Mining men said it was possible Scott and Brown have found the lode which was the source of the float found years ago.



WASHINGTON, D. C .- Rufus S. Luck, national legislative officer of the Crusaders, an antiprohibition organization, predicted that "more states will be in open revolt against prohibition after the coming election than seceded from the Union during the Civil War."
