In the first inning, Muleshoe scored seven to two for the Farwell team; this was followed in the second by two more for Muleshoe and one run for Farwell. Muleshoe failed to put a run on the scoreboard in the third or fourth stanza, while Farwell added one point in the third.

Coming back in the fifth, the Muleshoe Pony League team scored five runs to none for Farwell, so under the 10 run rule by the sixth inning, Farwell failed to score, so Muleshoe didn't take to bat and the game was over.

Outstanding hitters for the

game were Larry Gonzales, Beto Diaz, Ricky Flores, Hector Flores, Rodney Reynolds, and Ricky Diaz.

Monday night, the Muleshoe team waltzed away with a 20-7 victory over Friona Cattelotown, and the game ended midway in the fifth inning on the 10 run rule.

Muleshoe slammed home 14 runs in the first inning, to one for Friona. In the second, Muleshoe scored three to five for Friona; Muleshoe added two more runs in the third to none for Friona; and each team added one run each in the fourth; Friona failed to score in

the fifth, so the Muleshoe team did not take to the bat again in the game.

Larry Gonzales was winning pitcher and outstanding batters in the game were Larry Gonzales, Beto Diaz, Chris Dominguez, Junior Olivarez, Rodney Reynolds, Ricky Flores, Ricky Diaz, Colin Tanksley and Hector Flores.

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Sales Tax Month Return Reflects Slight Increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday of last week sent checks totaling \$52.6 million in local sales tax to 1,059 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down six percent as compared to payments made to date in June of last year.

In Bailey County, Muleshoe received a check in the amount of \$11,310.20, as compared with \$12,346.18 for the same period last year. For the year, receipts in Bailey County are down by 12.80 percent, with total pay-

ments to date for this year at \$88,881.53, as compared to \$101,926.32 for the same time a year ago.

Morton's check was for \$3,431.57, up slightly from the \$3,175.91 received in June last year. However, they are down 14.12 percent for the year, with receipts of \$23,159.47 to date this year, and \$26,967.95 through June last year.

At Littlefield, the check received for June this year was down from last year, with Littlefield's deficit for the year, at 6.17 percent. Their June, 1987 check was for \$14,834.16, compared to \$16,211.08 for the same time last year. Their payments to date for the year are \$119,167.50, and were \$127,861.58 at this time in 1986.

Friona shows a decrease of 9.34 percent for the year, with current payments to date of \$48,904.00, compared to the \$53,941.02 at the same time last year. Their current payment was \$6,891.89, compared to \$6,803.09 at the same time a year ago.

Houston's check was the largest -- \$8.2 million -- bringing total payments in 1987 to \$66.6 million, down nine percent over 1986. Dallas received \$6.3 million for a total of \$50.1 million in total payments for this year, a decrease of five percent.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.3 million increased that city's payment to a total of \$26.6 million, down six percent over last year. Austin's check for \$2.4 million pushed payments to \$19.4 million in 1987 -- down eight percent.

Fort Worth received \$1.9

'Alcoholism' Film Shown To Rotary

Tuesday at noon, it was a light-hearted Bert Sinclair, public information officer for the Department of Public Safety, from Lubbock, who presented the program for the Muleshoe Rotary Club.

He was accompanied to Muleshoe by Buddy Means, DPS Trooper from department headquarters at Austin.

Sinclair was introduced by Lonnie Adrian, who was in charge of the program, with Sinclair scheduled to present a film on "Alcoholism."

"We're not preaching prudishness," said Sinclair, "and we're not preaching morals. What we're looking at is that we're killing a lot of people out on the highways. Some 56 percent of the people involved in the last accidents surveyed, proved to involve alcohol."

The DPS trooper also said there have been measures to have gun control, because guns are used to kill people. "Did you know that vehicles kill almost twice as many people in the state of Texas as guns? Are you advocating that we take vehicles away, and walk again, or get us a mule?"

The trooper emphasized that "Alcoholism is not a sickness - it is an addiction. Addiction is something you can stop."

"If you think alcoholism is a sickness, I would like to ask you, when was the last time you sent a 'get-well card' to the town drunk?"

Sinclair followed with a film he has been showing to high school and junior high school students throughout the area.

The film shows the effects of alcohol on the body, using graphic pictures, including some fatal accidents.

With frantic calls from residents, who were watering yards, washing dishes, taking baths, doing laundry, or just trying to keep some water on air conditioner pads, city workmen started hitting the streets.

Unexpectedly, the water demand overloaded the well boosters and the wells "blew" quickly draining all of the water reservoirs in Muleshoe.

As the city department attempted to re-start wells, residents kept the Muleshoe Police Department telephone busy asking where was their water.

By about 10:30 p.m. Sunday night, most of the reservoirs were beginning to slowly refill, and the water crisis was over.

Litter Campaign Gains Big Award

In Advertising
DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS, the first antilitter program in the country to target habitual litterers, has received two of the most prestigious awards in the advertising industry.

First, the American Marketing Association of New York honored the highway department's advertising campaign with a gold Effie. The Effie recognizes the highest achievement in advertising: superior results.

Then, the American Advertising Federation awarded the program a national Addy as one of the year's best advertisements. The national Addy was presented for the DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS radio commercial featuring The Fabulous Thunderbirds.

"We are, of course, excited about these awards. They are the first national advertising awards the highway department has ever received," said Don Clark, spokesperson for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"Our best reward, however, is that this program is successfully saving tax dollars," Clark said.

The program, now in its second year, is credited with a 29% reduction in trash along Texas highways during the first year. Results for the second year are expected in August.

"Between 1970 and 1985, Texas highway litter costs increased 17-20% every year. By 1985, the annual price tag was \$24 million. With the program in place in 1986, we were able to stop the annual increase and save Texas taxpayers about \$5 million."

"These awards simply mean Texas is receiving recognition for an innovative, bold program that is working to benefit all the people of our state," Clark said.

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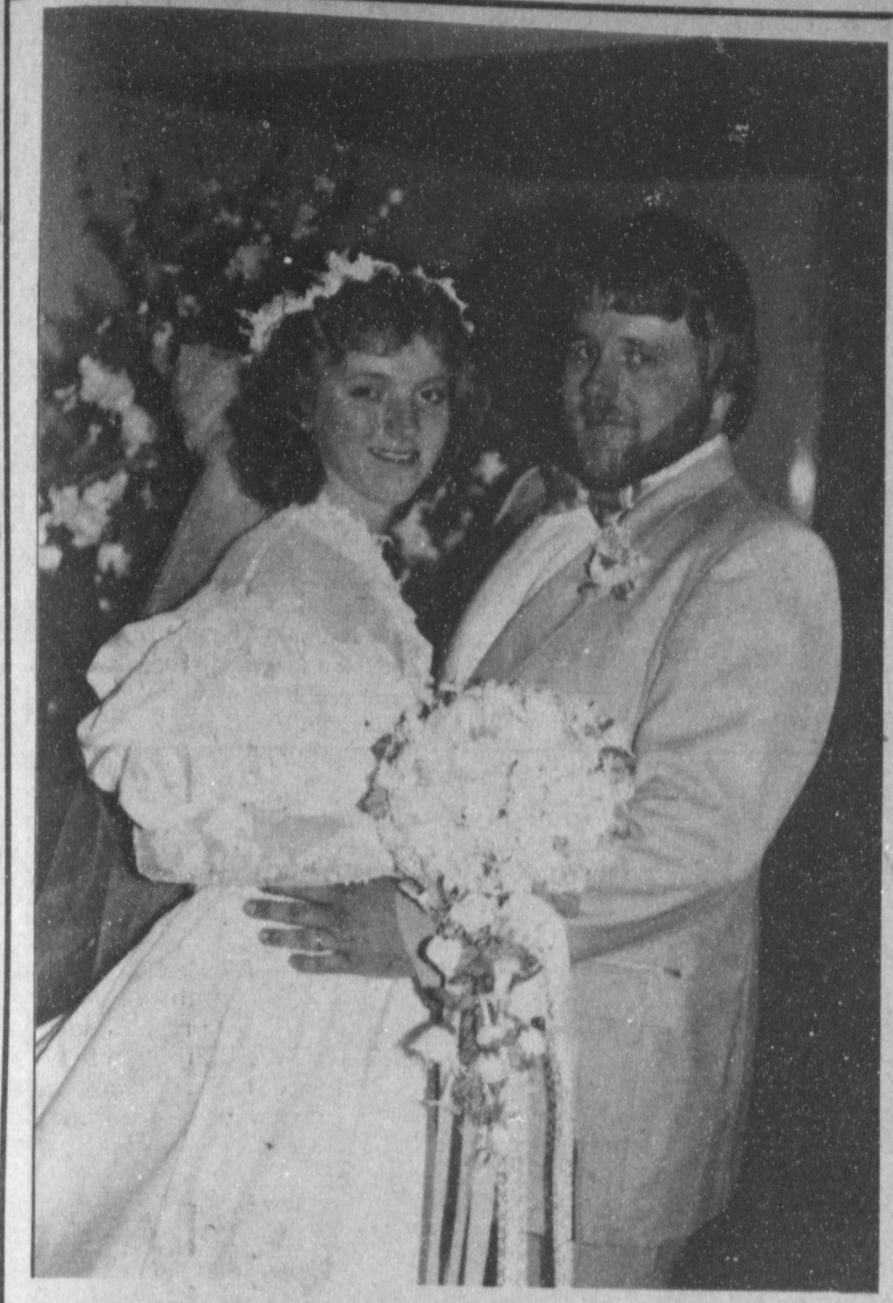

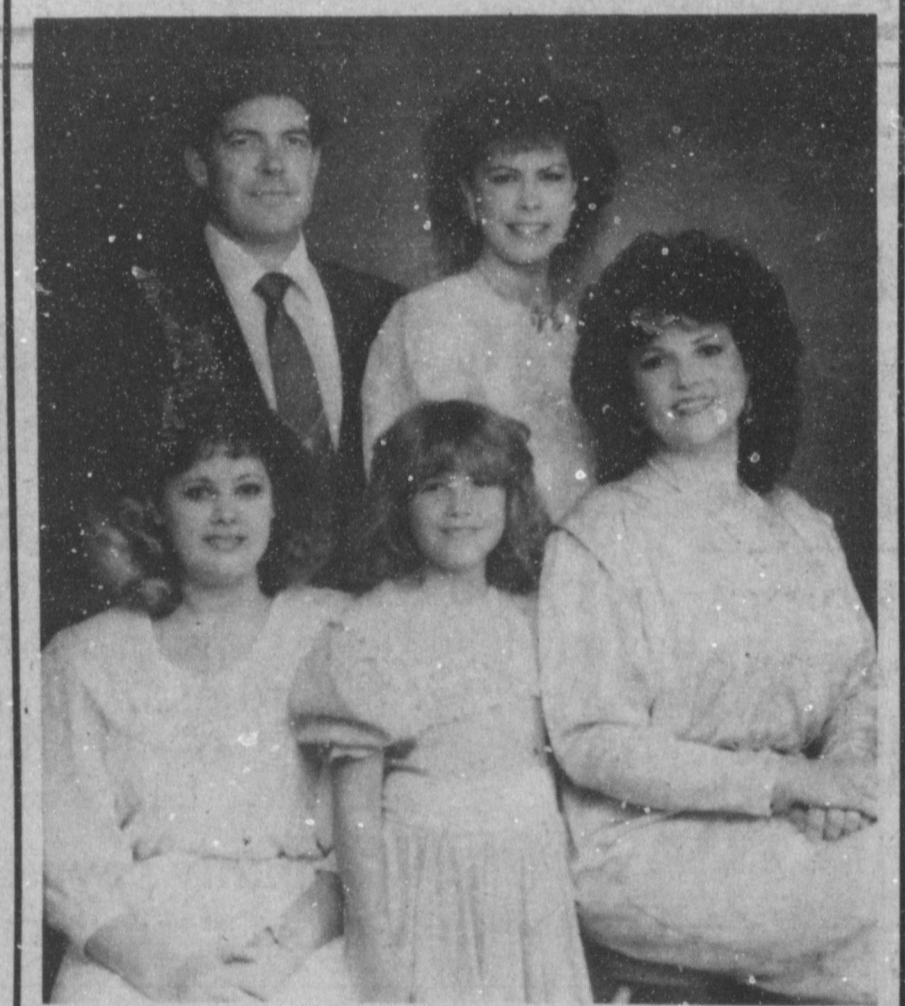

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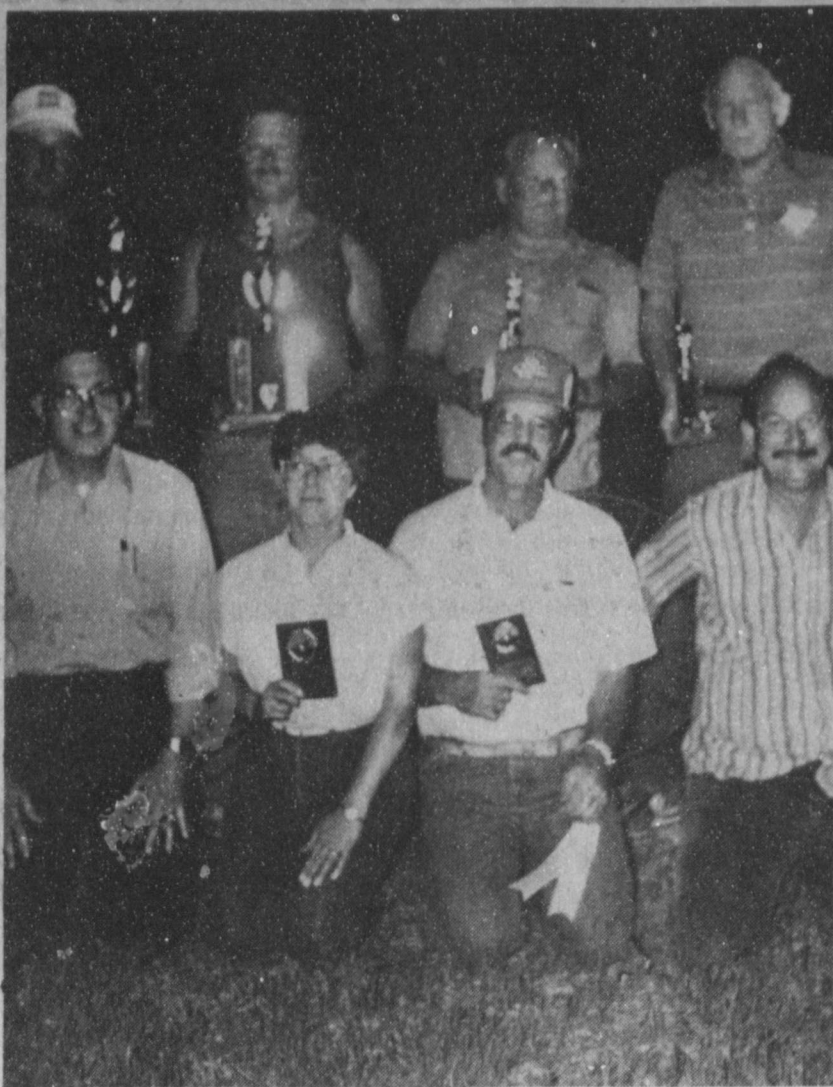

million for a 1987 total of \$16 million, down nine percent. El Paso's payment of \$1.3 million brought its 1987 total to \$11.1 million.

Bullock also sent checks totaling \$24.3 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA check for \$9.5 million pushed 1987 payments to \$78.2 million. Dallas' DART payment of \$9.4 million brought its total to \$74.6 million this year.

Austin's Capital Metro received a \$2.5 million check, for a yearly total of \$19.5 million. VIA in San Antonio received \$1.7 million for a total of \$14.5 million in 1987. Fort Worth's MTA payment for \$506,214 increased the city's 1987 total to \$3.9 million. Corpus Christi MTA received a check for \$449,147 increasing total payments this year to \$3.6 million.

Texas A&M Press book tells stories of rural children, school teachers.

COLLEGE STATION — A social history of Texas, told from the perspective of the former students and teachers of country schoolhouses of Texas' rural past, is portrayed in a new Texas A&M University Press book entitled "Ringing the Children In."

Authors Thad Sitton and Milam Rowold interviewed dozens of former country schoolteachers and students and sought out first-person narratives in written sources. The voices speak of strict discipline, steadfast parental support, eagerness to learn, practical jokes and pranks, physical hardships, rigid moral codes and family entertainments.

It is an oral history showing education as it was before urbanization, consolidation and integration. The book addresses the cry for a return to basics and the decades of consolidated school education have revealed that rural schools worked far better than their critics believed.

One message in the book is that the old system of the one-room schoolhouse has considerable relevance to the current problems with the teaching of basic skills.
