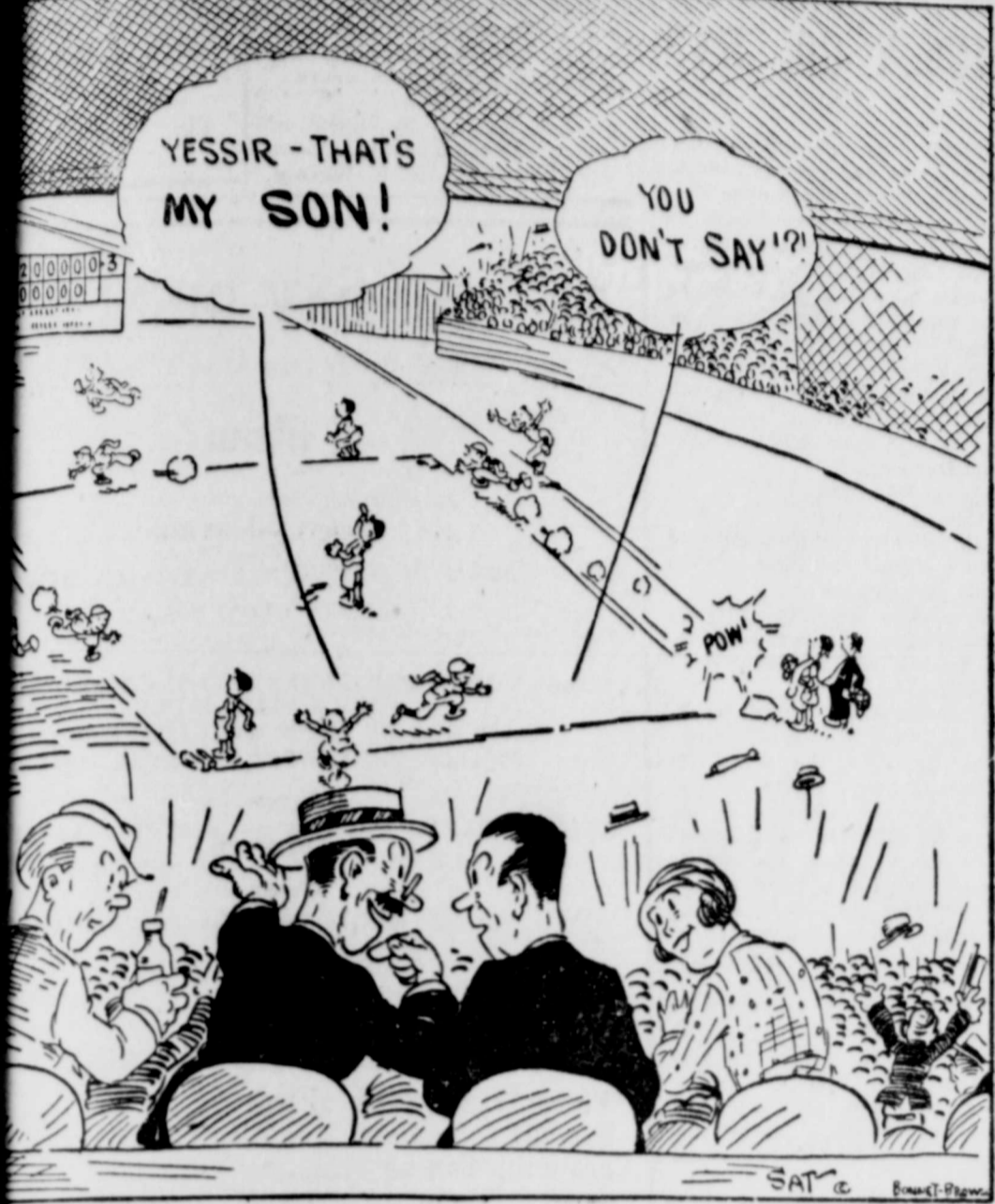

 Judge Emmett Patton of Roswell received a copy of the Homestead Entry bill which was passed by congress on the 13th of last month. The bill provides that an additional two years shall be allowed beyond the regular five year period for submitting proof of homestead entry if it can be shown that it would be burdensome to submit proof at the end of the regular five year period by reason of drought or economic conditions. Application for the extension must be made, corroborated and filed in the United States land office.
